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



Introduction

This is an excerpt from my genealogy files.

Most of this text is generated by Family Tree Maker, but I have re-arranged and re-formatted it.

The "Generation numbers" are a relic from my original file. The oldest person in this file (Johannes Rudolf, born 1690) is labelled as "Generation 3," because the previous generations in my Family Tree Maker program aren't part of the Rudolf/Rudoph or Landwerlen families.

The footnotes are not numerically sequential. If you see a footnote (superscript) and want to read the note, turn the pages until you see the very next occurrence of the "Endnotes" heading; the note will be in that section. The *only* content of a footnote is documentation of our sources—there is no additional information in the footnotes.

The footnotes often refer to "F" numbers – for example, "F201." These refer to records that are available on microfilm from the Family History Library. (This genealogy library includes church and civil records from America and Europe – it is sponsored by the Mormon church, but the microfilms are available to everyone.) The Family History Library microfilms are actually indexed by seven-digit numbers, but these are awkward for indexing, so I have created my own indexing system. A list of the "F" numbers and the corresponding Family History Library numbers can be found in "Microfilm Sources".

If you want a copy of these records in electronic format, let me know.

In the final section, "Correspondents," I have listed the names, addresses, telephone numbers, and email addresses of those who have worked on this project!

Families in Alsace and Indiana

These towns all have postal codes beginning with 68.

Mulhouse (Mülhausen). Southernmost large city in Alsace.

Baldersheim. Village about three miles northeast of Mulhouse. Johannes Landwerlen was a farmer from Baldersheim before moving to Battenheim to marry Maria Anna Rudolf II.

Ottmarsheim. Village just under ten miles east of Mulhouse, along the Rhine.

The Müller family was from Ottmarsheim – sisters Maria Elisabeth Müller (who married Georg Rudolf) and Franziska Müller (who married Himery Hurst I) were born in Ottmarsheim.

Franziska worked as a servant in Ottmarsheim before her marriage.

Bantzenheim. Village just over ten miles northeast of Mulhouse, along the Rhine.

Colmar. Large city in south-central Alsace, about twenty miles north of Mulhouse.

Ensisheim. Village about eight miles north of Mulhouse, about twelve miles south of Colmar.

Battenheim. Village about five miles north of Mulhouse.

The Hurst and Grodvoll families were already living here in the 1770's when the microfilmed records begin. The Hursts were all either day-laborers or weavers.

The Rudolfs go back at least to 1690 in Battenheim according to the Lamping family web page. The Rudolfs in the late 1700's and 1800's were mostly farmers. At least two Rudolfs were parish priests in Battenheim.

Statistics: Battenheim was very small. In 1819 there were 29 births in the village, and in 1820 there were 36 births. That might suggest the town's total population was around 600 or 700. The village seems to have been almost entirely Catholic. The vast majority of the surnames were German, but a small amount (10%?) were French. (There was one family with the surname Moyses; they were baptized Catholics but the name might suggest Jewish ancestry.)

Today, Yahoo Maps shows Battenheim as nothing but the intersection of two streets and a highway. Is it really that tiny?

Note on the Languages Used in the Alsatian Records

The Battenheim records are written in both Latin and French in the 1700's. About 1800 they switch to German briefly, then go back to French around 1808, then change to German in 1871. All the names change with the language. For example, French Jean = German Johannes = Latin Joannes, French Catherine = German Katharina = Latin Catharina, French François = German Franz = Latin Franciscus.

The following evidence indicates that German was the primary language of Battenheim:

- On rare occasion there are names written in German even when the book is in French. There aren't
 any exceptions in the other direction.
- Most of the birth records in the mid-1800's have the signatures of the priest, the father, and the
 witnesses and these are always German names in the old German handwriting. For example, in
 1815 "Grégoire Hurst" is born to "Jean Hurst," but Jean Hurst signs his name "Johannes Hurst."
- Virtually all the surnames in this tree are German (the most notable exception being Allonier / Allouié).
- We know that the Hursts and Rudolphs who emigrated to the USA between 1848 and 1870 all spoke
 the Alsatian dialect of German, despite the fact that Alsace had been under French sovereignty for over
 150 years before that.

So I decided to use the German forms for all names in Battenheim. I have done this even for individuals whose names were never actually recorded in German in the records I saw. In the "additional information" fields I have added the actual recorded name when it was different.

The only exception is the Landwerlen family. Although the last name is German, we know that the Landwerlens were politically active—the first Jean Michel Landwerlen was a bodyguard for Napoleon before 1815, and his son fought with the military or the police. So it seems reasonable that they preferred the French names. In any event, you should be aware that the names will appear in different languages if you do additional research.

But there are some confusing cases:

- Some women's names in German are common with either "a" or "e" endings Marie / Maria, Anne / Anna, Therese / Theresa, Agathe / Agatha, Magdalene / Magdalena. And all of these forms are common in French as well (except that Magdalena becomes Madeleine). There was no way to make a good choice here, and I had no female signatures, so I chose to use the forms most common in the written records Maria, Anna, Therese, Agatha, plus Magdalene.
- A few names use a final "y-umlaut" Himery, Xavery, and Antony. Since this is neither true German nor French, it is presumably Alsatian. So I'm using these whenever they appear, presuming them authentic. It's possible that there are more names that have a specific Alsatian form, but these are the only ones I saw in the records.

I'm not actually sure there was a standardized "Alsatian" system of spelling. One of the record-keepers in 1798 actually spelled the number "two" in German as "zwiÿ." It's possible that the inhabitants of Battenheim didn't even have strong feelings about the "correct" way to spell their own names.

Landwerlen Ancestors in Alsace

Generation No. 6 -- Landwerlen + Sohler

1. Jean Michel Landwerlen¹. He married Anne Marie Sohler².

====> Notes for Jean Michel Landwerlen:
The name Landwerlen is probably an Alsatian variation of Landwärlin — this is probably the feminine version of Landwerlen. The Battenheim church records spell it "Landwerlin," but Aloha Landwerlen's family records always use "-en." Oddly, the will of Jean (John) Landwerlen spells his name "Landwerlein" most of the time and "Landwerlen" only occasionally.

The German version of his name is Johannes Michael. Everyone in Baldersheim and Battenheim seems to speak Alsatian German, so for most Alsatians in this file I use their German name. But the Landwerlen family was involved in French politics and so they almost certainly spoke French as a major second language, and all of Aloha Landwerlen's records use the French names (or the English names), so I am keeping him and his son "Jean."

Jean Michel Landwerlen was a bodyguard for Napoleon, according to Aloha (email p. 190). His eldest son was born in 1831, so he himself was probably born between 1800 and 1810. That makes him too young to have served under the first Napoleon, so he must have served under Napoleon III (president of France 1848-1852, emperor 1853-1870).

The Landwerlen records (p. 4) say that Jean Landwerlen, eldest son of Jean Michel Landwerlen, was born "in the hearth of Jean Landwerlen and Marie Anne Greninger." Presumably "hearth" means "home." I don't know if this other Jean Landwerlen is the father, the grandfather, or someone else.

The Battenheim and Baldersheim church records would probably give the ancestors of Jean Michel Landwerlen and Anne Marie Sohler.

Müller Ancestors in Alsace

Generation No. 5 -- Müller + Mäder

1. Joseph Müller died 2-19-1835 in Ottmarsheim ¹ . He married Agatha Mäder . She was born around 1781 ² .
———> More about Joseph Müller: Died (alternate): 2-20-1835, Ottmarsheim ³
====> Notes for Joseph Müller: Joseph Müller and his wife are the common ancestors of the Hursts and the Rudolphs from the mid-19th century onward.
Their home was in Ottmarsheim, about five or ten miles southeast of Battenheim on the Rhine. I haven't actually looked up the Ottmarsheim records themselves.
The Battenheim records say that Joseph died in Ottmarsheim (1835). And Franziska Müller was born in Ottmarsheim (per her death record), and a servant in Ottmarsheim prior to her marriage (1841). I don't know for sure that the other sister was born in Ottmarsheim, but she certainly wasn't born in Battenheim.
> Notes for Agatha Mäder: At her older daughter's wedding (5/1836), she is listed as "Agatha Maider," age 47 (thus born 1788-1789). But this is unlikely since her daughter was born in 1806.
At her younger daughter's wedding (7/1841), she is listed as "Agatha Meder," age 60 (thus born 1780-1781, although "60" could be a round number).
In her daughter's death record she is "Agatha Mäder."
Children of Joseph Müller and Agatha Mäder are: i. Maria Elisabeth Müller, born around 1806 in Ottmarsheim⁴; died 12-24-1891⁵. Also known as Marie-Louise Müller.
See Rudolf + Müller in "Rudolphs in Oldenburg" section below.
 ii. Franziska Müller, born 10-20-1817 in Ottmarsheim⁶; died 1-15-1857 in Battenheim⁷. She married Himerÿ (Hymerius) Hurst I, born 11-11-1815 in Battenheim; died 4-20-1890 in Oldenburg, IN.
> More about Franziska Müller: French Name: Françoise Müller Occupation: before 1841, "servante" — servant or maid*
Himerÿ Hurst and Franziska Müller are my great-great-great-grandparents.

In Oldenburg, they married into the Goetz and Enneking families. Their descendants were the Hursts and Ennekings of Oldenburg, as well as the Hursts of Cincinnati.

Himery and Franziska had several children; then Franziska died. In 1862, four Hurst children from the first marriage emigrated to Oldenburg. Our family tradition says they were sponsored by Father Rudolf (who was of course their mother's sister Maria Elisabeth's brother-in-law). However, it seems at least equally likely that they were sponsored by their aunt Maria Elisabeth and her husband Georg Rudolf, who had apparently been living in Oldenburg since 1854.

"Their voyage across the ocean was a long and tiring one, comprising six weeks, in which time their ship was damaged by a storm and, on account of scarcity of food, they were reduced to one slice of bread and one bowl of soup per day." — Enneking family tradition (see source N-2x-1).

Himery remained in Battenheim and remarried. In 1870, he and his second wife (and very likely their two children) emigrated to Oldenburg as well.

All of the first Hurst generation are buried in Holy Family Cemetery.

I have a full family tree of their descendants (as well as ancestors of Himery Hurst) in another file.

History of Oldenburg, Indiana

Priests of Oldenburg

Before Father Rudolph

The George brothers, pioneers from either Virginia or Pennsylvania, headed out west to the new State of Indiana. In 1817, William George filed a claim in Brookville for a quarter section of land in Franklin County. In 1837, land speculators William Flaspholer and William Ronnebaum purchased the land from George and platted out a town. [5], [6] This area may have been called "Ray Township," or perhaps that was something nearby in the same county. [14]

In the late 1830's, many German immigrants left Cincinnati and spread through Ohio and Indiana. Some German-Americans who had originally come from the Grand Duchy of Oldenburg (now north-west Germany) settled near near William George's clearing and called their settlement "Neu Oldenburg." [6] These folks included John B. Enneking Sr. and Mary Smith Enneking, originally from Oldenburg, Germany, who settled in "Ray Township" [14] — this must be the name of this part of Franklin County. A travelling missionary, Father Joseph Ferneding, invited more German settlers to come to the area. [6]

In 1837, the town of Oldenburg was platted, and construction was begun on a tiny log church called "St. Mary's." [6], [2] A school soon followed as well. [5]

The Ennekings were among the founders of this town, and they "helped to build the church." [14] (This could mean either the 1837 church or the 1845 church, or even the 1862 church.)

In 1845, the first Post Office opened in Oldenburg. [5]

FJR was born in Battenheim, Alsace, April 23, 1813 [1], [17] (or April 24 [16]?). He grew up in Battenheim. [12] He joined the Franciscan Order and was ordained a priest on 4/10/1839 [17] (or "shortly before 1844" [5]). Joseph Probst may have attended the seminary with him, but was not ordained. [12]

In 1844, FJR arrived in Oldenburg. ^{[2], [5]} Joseph Probst also came to Oldenburg, at this point or sometime later. ^[12]

In 1844, FJR was appointed pastor of Oldenburg. [1], [6] (He signs the church records from this point. [17])

Between 1845 and 1848, a stone Romanesque Revival church is built, replacing the log church. (^[1] says this was built by FJR in 1845; ^[6] says it was the work of FJR and was built in 1846; ^[2] says it was built between 1846 and 1848.)

Francis Xavier Weninger, an Austrian Jesuit, arrived in the USA in 1848. He begins a "revivalist" tour of the Midwest. His first "revival" was in Oldenburg in December 1848, sponsored by FJR. For the next 37 years, Fr. Weninger continued his tours and sponsored other "Catholic revivalists." His home was at St Francis Xavier College in Cincinnati. [3]

There had been a great cholera epidemic in 1847, and FJR was concerned about the great number of orphans. He invited Sister Theresa Hackelmeier, a sister of the Third Order of St. Francis, to leave Vienna and come to Oldenburg to found a sisterhood. She travelled alone (defying conventions) and arrived in Oldenburg in 1851. In June of that year she established a convent. [9], [4], [11], [6], [5] (Note that [5] calls this "the Sisters of St Francis Convent," while [6] calls it "the Convent of the Immaculate Conception.") The sisters also founded the school which would someday become Marian College, although FJR was not involved in this endeavor. [11], [10] The sisters had a log cabin convent in 1851, but in 1852 it was replaced by a stone building. [9]

In 1858, the Gehring Brickyard is founded. No brick buildings were built in Oldenburg before this. [5]

In 1860, Mother Hackelmeier died. The sisters continued to teach in schools and parishes, and mustain heepitals and in missions. Between the 1860's and the 1890's they founded schools in Ohio, Kentucky, Illinois, and Kansas. [9]

In 1862, FJR build the Holy Family Church building that still stands today. ^[1] This was a red brick Victorian Gothic edifice, dedicated to the Holy Family, and administered by the Franciscan Order. ^[2] (But ^[6] says this was built in 1861.)

FJR is sometimes referred to as the "founder" of Oldenburg [14]—but it actually preceded him. (The memorial plaque calls him "Founder of the Village of Spires" [1], which is a bit more nuanced, because even if he didn't found the original town he helped build the church spire that gave the town this nickname!)

In 1862, the three Hurst brothers and their sister arrived in Oldenburg. [14]

FJR died May 29, 1866 [cemetery records]. He was buried June 1, 1866 under the church sanctuary. [1]

Fr. Rudolph's Legacy

In 1869, Oldenburg became an incorporated town. [5], [6]

In 1885 the Sisters of St. Francis founded an academy for girls in Oldenburg. [4], [6] This is the school now called "Oldenburg Academy of the Immaculate Conception." [13]

In 1937, the former St Francis Normal School – now "Marian College" – moved from Oldenburg to Indianapolis. It is still run by the Sisters of St. Francis today. [9], [10]

Fr. Clement Steinkamp, OFM

At Holy Family Church in Oldenburg, Fr. Steinkamp officiated at the marriage of Hymerion Hurst and Caroline Goetz, November 1869 (exhibit C-2-1).

Fr. P. Ludovicus, OFM

At Holy Family Church in Oldenburg, Fr. Ludovicus baptized Vincent Hurst II, Jan. 1874 (exhibit C-3-1).

Fr. Franz Joseph Rudolph (the second)

The first Fr. Rudolph's nephew. Born in Battenheim 11/16/1842. Ordained 5/4/1867.

Became pastor of St. Gabriel's Church in Connersville, Indiana.

But he may have also been pastor in No. Oldenburg at some paint—he signed a marriage record 6/1892.

Died 7/18/1906 in Connersville. Funeral in Connersville 7/20/1906. Buried in Holy Family Cemetery in Oldenburg 7/21/1906.

Fr. Hugo Staud, OFM

We have his funeral card, but have no idea why someone in our family chose to save his card. Relative? Friend? Pastor? We don't know.

All the following information is from the funeral card (exhibit F-2x-1):

- Born 11/22/1875 (where?)
- Entered Franciscan order 8/15/1891.
- Professor at St. Francis Seraphic Seminary, Cincinnati, 1898-1905, and 1906-1907.
- Pastor at church in Louisville (briefly), 1905.
- Graduate studies in Rome 1907-1910.
- Professor at Holy Family Monastery, Oldenburg, 1910-1939. Held various other offices in the local Franciscan province during this time.
- Pastor of Holy Family Church, Oldenburg, 1927-1939. (Signed church books 8/1927 to 3/1939.)
- Pastor at church in New Orleans (briefly), 1939.
- Died 6/13/1946 (where?)

Fr. Casper Genstler, OFM

At Holy Family Church in Oldenburg, Fr. Casper Genstler sent Joan King copies of some certificates in March 1979 (exhibits C-2-1 and C-3-1).

Oldenburg Today

Oldenburg is in Franklin County, Indiana. The county seat is Brookville.

Today both Brookville and Oldenburg are quite small. Joan remembers that when they visited the farm in Oldenburg, the nearest grocery store was in Batesville.

Rudolphs in Indiana

The first Father Rudolph is listed above – see "Generation No. 5, Rudolf + Grünenberger."

All the Rudolphs listed in this section (including the second Father Rudolph) are descended from Georg Rudolf and Elisabeth Müller, and so they are cousins of the Hurst family. Other than the first Fr. Rudolph, it seems that all Rudolphs in Oldenburg in the mid-1800's are part of this family. Beginning in 1902, there are many additional Rudolphs listed that we can't identify – they could be relatives or descended from another group of Battenheim Rudolfs who immigrated here, or not part of the Battenheim Rudolf family at all. Many of these are listed in the appendix.)

Generation No. 6 -- Rudolf + Müller

7. Georg Rudolf (Johannes₅, Joseph₄, Johannes₃) was born 11-18-1799 in Battenheim²⁴, and died 12-24-1891²⁵. He married **Maria Elisabeth Müller** 5-4-1836 in Battenheim²⁶, daughter of Joseph Müller and Agatha Mäder. She was born around 1806 in Ottmarsheim²⁷, and died 12-24-1891²⁸.

====> *Notes* for Georg Rudolf:

Georg Rudolf married Maria Elisabeth Müller. Their descendants are related to the Hursts; Rudolphs in other branches are not related to the Hursts in any known way. (Of course, since the Hursts and Rudolfs lived together in Battenheim prior to 1774 when the church records begin, there could be earlier links that we don't know about.)

It seems almost certain that Georg and Elisabeth came to Oldenburg with their seven children. The following evidence supports this theory:

- Three of their seven children appear in Indiana records: One died in Oldenburg in 1893, another was married in Ripley County, Indiana around 1861 and died in Oldenburg in 1918, and Franz Joseph II was ordained in Indiana in 1867.
- Descendants of a fourth child, Maria Anna, still live in Indiana today. (See her notes for details.)
- There is a page that lists the parents and all seven children; it is dated 11/24/1854 by the curate of Battenheim. But it doesn't appear in the Battenheim records it was found with the Oldenburg church records. (These are on microfilm so we don't know if the page is physically attached to the Oldenburg books. Sister Kennedy has a copy of this page as well.) This is the sort of record that many families made before leaving Europe but normally the family would have kept this page. Why it's in this book is unclear (perhaps Franz Joseph Rudolf II put it there if he really was pastor of Oldenburg around 1892?)
- There was a very old note by Joan "RUDOLF, GEOGES emigrated with wife and 2 children to NY 12/18/54, dob 1799 in Battenheim, Alsace." This must be the same couple, since the emigration

date is one month after the Battenheim page was written. Probably "2 children" is an error, because their oldest child had just turned 18 on that date so it's unlikely the family would separate.

So I am using 12/18/1854 as the immigration date for the four children that we know lived to adulthood, except for Maria Anna Rudolf Landwerlen (who came over three months earlier with her husband).

But even if the whole family did come to Oldenburg, they didn't all stay there. There is no death record of the parents at Holy Family Church. The Lamping family tree gives 12-24-1891 as the death date for both parents, but it doesn't list a city. This website has some errors, but if it's correct that both parents died on the same date there may have been an accident.

In the Battenheim records of her children's births, her name is sometimes listed as "Elisabeth Müller" and sometimes listed as "Marie-Louise Müller." But these aren't two different women, because the Battenheim page that appears in the Oldenburg records clearly shows all the children having the same mother, "M. Elisabeth Müller." (Also, the Lamping family tree lists her as "Mary Elizabeth Müller.") Does this suggests that "Louise" might be a nickname for "Elisabeth" in French?

Her godmother is listed as "Elizabeth Müller." This doesn't make sense — that's her mother's name. Perhaps it was her mother's sister (Franziska Müller) and the priest mis-wrote it because he had already just written the mother's name?

Sr. Kennedy (Aloha's notes p. 3) records that she became a nun and took the name Sister Veronica. But she died just before her 22nd birthday.

Franz Joseph Rudolph OFM — nephew of the first one Per Oldenburg records, he was ordained 5/4/1867. Became pastor of St. Gabriel's Church in Connersville, Indiana. He made at least occasional visits elsewhere — for example, he baptized Mary Magdalena Landwerlin in Shelby County, Indiana, in 1873. He also signed a marriage record in Oldenburg in June 1892. (This is only one year after the date of his parents' death, according to the Lamping web page, but there is no record of their death in the Oldenburg books.) He built a new church (St. Vincent's) in 1880 — it celebrated its silver jubilee in 1905, and there's a photo of this event in Aloha's papers p. 16. By then, the pastor was Fr. Joseph Bauer, and Fr. Rudolf was retired. From the photo it appears that the church was still run by the Franciscans. Franz Joseph Rudolf II died 7/18/1906 in Connersville. Funeral in Connersville 7/20. Modern-Day Rudolphs (Connection Uncertain)

Delores Rudolph:

Joan Hurst (later Joan King) knew Delores Rudolph in grammar school plus one year of high school. Later, Lorraine (Rainie) Cappell knew her too. She was related to the famous Father Rudolph and to the Hursts, but no one knew how. She married Mr. Scheid.

Delores died around 2000. Rainie recently contacter her husband, but he's not interested in genealogy.

Delores Rudolph isn't in any of these pages on the web. Perhaps her father is – but I don't know his name.

Landwerlens in Indiana

Landwerlen is connected to Rudolph by marriage; Rudolph is connected to Müller by marriage; Müller is connected to Hurst by marriage. Therefore, all Landwerlens from Generation 8 onward are distant cousins of the Rudolphs and the Hursts.

He was born in Baldersheim in 1830 or 1831:

- His birthplace is given as "Baldersheim" in Aloha's papers p. 4, and as "Battenheim" on p. 13. The mention of Battenheim is surely a mix-up because that is his wife's home and where he moved as an adult
- His birthdate is given as 10/28/1830 on pp. 5, 7, 11, 13. The census (p. 9) suggests a date of 1831.
- However, the Battenheim church record of his marriage gives his birthdate as 10/27/1831 in Baldersheim.
- If we want to find out for sure, we have to check the Baldersheim church records for his birth.

According to the Landwerlen records (pp. 4-7) he was born in Baldersheim, and started out as a farmer. He studied for the priesthood briefly but gave it up because he couldn't afford to pay for seminary.

He "went as a substitute in the rebellion" (pp. 6-7) — we have no idea what this means. "The rebellion" is probably the Revolution of 1848, although he was only 16 or 17 years old then.


Jean Landwerlen married Maria Anna Rudolf on 9/3/1854, when their first child was already a few months old — the marriage is recorded in the Battenheim church records (F304). This date is also given in Aloha's papers p. 4. However, pp. 6-7 give a _false_ marriage date of 7/2/1853 — this is exactly nine months before the birth of their first child, and is therefore a "polite lie" to avoid embarrassing the family. A different false date of 9/5/1853 appears on p. 3.

Maria's family emigrated to America in December 1854. However, she and Jean came over three months before that. Aloha's records p. 5 ("Alsace Emigration Book," Volume 1) lists "Landwerlen, Jean, with wife and child" who came to New York 9/18/1854. Even though it gives his birth year as 1832, this is certainly him — Baldersheim is too small a village to have two different Jean Landwerlens born around 1831, both of whom immigrated with their wife and one child in 1854! Therefore they must have been married in Battenheim just a few days before leaving France.

Jean and Maria settled first in Indiana (probably in Oldenburg, with her family). Based on the birth sites of their children, we know that they lived in Indiana through at least 1857. Then they moved to Iowa, and lived there at least between 1861 and 1863. In 1863 or 1864 they moved back to Indiana and settled in Shelby County.

Jean and Maria (now "John" and "Mary") became citizens 3/17/1870. John is listed as a farmer in the 1900 census.

We know that they stayed in contact with their relatives in Oldenburg. For example, their daughter born in 1867 had Vincenz (Vincent) Hurst as her godfather, and their daughter born in 1873 was baptized by Fr. Franz Joseph Rudolf II.



She married Mr. Renner, moved to Lawrence KS, and had ten children (see Aloha papers pp. 6, 17).

The notes on p. 6 suggest he moved to Kansas in 1885, and died in 1913 — but p. 14 says he died 8/30/1912.

After her husband's death, she moved back with her parents and lived there until their deaths.

From Mom's reading of the Oldenburg tombstones (1597595 = F200) and the Oldenburg records (1535799 and 1535800 = F201 to F209):

Joseph, died 4/8/1891 in Oldenburg, husband of Anna Maria nee Laker. 36 years old. (Not son of Joseph and Catherine nee Rudolph.)

Anna Maria, nee Laker, died 4/7/1891 in Oldenburg, wife of Joseph, 31 years old. (Not the daughter-in- law of Joseph and Catherine nee Rudolph.)

Catherine, daughter of Joseph and Anna Maria nee Laker, died 11/19/1894, 16 years old.

Rosa, daughter of Joseph and Maria nee Laker. died 5/21/1897 in Laurensburg (per in Oldenburg records), 11 years old.

Peter, husband of Maria nee Klein. Died 9/6/1930 in Oldenburg, age 73. Buried 9/9/30 in Oldenburg.

Eleanor, daughter of Peter and Mary nee Klein. Died 10/28/1981 in Oldenburg, age 80.

Maria Anna, daughter of John and Eva Barborse, born 9/5/1853 in Oldenburg.

Elizabeth Pistner, married George Etter. Their son was Jacob Etter, born 6/7/1892 in Oldenburg, who married Mary Magdalene Rudolph -- these last two names are in the family tree file above.
