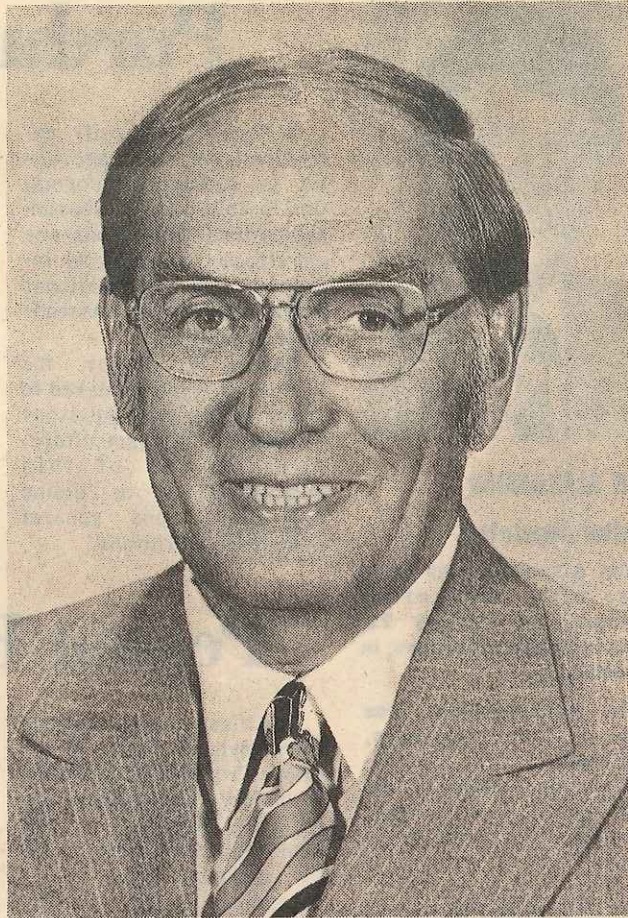

DR. SCAMAHORN INSTALLED AS ACADEMY PRESIDENT

Malcolm O. Scamahorn, M.D., Pittsboro, has been installed as President of the Indiana Academy of Family Physicians at that group's 29th Annual Scientific Session held last week at Stouffer's Inn, Indianapolis.

Dr. Scamahorn, an instructor in the Department of Family Medicine at the I.U. School of Medicine, Indianapolis, was born in Pittsboro in 1918. He attended the I.U. School of Medicine where he received his M.D. degree in 1943.

After serving his internship and residencies at Methodist Hospital in Indianapolis, and two years in the Army Medical Corps, Dr. Scamahorn began the family practice of medicine in Pittsboro in 1947.

On the staffs of Hendricks County Hospital at Danville, and Methodist and St. Vincent's Hospitals in Indianapolis, Dr. Scamahorn is a member of the Hendricks County Medical Society, the Indiana State and American Medical Associations and is a charter member and Fellow of the Indiana and American Academies of Family Physicians.

Dr. Scamahorn has held almost every position in most of these organizations and was formerly president of the Indiana State Medical Association and Treasurer of the Indiana Board of Medical Registration and Licensure. He is presently an Indiana delegate to the American Medical Association.

He is the second generation to serve as president of the Indiana Academy. His father, Dr. O.T. Scamahorn, was president from 1954-55.

Dr. and Mrs. Scamahorn are the parents of three children and very active in church work.

DOCTOR O. T. Scamahoin lives in Pittsboro, Indiana. He has lived there all his life and has brought some 4000 babies into the world. Now, seventy-odd years old, the people in his community honor him highly for the good he has done.

We also honored Doctor Scamahoin when he appeared recently as guest on our Breakfast Club program. After the regular interview on the air, I learned some more about the doctor and his work. I was particularly struck by a remark he made: "I never go out on a case without God Almighty." I asked him if there was some experience behind those words and he said there was. This is the story he told me.

The first case Doctor Scamahoin had after he started his medical practice was an extremely difficult one. While delivering a baby, the mother started to hemorrhage. The new doctor was badly frightened when he saw her life was in danger, but he finally managed to save her and the baby.

This close call left Doctor Scamahoin quite shaken. He was suddenly amazed at the responsibilities facing a doctor. He realized that he could not have pulled this mother and baby through if God had not guided his mind and hands. But with this Power to rely on, he knew he could be safe.

As the years passed, Doctor Scamahoin treated many patients. His skill became greater and greater, and he learned the vital lessons that experience teaches. The fears and uncertainties of his youth gave way to confidence and ability. Now he relied on himself. He was still spiritual-minded, but he placed more emphasis on medicine and professional wisdom.

Then, one midnight, the doctor got a call—another expectant mother. The doctor had had a very busy day and was very tired, but he dragged himself out of bed, dressed and set out. It was a cold, stormy night and he had to drive a long way.

As he drove along, he thought of the hundreds of mothers he had cared for and all the babies he had delivered. His mind travelled back to his first case, when he thought he would lose his patient. She had four children after that, and both she and they were well. He could not help feeling a little proud of his record.

Finally, the doctor arrived at his patient's home. It was a small frame house, badly lit by a kerosene lamp. The only person with the mother-to-be was her grandmother, a nervous, frightened woman. "Oh, doctor, hurry!" she cried.

Doctor Scamahoin calmed her, then quickly and surely he set about his work.

The kerosene lamp cast weird shadows in the room as the doctor moved it from place to place, trying to get better lighting. Finally, he told the grandmother to hold the lamp over the patient's bed. As the old woman gripped the lamp tightly, her hands began to tremble.

"Careful," the doctor warned.

"I'm trying to be," she said shakily. Her knuckles grew white as she squeezed her fingers around the lamp.

Outside, the howling wind suddenly swirled into a wild screech. The grandmother uttered a cry, grew pale, then crumpled to the floor, unconscious. As she fell, the lamp slipped from her hands and toppled on the bed, smashing the glass chimney. In a flash the bed covers and straw mattress burst into flames.

The bed was blazing, the old lady lay on the floor in a faint that could prove fatal if she wasn't cared for immediately; the young mother lay on the bed, terror-stricken and unable to move.

The horror of the situation overwhelmed the doctor—a paralysis seemed to grip him. The only light came from the burning bed, and it cast a terrifying glow through the room. He became acutely aware of his helplessness.

Then the young mother cried out, "God help me! Please, God, help me!"

The words struck Doctor Scamahoin with almost physical force. They reminded him that there was a Power beyond himself on which he could rely. God was with him now, as he had been long ago.

The doctor snapped out of his daze. "God will help!" he said to the woman. Then, with movements faster than he had ever thought himself capable of, he grabbed a blanket and started to snuff out the fire. The flames scorched his hands and face. For a while, it seemed as if wherever he plunged the blanket another flame shot up. But finally he gained control over the fire and slowly put it out.

Then he rushed to the unconscious grandmother. As soon as he had revived her, he hurried back to the young mother. She looked up at him with a sort of beatific smile.

"God did help me," she whispered.

"Why not?" the doctor said. "He's always with me on my calls." Then he added softly, "Only I had almost forgotten that."

Despite the accident, the young mother's baby was delivered safely! The mother fared well, and so did the grandmother. "And as for me," Doctor Scamahoin concluded, "I've never since gone out on a case without the Almighty at my side."

Pittsboro Residents and Friends Honor Doctor at Program Sunday

Dr. O. T. Scamahorn's 50th anniversary as a physician at Pittsboro was celebrated by more than 1,200 persons Sunday afternoon when ceremonies in his honor were conducted in the school gymnasium at Pittsboro.

In appreciation of his long and faithful services to his home community and the surrounding area, the citizens of his hometown began planning weeks ago to honor the doctor. The idea began with members of the Pittsboro Christian church where the doctor has long been an active member, on the board and a Sunday school teacher, and spread to the townspeople and residents in surrounding communities.

On Monday, August 6, 1908, Dr. Scamahorn had begun the practice of his profession in Pittsboro and the celebration of his anniversary was held on August 3, the Sunday in August nearest the anniversary date.

A reception opened the ceremonies of the day and was followed by a program.

In recognition of the doctor's anniversary, Mrs. Felix Broyles spoke concerning his early life, his grade and high school days and related numerous incidents which occurred during his years of practice.

Tributes to Dr. Scamahorn were given by Rev. James Shockley of Danville, former pastor of the Pittsboro Christian church, who spoke of the doctor as a churchman and friend; Mrs. Hazel Rains, as the family doctor, and James Knetzer, Pittsboro businessman, on the doctor's civic activities and his aid to the businessmen.

Roscoe Leak was the spokesman for the presentation of a bronze plaque to the doctor with the inscription, "Presented to 'Our Friend,' Dr. O. T. Scamahorn, in recognition of 50 years of medical practice and his ever faithful

service to his profession and to us. 'No call ever went unanswered.' Presented by the citizens of Pittsboro and surrounding communities on the third day of August, 1958. August 6, 1908-August 6, 1958." In his response, Dr. Scamahorn stated that he has followed the motto, "To do the best that you can under the circumstances," in his practice. In reference to having delivered more than 4,000 babies, he stated that he had delivered twins but never triplets.

Chester Parker of Pittsboro presided over the program. Rev. Raymond Ohaver, pastor of the Pittsboro Christian church, read the Scripture and gave the opening prayer. Rev. William Walter of Indianapolis, former Pittsboro resident, gave the benediction.

Music for the program included numbers by a choir composed of Mrs. Floyd Mitchell, Mrs. Arthur Smith, Misses Myra Lou Reynolds and Judith Gephart, Richard and Robert Carter, Murray Keltner and James Dison with Mrs. Morris Dillon at the piano. A trumpet solo by Riky Schaeckel accompanied by Miss Linda Evans, a vocal solo by Mr. Dison, and a marimba solo by Leslie Ann Ginn.

In the recognition of guests there were more than 200 persons present who were born with Dr. Scamahorn as the attending physician, including the first baby he delivered, Harry Lambert of Coatesville, and a five weeks old infant, the most recent birth

at which the doctor officiated, Linda Sue Bray, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Bray of Indianapolis, who was born June 23, 1958.

There were five members of the doctor's graduating class at medical college, classmates in public schools and those who had taught him in public schools. Among the guests were representatives of the officers and executive committee of the Indiana Medical Society and many of the doctor's patients, some of whom had traveled from Illinois, Ohio and Arkansas to be present at the ceremonies.

Other guests recognized were former Governor of Indiana, Henry F. Schricker and Mrs. Schricker, Sixth District Congresswoman, Cecil Harden, the Scamahorn's two daughters-in-law and their five grandchildren. Also Audrey Money Ross of Pittsboro, the first girl baby delivered by Dr. Scamahorn.

At the reception preceding the program, guests were received by Dr. and Mrs. Scamahorn and their two sons, Dr. Milburn Scamahorn, dentist of Kokomo, and Dr. Malcolm Scamahorn, physician, associated with his father in general practice.

Music for the reception was presented by Mrs. Dallas Watts, Mrs. Herschell Gentry, Jr., Mrs. Chester Parker, Misses Judith Gephart and Leslie Ann Ginn.

Punch and cookies were served, at a long table decorated with yellow and white flowers and can-

dles, during the reception and after the program. Favors were satin ribbons with pictures of infants for those present for whom Dr. Scamahorn had been the attending doctor at birth. Other guests received cardboard wreaths with the numeral fifty, in gold and white and tied with white ribbon.

A profusion of yellow flowers in bouquets and potted plants decorated the gymnasium and a large gold fifty on a white background centered the curtain at the back of the platform.

At eight o'clock on Monday morning, following the celebration on Sunday, Dr. Scamahorn made his first house call of the day.

Dies Tuesday

Mrs. Fannie Rutledge Scamahorn, wife of Dr. O. T. Scamahorn of Pittsboro, died, Tuesday evening, in her home, there, following a lingering illness from which she had been bedfast for over two months.

Hendricks County Clubwoman of the Year (1960), she was 77 years of age. A native of Lizton, she graduated from Lizton High School and was married in 1906 to O. T. Scamahorn. In 1908, the couple moved to Pittsboro where Dr. Scamahorn began the practice of medicine which he still continues.

Mrs. Scamahorn was active in club work, community and civic affairs. She was a devoted member of the Pittsboro Christian Church, Daughters of the American Revolution and Order of the Eastern Star. She had also served as a member of the Hendricks County Welfare Board.

Surviving with her husband are two sons; Dr. Milburn, of Kokomo and Dr. Malcolm, of Pittsboro; four grandchildren: Gayle, of Kokomo, Jean, John and James, of Pittsboro; two brothers: Guy Rutledge, of Brownsburg, and Harry Rutledge, of Lizton; and two sisters: Frona Koebrich of Beech Grove, and Lena McDonald of Speedway. One brother, Horace Rutledge, and one sister, Inez Keeney, preceded her in death.

Final rites will be conducted, Friday afternoon, 1:30 o'clock, in the Pittsboro Christian Church. The body will lie in state, at the church, one hour prior to the service. Burial will be in the Lizton K. of P. Cemetery. Friends may call at the Gregory Funeral Home.

Dr. Scamahorn Dies, Physician 56 Years

Funeral services for Dr. O. T. Scamahorn, 80 years old, a physician in Hendricks County for 56 years, will be held at 10 a.m. Saturday in the Pittsboro Christian Church. Burial will be in the Knights of Pythias Cemetery at Lizton.

Dr. Scamahorn, a member of the first graduating class of the Indiana University School of Medicine in 1908, died Wednesday in Memorial Clinic after a three-months illness.

He was the Indiana Medical Association's "Physician of the Year" in 1956, and two years later was honored by residents of Pittsboro for his 50 years service.

ACTIVE UNTIL he became ill in January, Dr. Scamahorn had estimated he had driven more than a million miles attending his patients and in delivering more than 4,200 babies.

Until joined in his office by his son, Dr. Malcolm Scamahorn, after World War II, the elder physician had never sent a bill to a patient. He received much of his pay in baskets of farm produce, and once was repaid with a calf.

After graduation from Lizton High School, Dr. Scamahorn taught school, he later attended the Louisville (Ky.) Medical College, working his way through as an embalmer's assistant, and waiter. He entered the new I.U. School of Medicine in 1906, and was graduated two years later with honors.

DR. SCAMAHORN was a

former Hendricks County coroner and health officer, was chairman of the Pittsboro Town Board 20 years and was a member of the County Fair Board, Pittsboro School Advisory Board, Farm Bureau and Grange.

A Democrat, he once was an unsuccessful candidate for state senator. He was admitted to the bar in 1936, but never practiced law.

He was a Sunday school teacher for 50 years, and chairman of the board of the Pittsboro Christian Church.

Dr. Scamahorn was a charter member and past president of the Indiana Academy of General Practice, and was a member of the I.U. School of Medicine Alumni Association and American, Indiana and Hendricks County Medical associations.

He also was a 50-year Mason, and member of the Scottish Rite, Shrine, Order of the Eastern Star and Lions Club.

Surviving are the widow, Mrs. Mae Scamahorn; two sons, Dr. Malcolm Scamahorn of Pittsboro and Dr. Milburn Scamahorn, a Kokomo optometrist; a sister, Mrs. Delia Scott of Lizton; a brother, Nathan Scamahorn of Jeffersonville, and four grandchildren.
