Bottom of page 1034 of "Boone, Clinton and Hendricks Counties Indiana, Portrait and Biographical Record" states that Ezekiel Hornaday came to Washington Township March 13 1822. They were from Ohio.

This book is in the Indiana Room of the Danville Public Library.

The Hendricks County Tract Book shows that Ezekiel Hornaday, from October 17 1823 to September 11 1833, entered 440 acres of land in Washington township.

To Mary Jeannette from
Ruth Pritchard

was held in their home ca 1828 and the church was organized 3-29-1829. The first building was made of logs and located just north of the present site of Plainfield. The second building was a frame structure erected in 1835 in the Plainfield down town area. The third was a brick structure built in 1865 on the same lot. The fourth was built of stone and located in the new eastern section of Plainfield. The ground breaking services were held 3-28-1954 on the 125th anniversary of the first church. A picture of Ezekiel hangs in this new church.

Mary and Ezkiel, as did all the white settlers in the wilderness, very much feared the Indians. They won and kept their friendship by being kind to them. There was an Indian settlement about a mile northwest of their log house. It has been told that a group of the Indians went to Ezekiel's home with the premeditated plan to murder him. Since he was away from home at the time, the Indians held a meeting in the yard to decide what to do. After much discussion, the leader was finally successful in persuading the others not to harm this white family because they had been good to the Indians in that area, giving them food and other necessities. The Indians departed and remained friends to the family.

Smith Hornaday wrote of his mother, Mary, that she was a woman of rare refinement, had a brilliant mind, wonderful business ability, and much tact. She was of medium size. The last six or seven years of her life, she was a paralytic and could not walk. Ezekiel was a large man-tall and heavy. He married a second wife when he was at least 80 years old.

A315-WILLIAM TEMPLE HORNADAY (6) b. 12-1-1854 Plainfield, Ind d 3-6-1937 m.
 Battle Creek, Mich 9-11-1879 JOSEPHINE CHAMBERLAIN. She had a daughter, Helen
 Ross, by a previous marriage whom Dr. Hornaday adopted. Lived in Stamford,
 Conn. When a young man, he told his cousin, Ezekiel Powell, as they rode
 their horses into Eddyville, Ia that he (William) was going to amount to some-
 thing. He was a kindly man who was always pleased to meet a relative. In

1871 he attended Oskaloosa Coll (Oskaloosa, Ia) and taught in the Knoxville, Ia public schools. According to Iowa State University Alumni Assoc (Ames, Ia) he went to Iowa State in the late 1890's being awarded M of Philosophy 1903. Iowa State later honored him on Alumni Day as one of their outstanding students. There is a plaque set of the library on the campus in his honor.

The following is from "Who Was Who" -- studied zoology and Museology in U.S. and Europe; Sc D Pittsburgh U 1906; A.M. Yale 1917; Ph.M Iowa State Coll 1923. As a collecting zoologist visited Cuba, Florida, and West Indies, So America, India, Ceylon, Malay Pen, and Borneo 1875-79. Chief taxidermist U.S. Natl Mus 1882-90 (Smithsonian Inst); real estate bus Buffalo, N.Y. 1890-96; Founder and Dir N.Y. Zoological Park 1896-1926 (retired); Gold Medalist France; British Royal Soc for Protection of Birds; Royal Zool Soc of Antwerp-silver medal; N.Y. Zool Soc-gold medal; Camp Fire Club of America; Int Natl Congress for Study and Protection of Birds; silver medalist Societe Nationale d'Acclimation of France; holder of Cross of Crown of Belgium; active in promoting game preserves and new laws for protection of wild life generally; took initiative in creation of Montana Natl Bison Range; Wichita Natl Bison Range and Elk River Game Preserve (Montana); the Bayne law to prohibit the sale of native game and new tariff law to prohibit all importation of wild birds plumage to U.S. for millinery purposes (1913); organized perm Wild Life Protection Fund 1913-14. Author of many books". He probably did more to save wild life from extinction than any other single man. Credited with saving in America the buffalo, fur seal, prong horned antelope, geese, brants, and beautiful plumage birds. He was the first to mount mammals showing them in their natural habitat. At the Smithsonian Inst in Washington, D.C. in 1957, a battered metal box was found under a bison's hoof in a grouping that was going to be redone. In it was the Cosmopolitan magazine of 1887 containing an account by Hornaday - "The Passing of the Buffalo". A note was written at the top-"to my illustrious successor --Enclosed please find a brief and truthful account of the capture of the specimens which compose this group. The old bull, the young cow, and the yearling cow were killed by yours truly. When I am dust and ashes, I beg you to protect these specimens from deterioration and destruction. Of course they are crude productions in comparison with what you produce, but you remember that at this time (AD 1888 March 7) the Am School of Taxidermy has only just been recognized. Therefore give the devil his due, and revile not. W.T. Hornaday". The Smithsonian is saving the bison and setting them up in a new exhibit.
