

James McCoun , born 1717, (son of James McCoun and Molly Campble) came from Antrim Co., Ireland to Virginia when a young man, landed at Norfolk in 1742. Married in 1744 Margaret Walker, who came to America about the same time with her sister Mary and brother Samuel Walker. They ^{liv} lived with their uncle Thomas Clark, father of Gen. George Rogers Clark. She was said to be a "remarkably handsome neat Irish girl". James McCoun and Margaret left their habitation on Catawba & Sinking Creek, Bottetourt Co., Va., Aug. 17, 1779, and started with all their families and property packed on horses, and came through the wilderness path(crossing at Cumberland Gap) to Kentucky. and on Oct. 1, arrived at James McAfee's spring on Salt River, Mercer Co., Ky. James McCoun's will is recorded in Will Bk. 2nd pages 199,200,201, Dated Apr. 26, 1800, Probated Oct. Court 1800. He died Oct. 4, 1800 , 83 years old, Margaret died June 3, 1784 and Rev. David Rice preached her funeral. In Register of the Ky. State Hist. Society, Vol 25, No 73 " Life and Time of Robert B. McAfee" he states on page 9 " My grandfather James McCoun was a person of ordinary size, about 5ft. 9or 10 inches high, heavy made, and became fleshy before he died in 1800. Grey eyes heavy eyebrows, finely rounded forehead, a man of extraordinary strong mind, with a great fund of cheerfulness and good humor in which the Irish character predominated. He was an excellent farmer and great economist and fond of his friends and much attracted to his sons, especially the eldest. He could never get clear of his idea of primogeniture and was a Presbyterian of the Seceder denomination.

John McCoun, son of James McCoun and Susannah McCoun, and grandson of James McCoun and Margaret Walker. was named in both the wills of his father and grandfather.

Married in Mercer Co., Ky., Aug. 14, 1793, Nancy Slaughter, her father Robert Slaughter gives consent.

We know that John McCoun was dead by Oct. 23, 1802 because in Deed Bk. 5, page 54, Mercer Co., Ky is the following:

" Commrs. for the heirs of John McCoun, deceased, make deed to John Gibson. convey 100 acres to Gibson in exchange for 100 acres in Franklin Co. (McCoun heirs now infants) They were James, Polly, Robert, John and Turley, all of Mercer Co. Samuel McCoun, Esq., their guardian. Witness were David McCoun and Elizabeth McCoun "

Commrs. present were Gabriel Slaughter and Augustine Slaughter. *I have no record of him.*

(Note. Samuel McCoun was a brother of the children's father and the Gabriel Slaughter and Augustine were uncles on their mother's side. Gabriel Slaughter was Gov. of Ky.)

Leonard Turley McCoun, (son of John and Nancy (Slaughter) McCoun grandson of James McCoun and Susannah McCoun, gr-grandson of James McCoun and Margaret Walker.)

was born Nov. 16, 1800, in Mercer Co. Ky. which shows he was quite an infant at his father's death. This date is taken from our Curd family bible.

He married June 7, 1821 Mercer Co., Ky Sophia Weston Curd, b. 1794 Mercer Co., Ky she died Mar. 1878, daughter of Newton Curd and Ann Elizabeth Hatcher.

Leonard Turley McCoun died Mar. 26, 1822 one month before his only child was born

McAfee Company

In the year 1776-7, the sons of James McAfee Sen. fired by glowing description of beauty & fertility of Ky. resolved to visit Ky James, Ned & Robert and James MacCoun Jr. brother-in-law of Robt McAfee, and Samuel Adams a youth of 18 and cousin of James MacCoun, left their home in Botetourt Co., Va. May 10, 1773 and crossed mountains, struck Kanawha river 4 miles above mouth of Elk River, sent horses back home by 2 boys, John MacCoun and James Paulding. Built 2 canoes and on May 28th descended the Kanawha meeting by previous arrangement Hancock Taylor & Company of surveyors. Proceeded to mouth of river and found Capt Bullitt & Company June 1st. The three parties proceeded from mouth of Kanawha to Ohio & mouth of Limestone Creek where Maysville now stands 4th & 5th of July company spent at Big Bone Lick. On July 15-16 left Brennans Lick and on next day crossed Ky river, below where

McAfee Company

Frankfort now stands and where
Robt McAfee had 2 surveys made
embraced 600 acres and including
Frankfort bottom. Set out again and
on 18th reached Cave Springs. Set
out again in a westerly direction
to Salt River, which they called
Crooked Creek and made their
surveys of 400 acres each up Salt
river about 2 miles from where
Herricksburg now stands. On
July 31st turned their faces
homeward.

JAMES MCCOUN

James McCoun born in Scotland 1717. Died in Mercer County, Ky. 1800. Lived during the Revolution in Virginia.

Margaret Walker, wife of James McCoun, born in Ireland. Died in 1784. Married in 1744. She was the niece of Thomas Clark, the father of Geo. Rogers Clark.

James McCoun was the son of James McCoun, born in Ireland, wife, Nellie Gumble.

Ann McCoun was the daughter of James McCoun, born 1717, died 1800. Ann was born Aug. 1st, 1746. Married 1766.

James McCoun was a member of the McAfee Company in making the first survey in Ky. along the water course of Salt River. He fought in the Battle of the Point and defended the McAfee Station from the Indians. He received fourteen hundred acres of land for military service in the Revolutionary War. The land was entered on Salt River in Mercer Co.

He came from Ireland in 1742 and landed at Norfolk, Va. Came to Mercer Co., in 1773. Was a senior member of the McAfee Company that established McAfee Station. In consequence of continual depredations of the Indians, he went back to Va., but in 1773 he returned to Mercer Co., Ky.

James Maccoun II, (son of James Ist and Margaret Hamilton Maccoun) was born in Linlithgowshire, Scotland, and emigrated with his parents. He married about 1658 Elizabeth Montgomery of Lancashire. He was a soldier under William III and was killed in the Battle of Boyne in 1690, age 33.

James Maccoun III, (son of James Maccoun & Elizabeth Montgomery) born in Linlithgowshire, Scotland in 1660 came to Ireland with his parents and grandparents in 1672. He too was a soldier under William III. He married Mary Campbell of Lochow, Ireland and he was buried Apr. 7th, 1736.

James Maccoun IV, (son of James Maccoun III, and Mary Campbell) born in Macallin Parish, County of Down, Ireland, came to America in 1742. Married Apr. 1744 to Margaret Walker. James died Oct. 4th 1800 in Mercer Co., Ky. Margaret died June 2nd 1784. The Maccoun Family moved from Botetourt Co., Va. in 1779 to Mercer Co., Ky. with the McAffe Company, and settled on Salt River. James Maccoun or McCoun (as some spelled it at that time) served in Capt. Peyton's Company, Third Va. Reg., commanded by Colonel Thomas Marshall and received land grants for this service.

James McCoun V, (son of James IV & Margaret Walker) born Mar. 1st, 1745, served in the Rev. War as Sergeant in the Va. State Line, and as private in Capt. Nathan Howland's company, 14th Va. Regt., enlisting Jan. 16th, 1777. Served 3 years transferring to 10th Va. on March 1778. Moved to Ky. with his family and died in Mercer Co., Ky. in 1790 where his will was probated on Dec. 1790. He married Nancy Tilford.

More about this family may be found in the "Tales of Dark and Bloody Ground," by Jillson on page 34 of this book is Robert B. McAfee's narrative telling how the company of men consisting of James McAfee, George McAfee, Robert McAfee, James McCoun, Jr., and Samuel Adams left their place of residence (May 10, 1773) on Sinking Creek, Botetourt Co., Va. for the purpose of exploring out places for their future residence. All of the above persons were married and had families except Samuel Adams, they were known as the McAfee Company. Explained their route across the country to the New River, (now called the Kanawha river) descended in canoes to it's mouth, down the Ohio to the Kentucky River, up the Ky. to the present site of Frankfort, came to the place where Lawrenceburg now stands, then found the Salt River to Harrodsburg. Then after a time they returned safely home.

In 1775 the same Company with David Adams and John Higgins returned to Ky. Harrodsburg in the meantime had been settled by James Harrod. "In the Fall of this year, William and George McAfee cleared ground near the mouth of Harrodsburg branch and being joined by John McAfee, David Adams, John McCoun, Robert McAfee, and others. A part of this company continued in the county at James McCoun's spring, about one mile North West of New Providence Church, on Salt River, during the winter of 1775."

MURKIN OR McCOUN FAMILY

In May 1776 they attempted to bring their families to Ky., but the war with the Cherokee Indians broke out and they found it too dangerous. So it was not until Aug. 17th, 1779 that they left their habitation of the Catawba and Sinking Creek in Botetourt County, Va., and started with all their families and property packed on horses and came through the wilderness path, (crossing at Cumberland Gap) to Ky. They arrived at James McAffee's spring on Salt River, three-fourths mile from New Providence Church on Oct. 1st, 1779. "James and Samuel McAffee and James McCoun occupied the spring and station."

On page 48. "The people now happy and abundance now smiled around them for several months, but the Indians interrupted their calculations in the year of 1781 (Mar. 6th) and marred the happiness of James McCoun, Sr.'s family and spread gloom over the adjacent settlement and friends.

"Some time about the 6th of Mar. 1781 Joseph McCoun the youngest son of James McCoun, Sr. went out to look after some of the cattle and wolf traps. He was surprised and taken prisoner by the Indians near some gladey ground about one-fourth miles East of the Frankfort road opposite John Meaux and 100 yards North of the road leading to Armstrong's ferry, from Vandike and Bellon Hill. Joseph McCoun was the darling of his father and the favorite of the family. John McCoun was with him at the time and escaped. James McCoun, Sr., was then living at his farm on Salt River below James McAffee's station --- they pursued the Indians in vain --- given up as lost --- later found his body burned to the stake --- all seven families left their farms and moved to the station of James McAffee --- while Gen. Clark conducted an expedition against the Indians---"

On page 52. "While the Indians prepared to attack the station they camped in James McCoun's cabin---"

Page 54. "After the Indians found they could not take the station they commenced to kill the cattle, --- finally were routed. ---"

Also see the Ky. Register, Vol. 25, No. 73 "Life and times of Robert B. McAffee" for much information of his family. Also see Mercer County Court Records, Harrodsburg, Ky.

James McCoun, Sr.'s will probated Oct. 1800, and James McCoun, Jr.'s will probated Dec. 1790. The James McCoun who married Susan McCoun (dau. of James McCoun, Sr.) is also probated in Mercer Co., Ky.

John McCoun, son of James McCoun and Nancy (Ann) Tilford was born about 1760, and died before Nov. 18th, 1800. Court Records in Mercer Co., Ky. show that his estate was appraised on that date. He married in Mercer Co., Ky. Aug. 12th, 1793. The marriage bond was signed by John McCoun and Robert Slaughter. "Conditions of the above obligation is such that whereas there is a marriage shortly intended to be solemnized between the above named John McCoun and Nancy Slaughter for which a license has been issued." The following note is enclosed within the bond: "I do hereby certify my consent that a

licensee shall issue for a marriage intended between John McCoun and my daughter, Nancy Slaughter. Given my hand & seal this 12th day of August 1793. Signed -- Robert Slaughter.
Witness - R. S. Slaughter, Miller Slaughter.

Nancy Slaughter McCoun married the second time in Mercer County Ky. to Thomas Samuel on Sept. 8th, 1804, another marriage bond was given for this marriage signed this time by Thomas Samuel and Charles Slaughter.

Merger Co., Ky. Deed Bk. 5, p. 54, Oct. 23rd, 1809 the Commissioners for the heirs of John McCoun, deceased, make deed to John Gibson, conveying 100 acres of land in Franklin County (McCoun heirs now infants) they were James, Polly, Robert, John, Turley, all of Mercer County, Samuel McCoun, Esq. was their guardian. Witnesses were David McCoun and Elizabeth McCoun.

Merger Co., Ky. Deed Bk. 7, p. 190 May 10th, 1809. This indenture made 10th day of May in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and nine, between John Armstrong, Robert Armstrong, and George Mahfee, commissioners appointed by the County Court of Mercer to convey certain land in the name of the heirs of John McCoun, dcd, viz, James, Robert, Polly, John and Turley; all of the sd. county ---

Will Bk. 5. Page 264 Samuel McCoun, Esq. guardian to the heirs of John McCoun, heirs names, James McCoun, Jr. Robert C. McCoun, John McCoun, Jr., Margaret S. McCoun and Leonard T. McCoun. Commissioners present were--Gabriel Slaughter and Augustine Slaughter.

(Note: Gabriel Slaughter was a brother of Lucy Slaughter who was the mother of Nancy Slaughter, who married John McCoun, therefore he was a great uncle of the infant heirs of John McCoun.) Therefore we find from these court records that the children of John McCoun and Nancy Slaughter were:

1. James McCoun
2. Mary S. McCoun of one record has Margaret S. She married Abner Hagan in Fayette Co., Ky. 9-13-1817.
3. Robert Coleman Slaughter McCoun.
4. John McCoun
5. Leonard Turley McCoun, born Nov. 16th, 1800 (about the time of his father's death.)

Leonard Turley McCoun, son of John McCoun and Nancy Slaughter, born Nov. 16th, 1800, died Mar. 25th, 1882, Mercer Co., Ky. Married in Mercer Co., Ky. June 7th, 1821 to Sophia Weston Curd, who was born Aug. 30th, 1794, died Mar. 1878. Daughter of Weston Curd and Ann Elizabeth Hatcher, of Mercer Co., Ky. (See the Curd Family records for their daughter Rebecca Ann McCoun born (one month after her father's death) April 25th, 1822. Die Mar. 24th, 1901. Married Capt. Robert Slaughter Cope. (1850-1864).)

Leonard Turley McCoun's settlement of estate was made in Mercer Co., Ky. Oct. Court, 1829. Found in Will Book, 5, Page 269. John S. McCoun was administrator.

McCoun or Maccoun Family

Two-thirds went to the infant heir and one-third to his widow.

When Leonard Turley Maccoun and Sophia Curd married, the marriage bond was made by Leonard T. McCoun, and William Wood, but when Leonard T. McCoun signed the bond, he signed it Leonard T. Maccoun. The enclosed note within the marriage bond was found: -- "The Clerk of the Mercer County Court is hereby authorized to issue a license for the marriage of Leonard T. Maccoun, with Sophia Curd," given under my hand and seal this 4th day of June 1821.

The MacCoun Family

1. James MacCoun, the first known ancestor of the Kentucky family of this name, was born in Linlithgowshire Midway between Glasgow and Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1639. His ancestors were Danes, being adventurers into Scotland during the Danish invasion of the 10th Century. He married Elizabeth Montgomery, of the Montgomerys of Lainsaw, was a soldier under William III, and fell at the battle of Boyne, in Ireland, July 1st 1690.

2. James MacCoun[#], junior, born 1660; married his cousin, Mary Campbell, of the Campbells of Lochow.

3. James MacCoun III born 1717, in Antrim Ireland, where his father had settled while a soldier under King William and Mary. He emigrated to Virginia in 1742. Landed at Norfolk, and settled on the Catawba, in Botetourt Co., Virginia. Here he married Margaret Walker, in April 1744. She was a woman of great energy and fine judgement and possessed a strong, beautiful voice.

and, while not permitted to "pitch the tunes" she led the singing at the church at "the Peaks of Otter" in Virginia, of which Rev. David Rice was the Pastor. Mr. Rice came to Kentucky in 1783, June 4, 1784, June 4, 1784, he preached the funeral sermon of Margaret (Walker) MacCoun which was the first sermon ever preached on the banks of Salt River. James MacCoun Senior, was the first Elder of the First Presbyterian Church (New Providence) founded by Mr. Rice in Kentucky (See Davids' Presbyterianism in Kentucky). James MacCoun was a soldier of the Revolution and the senior member of the McAfee Company, which left Botetourt Co., Va. May 10, 1773 and reached Salt River, Mercer Co. Kentucky, July 21, 1773. (beginning of page 229) His will was probated at Harrodsburg Ky. in Oct 1800.

 of the founders of the Hampden-Sidney

He left numerous descendants in Va. & Ky.
