Obituary.

Mrs. Eliza, wife of Mr. Samuel McPheeters, departed this life on their farm, three and one-half miles northwest of this city, Sunday, July 19, '85.

Mrs. McPheeters was the daughter of Dr. Caleb Gerrett, and was born in North Carolina, January 15, 1812. When she was five years old her parents removed to Salem, Washington County, Indiana, where she spent her youth and where she and Mr. McPheeters were married June 5, 1828. Aug. 20, 1829, Dr. Garrett and family and Mr. and Mrs. McPheeters came to this county, making their home in Danville, where the Doctor was an honored citizen and active physician until his lamented death in the year 1831.

Ever since 1829 Mr. and Mrs. McPheeters and family have been residents of Danville or the immediate vicinity.

Mrs. McPheeters was one of the original members of the Danville Presbyterian Church, which was organized about the year 1831, and in the community in which she died.

June, 1878, she with her husband, family and friends, celebrated their golden wedding, so that they lived lovingly together fifty-seven years, one month and fourteen days. Her health recently has been infirm, and owing to advancing age, she has been unable to worship with the people of God, but never lost her interest in religion nor her attachment to the church of her choice.

Seven children, four sons and three daughters, were born to Mr. and Mrs. McPheeters. Two of their sons gave their lives to their country, dying in the army of the Union during the late war, and another has passed away, so that Mr. W. D. McPheeters, who resides near this city, is the only surviving son. The eldest daughter, Margaret Jane, married Wm. McDaniel, and died about five years ago, leaving one son. One of the remaining daughters married Jesse Thompson, and the other Joseph Ousley. Mr. Thompson and family are well known citizens of this place. Mr. Ousley and family reside in Montgomery County, Ind., and were the only immediate relatives unable to be at the funeral. The widow of Mr. McPheeters' youngest son resides at Winchester.

The funeral services were conducted on Tuesday last, by Rev. N. S. Dickey, pastor of the Presbyterian Church in Danville, at the country residence of Mr. McPheeters, where most of the time for thirty years past the deceased had her home. Seats were prepared in the beautiful grove which surrounds the house, where a large concourse of friends and neighbors joined the aged husband and surviving children and grandchildren in the services.

The remains were laid to rest in the beautiful cemetery just south of town. The husband was the senior of this wife about twelve years, and still survives, and though for some years past he has been blind, his mind is vigorous. Coming to Indiana seven years before it became a State, he can tell of Indians and game and early events connected with church and State, in a very interesting way. He has the sympathy of a large circle of friends.

Missionary Concert.

At the Main Street Presbyterian Church, next Sabbath evening, the monthly concert will be observed. The Board of Foreign Missions has assigned the subject: "The North American Indians."

This subject a few months ago was discussed so as to interest a large audience, but it was not exhausted and the programme, which includes an essay from Dr. Lind on the Advanced State of their Civilization, and one from Prof. Spillman on "The Religion of the Indians," and also a paper on some phase of the subject, by Prof. Mallery, and other readings and addresses as time permits, promises a rich treat. All are invited.

The subject of Mr. Dickey's sermon next Sunday morning will be the "First and Last Exodus of the People of God," suggested by the death of Mrs. McPheeters, one of the original members of the church of Danville.
