

THAD. S. ADAMS

Thad S. Adams, lawyer, with offices on the south side of the Square, was born and raised in Union Township. He taught school for a number of years, and in 1878 commenced the study of law with the firm of Adams & Cofer. In 1880 Mr. Adams was married to Miss Eva A. Campbell, a daughter of one of the leading attorneys of Danville. He held the office of Prosecuting Attorney from 1888 to 1892. In 1891 he built one of the finest residences in the county seat.

I feel like that I know you and I read every letter that you send to me, being Post of Frankfort. I happen to be that friend that can speak about to you. Decided to type your letter again and send along some more information that I had on hand.

JUDGE JOSHUA G. ADAMS - is of English stock and an old American family his grandfather was one of the pioneers of Kentucky, contemporaneous with Daniel Boone. He settled in Bath County, Kentucky where he reared four sons:

1. James Adams
2. Aaron Adams
3. Thomas Adams
4. Solomon Adams -- born 1803 in Bath Co., Ky. married Nancy Griffith, dau of William J. Griffith and Catharine Sequist

Children of Solomon Adams and Nancy Griffith were:

1. John Adams
2. Mary Adams
3. Catharine Adams
4. William J. Adams
5. Thomas J. Adams
6. James M. Adams (John Bohm's line and the one I'm looking for Madison)  
(Note: married J. Emily F. Cox and their m. z her sister Madora Cox.)

8. Joshua G. - the Judge -- b. 19 Feb 1805
9. Miriam G.
10. Caleb F. Adams
11. Solomon T. Adams (Note from Joan, the T. stands for Thad)

Proper order of birth and all born in Indiana but the first two who were born in Switzerland County and retired in Hendricks County, Indiana. Mr. Adams (Solomon) came to Indiana and settled in Switzerland County about 1825-30 and moved, after 35 years of age to Hendricks County, Ind., where he made his home, clearing up a farm from the wilderness and becoming a substantial farmer. He was a member of the Christian Church with his wife. He was an old line Whig, afterward a Republican and a strong Union man.

Miriam F. Adams was in the Civil War and was a prisoner at Florence, Alabama and was never heard from again. Gabriel H. was in Co. C, 51st regiment, Indiana Vol. Infantry, civil war no wife Joshua G.

Solomon Adams died on his farm in Hendricks County at the age of 63y.

JOSHUA G. ADAMS - was born in Hendricks County, Indiana 19 Feb 1845 at his father's farm. He was admitted to the bar 1871 at Danville, Hendricks county, Indiana where he began to practice continuing until 1876. He was appointed deputy prosecuting attorney and this year, 1876 - elected prosecuting attorney for the circuit comprising Hendricks and Marion counties, 1876 elected Judge of circuit, where he remained to Indianapolis and remained for six years. 1886 he moved to Frankfort, Indiana and practiced law until 1893, when he moved to Lebanon, Ind. He was a staunch republican.

Judge Adams married 2 July 1873 Augusta F., daughter of William Brown and Rachel Piper. Two children to this union: Mary E. Adams and Paul B. Adams who died at the age of 11.

In my possession I have a funeral invitation for James Madison Adams. It reads as follows:

JAMES MADISON ADAMS, was born Hendricks County, Indiana 4 Apr 1839; died 23 Nov 1888. He was married 1st 27 Sept 1865 to Florence Cox (Note her name was Mary Florence) and she died 1 Dec 1869. They had one daughter Evelyn F. Adams and she died 1883

He married 2nd 1870 to Anna C. Kirk, daughter of Jacob C. Kirk and Sarah Kirk. Jacob C. Kirk from Cincinnati settled in Marion Co., Indiana. Jacob's and Anna's two children were Florence and Edcorn Cox. Edcorn Cox was half sister to Orian Cox. Dr. Adams was a republican.

Note: Dr. Adams and his wife are buried at Oddfellow Cemetery located here in Frankfort, Indiana. Florence and Edcorn Cox grandfather was Nathan Kirk who was the founder of Kirklin, Indiana)

of said estate filed in the clerks office of the Court of Common Pleas of Mendipshire,  
of the personal property belonging to said estate, in these words and figures, trust, (viz) my  
City of Bath Clerks.

John Adams Estate.

I do declare that on the third day of August in the year of our Lord  
One thousand eight hundred and sixty three, in the name of the Court of Common Pleas of Mendipshire  
County, in the State of England, William J. Adams filed in the clerks office of said Court, a State-  
ment under seal as aforesaid by law, in these words, (namely) Whereas on, or about, the said  
William J. Adams is appointed administrator of the estate of the said John Adams, who  
now comes and files his bond as such administrator, in the sum of fifteen thousand Dollars, and I  
do hereby, to the acceptance of the Court, (hereinafter) stipulate, that said William J. Adams is now duly  
deemed as such administrator, and file a copy of his oath in these words, (namely)  
Wherefore, as aforesaid, letters of administration are duly granted and issued to the said  
William J. Adams, in these words, (namely) And as aforesaid, the further proceedings herein  
are confirmed,

Attest, John Adams Clerks.

17th day May 1868 - 1st day of the Term.

Garrison Adams Estate

Know the administrator of said estate and  
files a report herein, as follows namely (amounts)  
wherby it appears that he stands charged with the sum of One thousand  
and fifty three dollars and Sixty five Cents (\$133.35) and that he is entitled  
to credit for the amount in the sale of the property below the appraisement,  
and for money paid by him on the debts against said estate amounting  
to the sum of Fifty eight dollars and Thirty cents - and also more definite  
in Court notes taken by him as such administrator according to the  
sum of One hundred and ninety eight dollars and Sixty five Cents, which is  
less than the amount with which he stands charged and leaves a  
balance in his favor of One hundred and Sixty five Cents. Said adminis-  
trator also files vouchers in support of the sum of One hundred and  
fifty one to one hundred and six dollars and sixty five Cents, and all allowed by the Court.  
And it appearing to the Court that the said administrator is about removing  
from this state, or motion, it is ordered that he be discharged from any  
further duties as such -

It is further ordered that the said administrator be allowed the  
sum of One hundred and fifty three dollars and Sixty five Cents paid out by him as

for all his expenses by himself and out numbered  
by other debts so he was never paid and allowed by the Court  
from time to time claims which are unclaimed and as administrator is about removing  
him if applying to the Court that he said as administrator has any  
time if applying to the Court that he be discharged from any  
time from this state or otherwise, it is ordered that he be discharged from any  
further duties as such.

It is further ordered that the said administrator be allowed the  
sum of twelve dollars and fifty five cents paid out by him as  
of said, and that the administrator here after to be appointed may over  
turn said sum out of the assets of said estate.

I do remember that on the 19th day of September 1847  
James Mr. C. Adams Gibell was the Clerk office of the Court of Common Pleas of Mendota  
County, in the State of Minnesota, a statement was made in these words (viz) my  
and I, being the said James Mr. C. Adams, was appointed guardian of the  
persons and estates of John C. Adams, late of St. Cloud and formerly of St. Cloud,  
Minn or heir of Johannes Adams, deceased; the said James Mr. C. Adams as guardian  
of his estate and as such guardian, in these words (viz) was duly sworn  
and filed a copy of his duty, in these words (viz) Am I, the said James  
guardianship are duly granted and given to the said James Mr. C. Adams in  
these words (viz) Attest at my letter below.
