

FAMILY HISTORY OF CLARENCE ROBEY WATT AND ELVA FRAZEE WATT

Clarence Robey Watt was born on a farm near Clermont, Indiana, in Hendricks County's Washington Township, on June 20, 1896. He was one of eight children of James William and Mary Elizabeth Robey Watt, and lived in Washington Township his entire life. He died January 16, 1969.

Clarence Watt volunteered for service in World War I, and served in a Motor Transport Company in New York City. He was scheduled to go overseas when influenza broke out, and many soldiers died in Army camps across the nation. He was in the Army several months after the signing of the Armistice, then was discharged from a camp in Columbus, Ohio.

In 1921 Clarence R. Watt married Elva Frazee, daughter of Otis D. and Ethel McClain Frazee, who also resided in Washington Township, just east of Avon. Elva, born in July, 1898, was her parents second daughter.

Clarence and Elva Watt established a home on Dan Jones Road, on what was known as the Ivan Glidewell farm. Mr. Watt was a dairy farmer most of his life. He also operated a school bus for the Avon school. He was a member of Shiloh Methodist church (later transferring to the Avon Methodist church), the Plainfield American Legion post, and the Scottish Rite, of Indianapolis. He was a Past Master of the Bridgeport Masonic Lodge, and a Past Patron of the Plainfield Order of the Eastern Star.

Elva Watt, who survives her husband, attended Central Normal College at Danville and Madame Blaker's Teachers College in Indianapolis. Before her marriage she taught at Elwood, Cumberland, and Avon. She has been active for many years in the Avon Methodist church and the Washington chapter of the International Travel-Study Club, and is a Past Matron of the Order of the Eastern Star. Mrs. Watt recalls that just prior to the passage of the 19th Amendment she helped poll the women of Washington Township regarding woman suffrage. The year women first voted she served on the Election Board.

The Watts were the parents of two children, Clarice Elcise Watt Heisman, of Palos Verdes, California and James William Watt, a World War II veteran, of rural route, Plainfield. Mrs. Watt still resides on the family farm on Dan Jones Road.

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
