# WHO GAME TO HENDRICKS COUNTY, INDIANA IN 1833, AND OF HIS DECENDANTS TO 1933.

#### By Cyrus Masten.

As far as known all the Mastens in America are decended from John Masten, an Englishman, who came from Holland to New York, probably as a soldier in the Dutch Service, about 1640. All the Mastens in Hendricks County are descendants of Mathias and Sarah Stanley Masten, who came to this county in 1833 from Stokes, now Fors ythe County, North Caroling. In studying and compiling the history and genealogy of the family, and tracing the descent of Mathias Masten, we have received our information from old records, and from local history of the early settling of New York, Delaware, North Carolina, and Indiana. Copies of the old records and history have been furnished us by and through the kindness of Arthur H. Masten, an attorney of New York City, and a member of the Holland Society of New York; John Mathias Masten of Washington City who was connected with the United States Post Office for more than than forty years; J. Gilmer Korner, an attorney of Washington City who was appointed by President Coolidge in 1923 as a member of the first Board of U. S. Tax Appeals; James P. Masten of Coatesville, Pennsylvania; his sister Miss Rhoda Masten, Superintendent of the Public Schools of Coswald, Delaware; Mrs. Alice Masten Korner of Kornersville, North Carlonia; Mrs, Blanche Armfield Pickens of High Point, North Carolina, and others.

Arthur H. Masten wrote that he had learned from the Old Dutch Church Records and from local history of the first settling of New York, that John Masten, an Englishman, came to New York from Holland, probably as a soldier in the Dutch Service, and settled in Flushing. His name is spelled in the old records in many ways. His name appears in the records of the Old Dutch Church as sponser for two children" christianed" in 1644. He is named one of the Patentees in Govener Keith's Patent October 19, 1645. He married a Dutch woman named Dievertje Jans. They had five children, named John, Cornelius, Elizabeth, Trange and Ezekiel. John, the oldest child settled in Flushing, and appeared to have taken the name of Marston. Cornelius settled in Kingston, Ulster County, New York, and took the name Masten. He was married there. in 1676. He had two sons and several daughters. His oldest son, Johannes, was baptised there March 31, 1670.(?) The other son, names William, appears to have settled in Delaware. Arthur H. Masten said that he had traced his descent to Johannes.

John Mathias Masten wrote that he found in the Congressional Library, in the Records of the Early Settlers of Ulster County, New York, by Garrett H. Van Wagman, published in New York Genealogical and Biographical Records, Volume XX, the Masten Family

#### reading as follows:

"John Masten or Marston was an Englishman, who probably came to this country as a soldier in the Dutch Service, His name appears as Mast, Maste, Masten, Mastin, Maston and Marston. His son, who settled in Flushing, appeared to have adopted the name of Marston, while Cornelius, who settled in Kingston, took the name Masten. February 8, 1644 John Maste, soldier, is sponser for Jan, child of Hannah Backens. He settled in Flushing and is named in Governer Keith's patent (Dutch) October 19, 1645.

The will of John Ma. ten recorded in New York Liber I, page 116- February 14, 1670. Administration granted to John Hinchman April 16, 1671. Children of John Masten and Dievertje Jans: Jan, born November 4, 1653, m-November 19, 1677; Cornelius; Elizabeth, born June 3, 1657, m- March 21, 1674; Trange; Ezeliel.

Some time after I became interested in the family history I saw in a newspaper the name of James P. Masten, Dover Delaware. I had learned that our fore-parent, Mathies Masten, his brothers, John, Philip, and Stephen and sisters, Elizabeth and Mary, of whom we had learned, were born and grown to manhood and womanhood in Kent County, Delawars. I wrote him and asked him to tell me of his family and ancestors. In due time I received a reply from him and his sister, Miss Rhoda Masten. They said they had talked with the older ones of the family, had copied entries in old Family Bibles, gone to Hollywood cemetary in Morristown and the Presbyterian Church Yard in Dover and copied inscriptions on tombstones and secured what information they could, From the information they then had they prepared and sent us a fairly complete record and history of their family and ancestors from their Great-grandfather, James Polk Masten, born in Kent County Delaware, October 13, 1773, down to the present. As our greatgrandfathers were born in the same county and near the same time, we concluded they were brothers. lowever we learned later they were first o usins. They could learn nothing further back, but were much interested in our research. We continued our correspondence. In 1924 James P. wrote me and said if I could visit him, we would go down to Dover and Harrington, and make a thorough investigation of the records and visit the older ones of the family. He said there are many Mastens and relatives of the Mastens living in and around Harrington. James P. was then living near Coatesville, Chester County, Pennsylvania. Cousin Alice Masten Korner of Kornersville, North Carolina was interested with me in our research work. I told her of my correspondence with the folks in Delaware and what I had Isarned of the Masten family there. She sent my letters to her son, J. Gilmer Korner, an attorney at Washington. He immediately got in communication with James P. Masten and arranged to visit him. They then went to the home of James P. 's two sisters, Rhoda and Mary at Coswald, Delaware. Miss Rhoda is Superintendent of the schools at Coswald.

From there Rhoda went with them to Herrington where they spent a few days visiting the Mastens and relatives, and met many of them. All were much interested in his work. He found however that they knew but little of the family history back of a hundred years, so that he could learn from them but little more of the early history of the family than we already knew. He said however, he secured copies of entries in old Family Bibles and from inscriptions on tombstones in Hollywood Cemetery in Harrington and the Presbyterian Church Yard in Dover, that proved to be of much assistance in his work thereafter. They then went to Dover and he and Rhoda spent three days searching through the Records in the Office of Register of Deeds in the Court House and made a roster of all warrants, patents, deeds, wills, and letters of administration in which the Masten name appears. \*

In his will, Mathias Masten names his wife, Hester, and eleven children. Hester was his second wife. The children of his first wife were Elizabeth, John, Mathias, Hanna, and Mary. The names of Hester's children were Rachel, Philip, Sarah, Stephen, Ruth, and Zachariah. Hester's children were young when their father died. Elizabeth, John, and Mathias had been living in North Carolina about fifteen years. Hannah married a man named Allen. Mary married a man named Wingate. She had two daughters. Her family moved to Washington, Daviess County, Indiana about 1828, where she died, and is buried in the old Cemetery at that place. After their mother's death the daughters left there, and we have learned no more of them. Of Hester's three daughters we have learned nothing but their names. Uncle Eli Masten and Mathias (Mgt) Mastentold me about two brothers, Atwell and Daniel Cane, and some sisters named McIntyre who visited here many years ago. They were first cousins to Grandfather John. There homes were in Delaware. We suppose they were children of Hester's daughters. Zachariah, the youngest child of Mathias and Hester, died in 1808, when he was 20 years pld. Philip, the oldest son of Hester, was born November 2, 1779. He was a soldier in the second was with Great Britain, and served under General Jackson. Philip lived for a time in Chillicothe, Ohio. Andrew Jackson, when going from the Hermitage, his home in Tennessee, to Washington to be inaugurated President of the United States in 1829, stopped in Chillicothe and spent the night in the home of Philip Masten. A great-granddaughter of Philip told me she remembered hearing her grandmother, Sarah Masten Martin, tell about sitting on Andrew Jackson's knees, and hearing him tell about his Indian Campaigns. In 1830, Philip with his wife, two daughters and one son moved to Washington, Daviess County, Indiana where he died January 1, 1841. He is buried in the Old Cemetery at that place. Some of his descendants still live in the southwestern part of Indiana. Stephen, the other son of Hester was born in 1785. In 1828, with his family, he moved from Kent County, Delaware to Daviess County, Indiana. Here he engaged in flat-boating, hauling the products of the country down the rivers to New Orleans. While on one of these trips he died on the boat in New Orleans of cramp-colic (possibly of appendicites) in May 1842. He was the grandfather of John M. Masten who was connected with the United States Post Office Department for more than forty years.

Elizabeth, oldest child of Mathias Masten, was born in Kent County, Delaware, in 1758. She married a man named Griffin. He lived but a short time after. She married Richard Clampet in 1778. The next year they went to North Carolina and located in Guilford County, near Kernersville. They had four children, named Jane Elizabeth, Richard, Dinah and John. Jane Elizabeth married Nicholas Talley in 1817. They had eleven children. Many of their descendents live in Forsythe and Guilford Counties. Richard Jr. was a seldier in the War of 1813 in the 3nd North Carolina Regiment. He never married. He became wealthy and died in Raleigh during the war between the States. His heirs never knew what became of his estate. John, youngest son of Elizabeth, left Carolina when young and the folks back there never knew much more about him. He came to Hendricks County, Indiana and located on land northwest of Stilesville. Here he reared a family of three sons, Albert, Richard and John, and two daughters, Phoebe and Elizabeth. Albert married Mary Page. They had one son, Marcus, born March 23, 1850. He married Mary Whitlow. They had three children, Albert, Henry and Minnie. Albert married Emma Hollingsworth, and they have one child, Grace. They live in Detroit, Michigan. Henry married Blanch Russel, and they had two boys, Christopher and John. Minnie married George McCloud and they had three children, Mitchel, Robert and Bernise. Mitchel married Anna Maxwell, died in 1930, left one son Paul Robert, born in 1928. Richard married Catherine Orth. They had four daughters, Mary, Anna, He was a soldier in the Civil War and re-Frances, and Florence. turned home very much disabled. A few years later he moved to Iowa. Phoebe married Ben Tincher . Elizabeth married Lewis West. They had two children, Rosa and Lee. Lewis West died in Libby Prison. Elizabeth later married Marion Davidson and they moved to Iowa. John, the youngest child of this family, was a captain in the United States Army and was stationed on the Kansas Border at the beginning of the Rebellion. He was captured by the rebels but escaped. I remember hearing him tell how he escaped and swam the Mississippi River five thmes to get away from his captors. After the war he came back to Hendricks County and remained a few years. He left here and ir was never known what became of him. He told his sister Elizabeth he was going back to the army. That was the last his folks ever saw or heard of him. In the report of the Custer Massacre the name of John C. Clampet was in the list of slain. If it were this John Clampet, it was never verified.

Richard Clampet Sr. died December 8,1820. Elizabeth married Ruben Shields. She died October 20, 1849, aged 91 years. She and her two last husbands are buried in the Old Muddy Creek Graveyard, an old Friends Graveyard near Kenersville, North Carolina.

John, oldest son of Mathias Masten, was born March 23,1761. Soon after the close of the War for American Independence, about 1785, he and his younger brother, Mathias, left Dealware and started south in search of warmer country. They stopped in Wachovia, North Carolina, three miles east of the Old German Moravian settlement, Salem. They bought land of the Moravians. John's land lay on the high land on the north side of a large basin of swamp land

known as the bottom land along the Middle Fork of Muddy Creek, called the Wach. Mathias land lay on the south side of the bottom land. They built them a log house on John's land, a short distance back from and well to the west end of the bottom land, and began the work of making their farms. Soon after they came here they were robbed of everything they had; food, clothing, bedding and all. About two years after they came here john was united in marrage with Elizabeth Stanley, daughter of Ruben Stanley. This union was blessed with six children, Mary, Rhoda, Mathias, William, Joseph and Matilda. In the fall of 1799 John bought of Fred William Marshall 106 acres of the bottom land on the north side of the creek joining his other land for 85 pounds and 8 shillings. Mathias bought of the same man 29 acres on the south side of the creek joining his other land for 30 pounds. All this land which was now owned by the brothers was continuously in the posession of the Masten Family until 1932 when the bottom land and some of the surrounding high land was sold to the city of Winston-Salem. A concrete dam about 100 feet long and 26 feet high was erected across the lower end making of this bottom land an artificial lake covering about 300 acres from which the city derives its water supply. James R. Masten told me that for many years, more than 3000 acres lying east of Winston-Salem all belonged to the Masten Family. Henry Masten told me, in June 1932, that more than 1500 acres now belongs to decendents of John and Mathias Maston.

Mathias, the younger one of the brothers who went from Delaware to North Carolina, was born in Kent County, Delaware, March 9, 1765. His boyhood days were spent on his father's farm. Washington with his army was going down across the country to attack Cornwallis at Yorktown, Mathias joined the army and fought in the battle of Yorktown in October 1781 when he was but 16 years old. He told his grandchildren about picking a spent ball out of his captain's breast with his pocket knife. Mathias was but a youth when he went to Carolina and lived with his brother several years. December 9, 1794, when he was near 30 years old, he was married to Sarah Stanley, a sister of Elizabeth, John's wife. He was ten years her senior. He built them a home near the edge of the swamp land, well to the west end, on the lower part of a long slope that extends back to the south several hundred yards. This is now owned by the city of Winston-Salem and has been lying idle for several years. It is covered with a growth of grass, briers, grapevines and shrubbery of various kinds.

We searched the records of the Moravian Land Office in Winston-Salem and other offices but failed to find any records giving the date, number of acres and price paid, of the first purchase of John and Mathias Masten.

"The ninth day of November, one thousand seven hundred ninety nine, Mathias masten bought of Frederic William Marshall that part of the Bottom Land lying between the creek and his other land. The following is a copy of the deed received by him for the land."

In a letter, dated November 14, 1842, written by him to his oldest son, Darius, at Salem, Stokes County, North Carolina, he tells of some of the trials and hardships of the early settlers of Indiana.

#### State of Indiana, Hendricks County, November 14, 1843.

I received a letter from thee on the 10th of this month dated July 17, 1842, which is the first T have had for a long time. I have written to thee both by private and by mail but it seems thee could not have gotten them. I have been low and am so yet so that I can hardly sit to write. Thy mother is scarcely able to get about. Charlotte and David are both well——— Stephen Masten died last May and he is the last of my stepmother's children. His son Mathias came to visit this fall and my sister Mary was then living.

We had a good season here for cropping. Wheat was good, also the oats. My oats were from six to seven feet high and stood up well, but the wheat was much tangled . We have a great mast both of beech and oak, and hogs are full and fat. I have twenty hogs that I want to sell but the highest price that I am offered is one dollar and twentyfive cents, and that in script, good on Illinois and that is fifty cents below par so it is but sixty two and a half cents per hundred. Wheat is worth twenty five cents per bushel and corn ten cents and everything else is low accordingly ---- Fruit is plentiful. I had peaches a plenty and apples that is of much better sort than I had there. I have four kinds of plums among which are the German plums. It grows as large as a peach and the best thee ever saw. Also two kinds of grapes, ---- The first week in this month was so warm that one could scarcely wear their clothes but on the 6th there fell a snow about shoe deep and on the 11th about as much more and it has been cloudy ever since so that it is melting but little.

David and I have lost about two hundred dollars in actual cash for property sold. Some run away some take insolvent oaths and some have taken the bankruptcy law. I sold a good deal of honey at six and three fourths cents a pound. Two men wanted trust for a day or two and now I can't get that, also the same men bought a good chance of bacon and paid me nothing, but that is gone. But the hogs I sold two years ago I expect to get paid for some time for I got a note of William Hayworth and I think he is honest. But the law is so here that you can't collect money but must take property at two thirds its value or wait till they pay. Hezekiah Johnson bought a lot in Stilesville and I traded for the note and when I say pay, he is just like the rest—here is the property take it. But I think it won't always be the law.

Most of our storekeepers are all broken up, most of our trading men and a great many more. All the cry is money and it can to be had. There are but two stores in this county except little petty ones. This summer has been very hot but not like last summer. We had light showers to make corn. I should guess that we shall not have less than 700 or 800 bushels this summer.

I must conclude for I have been two days writing this. I don't know when I shall write again. I don't know when this will be mailed.

Mathias Masten

Address Darius Masten, Joseph Bodenhammer, Salem, Stokes County, North Carolina.

Here Mathias and Sarah Masten lived for thirty seven years and reared a family of nine children, all of whom lived to be men and women except one son, Mathias, who died July 30, 1820. at the age of 10 years, 8 months, and 22 days. In 1832, with his wife and youngest children, Charlotte and David, left his here and moved to Daviess County, Indiana. His sister, Mary Wingate, and two brothers, Philip and Stephen, with their families, came to Daviess County about the same time. He remained here one year then came to Hendricks County and located onland just south of where Coatesville now is, which he had entered from the Government. He lived here the rest of his long life. The old home place is now occupied by the Coatesville Cemetery. He was a member of the Friends Church, a devoted Christian man of strong mind and firm character and good education. He must have been a man of remarkable physicial constitution to have endured the trials and hardships that were the lot of the early pioneer. In a letter dated November 14, 1842 written by him to his oldest son, Darius, at Salem, Stokes County, North Carolina, he tells of some of the trials and hardships

of the early settlers of Indiana. See above letter)

Mathias Masten Jr., son of Mathias Masten Sr., and his first wife, was born in Kent County, Delaware, March 9,1765, one of a family of eleven children, all of whom lived to be men and women. A soldier in Washington's army, he fought in the battle of Yorktown in October 1781, the decisive battle of the war for American Independence, when he was sixteen years old. When twenty years old he left Delaware and started south in search of a warmer country. (Probably walking or on horseback, through a wild and partly unbroken country.) He stopped in Wachovia, North Carolina, bought land of the Moravians and made a farm. On December 9,1794, when he was 29 years and 8 months old, he was married to Sarah Stanley, daughter of Reuben Stanley. She was 18 years, 6 months, and 18 days old when married. He built them a home and they lived in it 37 years and reared a family of nine children, all of whom lived to be men and women except one son. In 1832 they left this home and came to Indiana, first to Daviess County, then to Hendricks. It was said that he left Carolina on account of slavery. He died in Hendricks County on November 9, 1856, at the age of 91 years and 8 months. Sarah Stanley Masten was born in Surrey County, North Carolina, June 27, 1775, and died in Hendricks County December 15, 1862 at the age of 87 years, 5 months, and 18 days. They lived together 61 years and ll months. Their bodies were laid to rest back in the orchard on the old home farm. Their graves were marked with suitable tombstones at the time, but in after years these were broken by accident. In 1925 their descendents had placed on their graves a substantial monument with appropriate inscriptions thereon that will tell future generations when their fore-parents lived and died, and that their fore-father was a soldier in the War for American Independence.

Thus we have a short sketch of the life of Mathias Masten, one of the pioneers of Stokes County, North Carolina, and Hendricks County, Indiana.

We are sorry we could not learn more of our Great Grandfather. An account of his travels from Delaware to North Carolina, and from North Carolina to Indiana would certainly be interesting reading. But it is too late.

Mathias Masten Jr. was of the sixth generation, descended from John Masten, the Dutch Soldier, who came to America from Holland about 1640. His children are of the seventh generation. He was the father of nine children, six sons and three daughters. Their names were Darius, Mary, John, Hezekiah, Reuben S., Sarah, Mathias, Charlotte and David. Hezekiah, born May 6, 1801 was engage edto be married and was building his house. The lady to whom he was engaged to be married was stricken with typhoid fever. He went to help care for her and contracted the disease and died November 4, 1826. Mathias, born October 11, 1809 died July, 1820. Charlotte, born June 1, 1812 came to Indiana with her parents when 20 years old. She married Morgan Johnson when about 40 years old, died February She left no children. 4, 1889.

Darius, the oldest child of Mathias and Sarah Masten was born September 21, 1795. He first married Phoeba Stanley, a first cousin. They had one child. The mother died when the child was young. The child died soon after, Through the child Darius inherited and became the owner of slaves. It was said that that was why he did not come to Indiana when the others of the family came. He would not sell his slaves and could not free them nor bring them with him. He never bought nor sold a slave, but kept them till they were freed by Lincoln's Froclamation. He was the only one of Mathias descendents who ever owned a slave. Darius and Mary Fair were married February 6, 1821. They lived near the old home place of his father. They were the parents of six sons and two daughters. Four of these died young. John F., born April 17, 1823 died March\_\_\_, 1825; Malvina, born January 11, 1829 died in infancy; Dorothy, born February 8, 1830 died July 27, 1848; and Henry, born July 27, 1839 died October 31, 1849. The other children's names were Mathias, Hezekiah, Robert and Darius Alexander. Darius Masten died January 1, 1858. He was buried in the Masten or Middle Fork Burial Grounds. Mary Fair Masten was born May 5, 1795 and died July 8, 1873. She and her daughter are

buried in the Crews Grave Yard.

Mathias, oldest child of Darius and Mary Masten was born December 3, 1821. He was one of the most prominent and widely known men in that part of North Carolina. In politics he was a Republican and an ardent Union supporter. He was never defeated for office. He was elected Sheriff of Forsythe County in 1862, and was reelected for five consecutive terms. He was serving his twelfth year as sheriff when he died at two o'clock A.M., Thursday, February 27, 1873. He was Colonel of the Home Guard Regulars before the war." When permitted no longer to muster his Regiment under the Stars and Stripes, he took the Old Flag to his home where it was cherished and revered as a relic of the Revalution. It was the shrine at which many a patriotic tear was shed. During the four years of horrid war to destroy the Union, his home was the resort of Patriotic Unionists who revered the Flag of their country. He was one of a committee of five Southern Unionists who at the risk of being sent to Castle Thunder, or some other Castle, opened a correspondence with leading men in other parts of the State with the view of testing public sentiment by petition and thereby induce the Governor with the Legislature to call a state convention to relieve North Carolina from the dire ruin secession had precipitated on the country. In the death of Mathias Masten, Forsythe County mourns the loss of one of her most gifted sons. Self made and without the advantage of a liberal education, but possessing great acuseness of intellect

popularity of manner and a large fund of information he was an able debater, popular speaker and formidable politition as many a political opponent learned to his sorrow on the hustings. On Friday the 28th his remains were followed to their last resting place in Middle Fork Burial Grounds amid an immense concourse of Sympathetic friends and acquaintences". (THE UNION REPUBALICAN, March 6, 1873)

Mathias Masten and Catherine Masten, his second cousin, daughter of Willia and Lucy Richards Masten, were united in marriage February 10, 1848. To this union were born six children. Their names were John Henry, Lucy, Millard Filmore, Poly Alice, Parthenia Victoria, and David. David was born May 3, 1868 and died February 5, 1869. Catherine Masten was born April 4, 1825 ?

and died June 21, 1893.

John Henry, born November 2, 1848 married Martha Ann Tise. He was engaged in the mercantile business in Winstom-Salem. They were the parents of six children. Mathias, born August 1, 1873; Ida, born September 16, 1875, died October 3, 1878; Jacob, born October 15, 1877, died June 3, 1879; Arthur, born July 6, 1879 died April 15, 1882; Edgar, born February 15, 1883 died April 8, 1883; Henry Purl, born June 27, 1884 died October 7, 1917. John Henry Masten died April 6, 1885. He and his wife and six children are buried in a private plot in Salem Cemetery. Mathias, only child of John Henry who lived to have a family married Marion Lewis. Their children are Lucy, born January 13, 1893; Ida Louise, born August 8, 1894; Alice Victoria, horn June 2, 1896; Marion, born June 30, 1898; John Henry, born September 39, 1899 and Margaret Pauline; born July 5, 1904. Ida Louise married Beverly Kyle Millaway. Their children are Beverly Kyle Jr., born November 21, 1915, and George Masten, born February 12, 1920. Marion Masten married T.C. Millaway. John Henry married Ola Knouse. Children were Henry Mathias, born January 2, 1924 and Robert William born July 5. 1925. Mathias Masten died June 14, 1919, aged 45 years, 10 months, and 13 days.

Lucy, oldest daughter of Mathies and Catherine Masten, was born October 30, 1841. She and John C. Sprach were married December 27, 1881. They had three children: Mary Kate, born September 27, 1883; Allie V. born August 12, 1887; and William H., born January 11, 1891. Mary Kate married Charles L. Creech. Their children are Charles L. Jr., born April 27, 1908, married

Mary Kate, born April 7, 1910; and John Spach, born July 11, 1914. William H. Spach married Evalyn Toms. Their children are Lucy Elizabeth, born in 1922; Mary Evalyn, born in 1924; William H. Jr., born July 4, 1925; and Susie born July 25, 1926. Jean C. Spach died March 21, 1928. He was owner and manager of the South Side Furniture Factory and South Side Wagon Factory located between Waughtown Street and Sprague Street, and now owned by his son,

William H. Spach and son-in-law Charles L. Creech.

Millard F., son of Mathias and Catherine, was born October 17, 1853. October 5, 1875 he and Josephine Tucker were married. They had three sons: Henry William, born September 26,1876:
Edmond Tucker born September 24, 1878, died January 14,1914; and
Tommy born September 2, 1880, died September 28, 1880. The mother
died November 30, 1880. Millard married Lena Lindsay December 10,
1890. They had one daughter, Lydia Katherine, born September 10,
1894. Lena Lindsay Masten died May 2, 1923. In August 1923 Millard

and James R. Masten visited their relatives in Indiana. While here he was taken sick but as soon as he was able they returned home to Winstom-Salem where he died October 34, 1923. He and his wives are buried in Salem Moravian Graveyard. John, second son of Mathias and Sarah Masten, was born April 2, 1799. In 1819 he and Sarah Cosner, daughter of John and Abigail Cosner, were married. They lived for thirteen years five miles east of Winston-Salem, a short distance north of the Winston-Salem and Kernersville Road. In 1832 he, Anthony Cosner and Frederic Whicker, with their families, left North Carolina and came to Wayne County, Indiana. Nathan Pike, an uncle of Anthony Cosner, and sisters had come from North Carolina to Wayne County a few years before. The Whicker ramily came on to Hendricks County. To Cosner Family remained in Wayne County three years. John Masten, with his family, remained in Wayne County one year and raised a crop, then came on to Hendricks County. The family then consisted of the father, mother and seven children. They settled in the woods on the Middle Fork of Mill Creek one mile south of where Amo now is, on land he had entered from the Government. He built a log house in which they lived four years. They had to build a fire at night in front of the door to keep the wolves out. John and Abigail Cosner and their other children and their families came from North Carolina to Hendricks County a few years before. In 1837 he built the brick house in which they lived 30 years and reared a family of eleven children, nine boys and two girls, all of whom lived to be men and women. Three children died young. In 1867 he built a house near Amo, on the old Cosner Farm, which he then owned, and moved to it, where he died January 25, 1871 at the age of 71 years, 9 months, and 23 days. He said he was going to move to town and quit hard work, but he could not do it. Neighbors said the fall before he died, he would go down to his lower farm to gather corn and have to wait for it to get light enough to see before he could commence to work. Sarah Masten was born January 21, 1801, and died April 28, 1891 at the age of 90 years, 3 months and 7 days. They are buried in the Masten Cemetery, on the old Cosner Farm, near Amo. When this cemetery was started by John Masten it was intended to be a Family Burial Grounds. The first person buried there was a son, Reuben, aged 21 years and 3 months, a Union Soldier who died in Indianapolis July 23, 1863.

John Masten was a hard working, industrious and successful farmer and a good business man, and succeeded in accumulating con-

siderable property.

His children were of the eighth generation. Emanuel, Mary Frances, David, Hannah, John, Phoeba, William, Mathias, Cyrus, Ely, Corry, Sarah Jane, Reuben, and Nathan. Thre of the children died young. Phoeba, born September 23, 1839, died of hemorrhage of the nose, March 27, 1839. Corry, born February 2, 1839, died March 3, 1899; Sarah Jane, born March 12, 1840, died August 9,1841. Mary Frances was born June 1, 1823, married Edward Jurd, June 15, 1856, went to Missouri soon after and died there in 1857. Reuben, next to the youngest child, was born May 23, 1842. He enlisted in Company B, 117 Regiment Indiana Volunteers in the spring of 1863. While yet in camp at Indianapolis he was drowned trying to save the life of a compade. He was to have been married in a short time to a neighbor girl, Miss Mary Hine. He was drowned July 23, 1863 at the age of 21 years and 3 months.

Emanuel was born November 5, 1820. He was 12 years old when his family came to Indiana. He said he walked all the way and carried a gun on his shoulder. When He was 21 years old he rode a three year old colt to the place where Kansas City now is, and back home. He taught school some when young. He was interested in fruit

growing and for many years was engeged in the nursery business. June 1, 1852, he was married to Barbars Ann Fittse. They had six children, Phoeba Ellen, Sara Jane, Martha Ann, Oliver Crowell, born March 9, 1857, died July 17, 1863, Laura Alice, born March 13, 1859, died July 7, 1863, and Barbara Elizabeth. The young wife and mother died April 8, 1861 at the age of 29 years, 8 months, and 23 days, leaving the father to care for the little ones. The mother and two little ones are buried in the Cemetery at Stilesville. Emanuel died March 2, 1895. He is buried in the Masten Cemetery near Amo.
