

ELI HENDRICKS

Eli Hendricks descended from prominent early Colonial ancestors, and his descendants are eligible for Magna Charta Dames, Colonial Dames of America, Daughters of the American Revolution. His blood line goes back to such distinguished family names as Poe, Day, Brittain, Stillwell and Thoyckmorton.

Born in Clermont County, Ohio, on November 9, 1810, he was the son of Henry Henrix, Jr. (November 16, 1767-May 11, 1855) ~~Jamestown, Ind.~~ and Martha Poe Day (January 25, 1778-September 11, 1855) and grandson of Henry Hendrix, Sr. (1700-1786) and Ruth Knott of Baltimore, Maryland. On May 19, 1836, Eli Hendricks married Mary Elizabeth Dinwiddie of Rush County, Indiana, daughter of John and Jane Duncan Dinwiddie of Paris, Kentucky.

Eli removed to Wayne County, Indiana, in 1816, and soon after his marriage he moved to Eel River Township, Hendricks County, about two miles east of Jamestown. Here he soon amassed considerable land of several hundred acres, part of which is still owned by the heirs of Hohn Hendricks, a grandson of Eli.

Eli owned the first carriage in EEL River township, and a staunch Presbyterian, he drove his family each Sunday to North Salem to church.

There were nine children born to this union, only four of which grew to maturity and had families, viz: ^{John} James William, Amos and Isaac Dwight. Only the descendants of James remained in this area.

James William Hendrick^{sk} (March 11, 1842- July 31, 1917), married Lida Eliza Brush (December 25, 1845-September 30, 1870), daughter of James and Elizabeth McCormick Brush of Waveland, Indiana, and her sister James Todd Brush (May 15, 1841- May 5, 1909). One Son, Edger Poe Hendricks was born to the first marriage and John, Stamley, and Stella

were children of the second marriage.

John lived on the ancestral acres near Jamestown until his daughter Mary Elizabeth and her husband took over the farming there. Stanley owned the men's clothing store in Danville for many years, and Stella is remembered as one of Indiana's better artists and as a teacher of art in Danville. Edgar Poe owned a farm across the road from his brother John.

This family came from Holland in the early 1600's. Prominent members include Vice President Thomas A. Hendricks, William Hendricks, second governor of Indiana, Bishop E. R. Hendrix, and former Post Master General, James Edward Day.

Ruth is listed in Distinguished Women of Texas, 1962, Who's Who of American Women, 1964, is the author of four genealogies, entitled Our Pioneer Ancestors, (1) The Davis Family, (2) The Scotts and Galloways, (3) The Day and Hendrix (cks) Families, and (4) The Duncans and Dinwiddies. All are in most of the major libraries and

Historical Society archives.

Mrs. DeVerter is a member of the National League of American Pen Women, United Daughters of the Confederacy, Daughters of the American Revolution, The Huguenot Society, The United States Daughters of 1812, The Colonial Dames of America, The Magna Carta Dames, The National Genealogical Society, Women's Club of Houston, Founder of the DePauw Alumni Club of Houston, a member of St. Mark's Methodist Church of Baytown, Texas, and of American Association of University Women.

Ruth Hendricks DeVertter, genealogical researcher and author, was born May 8, 1899 on a farm in Eel River Township, (near Jamestown) Hendricks County, Indiana, the daughter of Edgar Poe^{10/25,} (1/9, 1870-1930) and Myrtle Catherine Davis Hendricks^{5/2,} (1/2, 1869-12/19, 1948). Edgar Poe Hendricks was the son of James W^m Hendricks^{3/1,} (3/1, 1842-7/31, 1917) and his first wife, Lida Brush^{12/25,} (12/25, 1845-9/30, 1870) Hendricks. Both were prosperous farmers of Eel River Twp. James W^m was the son of Eli^{11/9,} (11/9, 1810-10/2, 1869) and Mary Elizabeth Dinwiddie^{6/27,} (6/27, 1815-4/12, 1886) Hendricks who moved to Hendricks county in 1837 where he became a large land owner and whose history is given hereafter.

Mrs. DeVertter is a descendant on her maternal side of Nathan and Nancy Kidd Davis, whose history is also given elsewhere in this book.

Ruth Hendricks DeVertter attended Central Normal College, formerly located in Danville, Indiana. She taught one year in the Jamestown schools before entering De Pauw University, where she graduated in the class of 1922. That year she married Paul Logan DeVertter of Crawfordsville, Indiana, a graduate of Wabash College, with an MA from the University of Wisconsin in Chemistry. Mr. DeVertter, now retired, was an

executive with Exxon in Baytown, Texas. They have two sons; Dr. Paul Logan De Venter, II, an attorney with the law firm of Fullbright, Crooker and Jaworski in Houston, Texas. He married Miss Betty Jane Cof of Abilene and they have two daughters, Elizabeth and Catherine. Their other son, Dr. John Scott De Venter, an ordained Methodist Minister and a doctor of Psychiatry is a founder and partner of the Roanoke Valley Psychiatric Center, Roanoke, Va. He married Miss Ruth Hansen of York, Pa. and they have two children, Ann and David Scott De Venter.

Ruth Hendrichs De Venter, listed in "Distinguished Women of Texas, 1962" and "Who's Who of American Women, 1964" is the author of four genealogies, entitled "Our Pioneer Ancestors," (1) "The Davis Family," (2) "The Scotts and Galloways," (3) "The Day and Hendrix (chs) Families with Poe and Allied Lines" and (4) "The Duncans and Binividdies." All are in most of the major Libraries and Historical Societies.

Stella Hendricks

Stella Hendricks, daughter of James W^m and Jane Todd Brush Hendricks was born on the old original Hendricks farm, near Jamestown, but in Eel River Twp., on August 15, 1879. The original farm was settled by her grandfather Eli Hendricks, whose biography is given elsewhere in this history, in 1835. She attended the little red brick country school known as the Eel River Township School, the land being donated by her grandfather, Eli Hendricks. She attended the Jamestown High School Central Normal College, De Pauw University, and was a graduate of John Herron Art School in Indianapolis in 1912. Stella worked as a commercial artist in Seattle for two years, taught Public School Art in Danville for five years, then was a student at Columbia University for a year. She also attended the Art Students League in Woodstock, New York.

In 1919, she bought two acres of land in the east edge of Danville, sold half of it to her brother, Stanley, re-modeled the house at the top of the hill, known thereafter as "Hilltop". She taught at Boonton, New Jersey one semester, then at Elon College, North Carolina, 1920-1922. From 1923-1928, she was head of the Art Department at Altoona, Pa.

She wasted no time during these years -- but took extension courses on Birds, Trees,

and General Nature Study from Pennsylvania State University, and her favorite pastime was hiking in the mountains. She also taught in summer camps in Maine and Vermont.

In 1925, Stella took a Mediterranean cruise and a tour of Europe. Two years later, she attended school in Paris at the University of Paris under the auspices of New York University, and again toured Europe for six weeks.

In 1928, she returned to "Hilltop" where she conducted classes for adults and children until three weeks before her death. She taught the children painting, drawing ^{and} lettering, but most of all shared with them her love of nature and roused their curiosity and power of observation, with her enthusiasm about all that she considered worthwhile. She traveled extensively during these years, benefiting greatly from her trips, and had the ability to share her experiences with others. She made speeches on all types of subjects to all kinds of groups, wrote articles for the Indianapolis and Danville papers; was given an award by the Girl Scouts for her services to them; and at the same time continued painting and exhibiting her work at art exhibits until the time of her death. She was also an

ardent card player, a member of the Methodist Church, of the Browning Club, Cozy Club, Daughters of the American Revolution, Conservation Club, Indiana Artists Club, and Business and Professional Women's Club.

Stella Hendricks was a woman of complete sincerity and great energy, - straight forward, unafraid, progressive, but conservative. She left an indelible imprint on the lives of the hundreds of young people with whom she came in contact, helping to mold their thinking and lives for the betterment of themselves and their associates for years and probably generations to come.

Stella passed away March 28, 1964, and is buried in the IOOF Cemetery of Jamestown, Indiana.

Nathan Davis was born in 1795 near Mt. Sterling, Montgomery County, Kentucky, the son of John Davis of Middlesex County, Virginia, who was born in Wales, and had moved on to Kentucky about 1790. Nathan married on March 19, 1818 Nancy Kidd (b. 1799 - d. ^{12/2} 1842), daughter of Burgess and Sarah Daniel Kidd of Urbanna, Middlesex County, Virginia.

An elder brother, Enoch Davis, settled in

Hendricks County in 1829. Enoch married Nancy Hart of Middlesex Co., Va. and moved with his parents to Kentucky ca 1790. After the births of their 11 children, they moved to Eel River Township, Hendricks Co., Indiana, settling 2 miles NW of North Salem, where he resided until his death October 20, 1846. He is buried in the Fairview Cemetery at N. Salem, his birth being the earliest recorded there, 1771. Many descendants still live in this area. A renowned descendant is former White House correspondent, Dan Rather, who is now special reporter for CBS.

The Nathan Davis family moved to Eel River Twp. in 1835 and settled on a quarter

section of land about 2 miles E. of N. Salem, to which he soon added several hundred acres of choice land. His son, Walter Davis, succeeded him as head of this farm and in 1859, built a home, considered one of finest west of Indianapolis. The home still stands, recently occupied by Walter's son, Thomas A. Davis and family - all now deceased.

Walter Davis, born $12\frac{1}{2}$, 1823, near Mt. Sterling, Ky. married 3 times: (1) Mary Margaret Spears on $1\frac{1}{26}$, 1843, by whom he had 9 children, (2) Mariamne Jackson Scott (1832- $9\frac{1}{9}$, 1873) on $4\frac{1}{14}$, 1863, daughter of Wm and Eliza Lynn Riddell Scott of Mt. Sterling, Ky, by whom he had 6 children. His 3rd wife was Matilda South, all are buried in Fairview Cemetery.

Walter Davis, a most successful farmer, provided well for his family, giving each of his children a college education, or a farm, or both. Many of his descendants have become prominent in their chosen fields. His son, Sen. Walter Scott Davis served 4 terms in the State of Washington, where he was head of the History Dept. at Puget Sound University for 27 years and on many prestigious committees. A grand daughter, Adelle Davis, internationally famous nutritionist was author of numerous books. Another grand daughter, Ruth Hendricks DeVertter, a genealogist, has placed the family history in most prominent libraries, coast to coast,

On May 19, 1836, Eli Hendricks married Miss Mary Elizabeth Binziddie of Rush Co., Ind. daughter of John and Jane Duncan Binziddie of Paris, Kentucky.

He removed to Wayne County, Indiana in 1816, and soon after his marriage he moved to Eel River Twp., Hendricks Co., Indiana about two miles east of Jamestown. Here he soon amassed considerable land of several hundred acres, part of which is still owned by the heirs of John Hendricks, a grandson of Eli Hendricks.

Eli owned the first carriage in Eel River Twp. and, a staunch Presbyterian, he drove his family each Sunday to North Salem to church. There were nine children born to this

union, only four of whom grew to maturity and had families, viz: John, James W^m, Amos and Isaac Dwight. Only the descendants of James W^m remained in this area.

James W^m Hendricks born ³/₁₁, 1842, married (1) Lida Eliza Brush (¹²/₂₅, 1845 - ⁹/₃₀, 1870) daughter of James and Elizabeth Mc Cormick Brush of Waveland, Indiana and (2) her sister, Jane Todd Brush (⁵/₁₅, 1841 - ⁵/₁₅, 1909). (One son, Edgar Poe Hendricks) was born to the first marriage and John, Stanley and Stella were children of the second marriage. James W. died July 31, 1917.

This family came from Holland in the early 160's. Prominent members include Vice-President Thomas A. Hendricks, William Hendricks, second Governor of Indiana, Bishop E. R. Hendrix and former Post Master General, James Edward Day.

This family has been well written by a descendant, Ruth Hendricks De Venter, whose books are in many libraries and Historical Societies, coast to coast, and whose biography may be found elsewhere in this History of Hendricks County.

GERHARD HENDRICKS - son of Pietra Hendricks

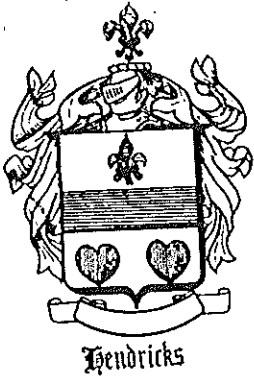
CHILDREN: Willjminti William, Lambert, Sarah

HENDRICKS FAMILY RECORD.

First generation.

Abraham Hendricks was born in the year 1750. We have no knowledge of his parents nor of the place of his birth. He was married to Ann Jameson (Jamison or Jamieson) of whose parents or place of abode I am also ignorant. However it is known that Ann Jameson was by birth a gentlewoman of Scotch ancestry. She had one brother, William Jameson, who died unmarried, and one ^{MARY} sister; the two sister marrying brothers.

It is also known that the Hendricks family were of Huguenot descent and came from Holland to America. Also that grandfather Abraham Hendricks, had three brothers, one migrated to Alabama, and one to Kentucky -- no further record.

Abraham and Ann Jameson Hendricks came to Ligonier Valley, Pa. some time previous to November 12, 1782, for my father, their son, William, was born there at Palmer's Fort on that date. Grandfather Hendricks bible, containing his family record, was burned about 1885 and we have no notes from it.

Abraham Hendricks died in Ligonier Valley, ^{JUNE} June 2, 1819, age 69 yrs.
Ann Jameson died at the same place, Jan. 23, 1835, age 81 yrs.

(note from family Bible at V.K.H. "Abraham Hendricks born Nov. 4, 1750. Ann Jameson, born Nov. 4, 1753.")

obliterating finger of time has so defaced or hidden them that there is no relic now recognizable. The dates and facts noted here are obtained from some notes left by my father and they are very meagre.

Abraham and his brother, William, married sister and were among the earliest settlers of Ligonier Valley. They, with other settlers, lived in Plamer's Fort to protect them from the attacks of Indians. The Indians were in the employ of the British and had massacred the settlers of Wyoming Valley on the 3d day of July, 1778, only a short distance from this beautiful valley of Ligonier. The settlers lived in the fort, keeping their stock and implements of husbandry carefully secreted there, only taking them out for use in the field and to give water to their stock. They attended their crops in the adjacent country during the day. All persons repairing to the shelter of the fort at sundown; at which time the gates were fastened for the night and not opened again until sunrise.

They acquired lands from the State -- Pennsylvania-- and Abraham built himself a stone house of two stories on his farm. He removed to this house from the fort and resided there until his death. This house is about three miles from the fort and was built with intent to resisting any predatory attacks from Indians. It stands on Hendricks Creek and is built of the creek limestone, with walls some two feet thick, having a door and two window below, with windows above then on the side. The windows have heavy shutters and

the door is of heavy adk with hinges reaching across to strengthen them.. There are no openings in either end of the house although there are caps and sills set in the wall. In the apex of one gable is a smooth stone bearing the inscription "A. H. 1796". Thus giving the initiald of the owner and the date of erection. The house was still standing in the summer of 1889 when I visited it and was as staunch as ever.

(Mrs. Paul saw this stone, ~~HOUSE~~ from the house, Dec. 1930 on the original ground.)
