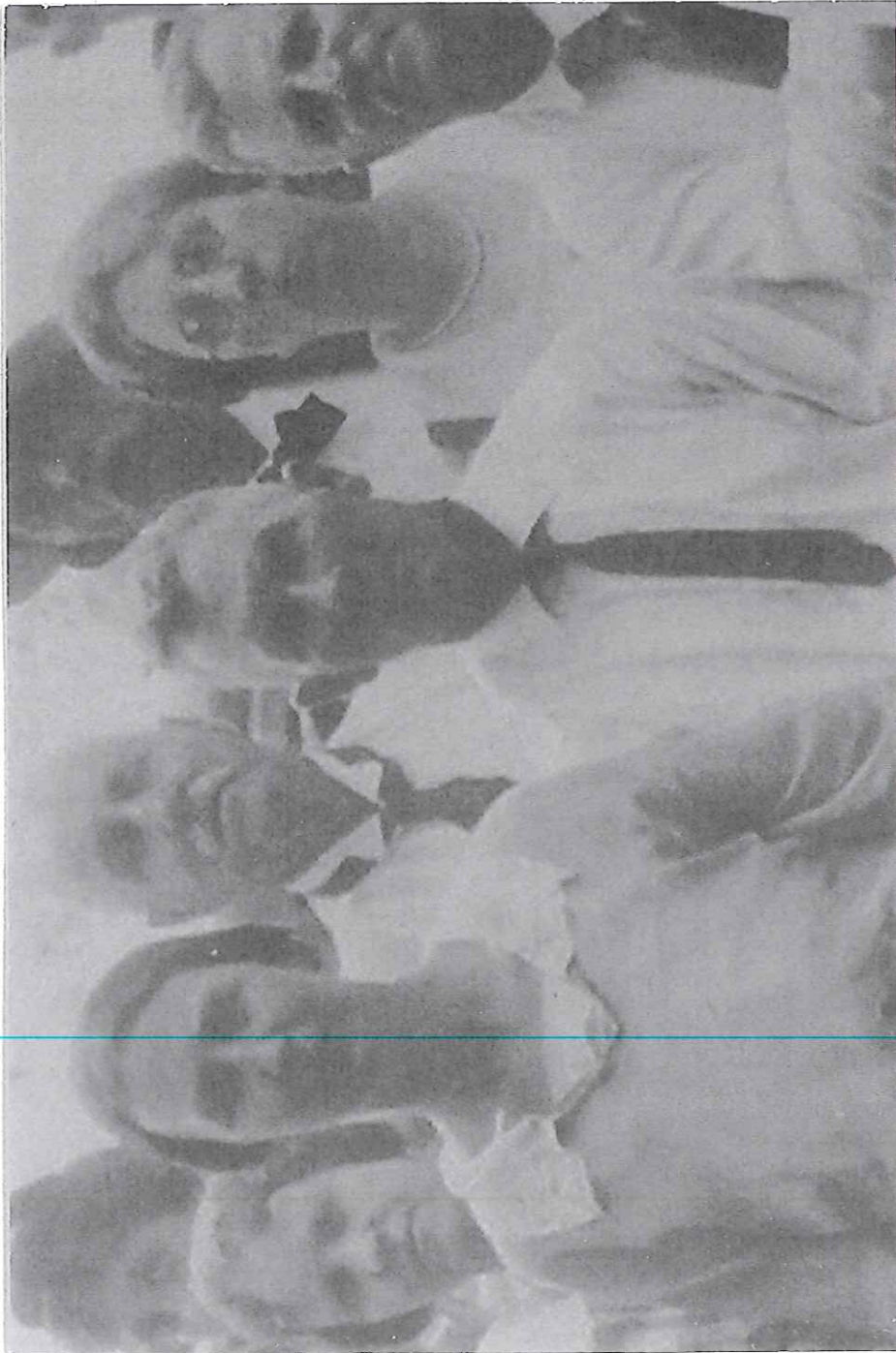

#### FATALLY BURNED

Sad Ending of the Life of a Young Wife and Mother

Clayton furnished the most terrible affair that has occurred in the county for many a day. Friday, Mrs. J.O. Winsted was terribly burned and after lingering for some twenty hours, died.

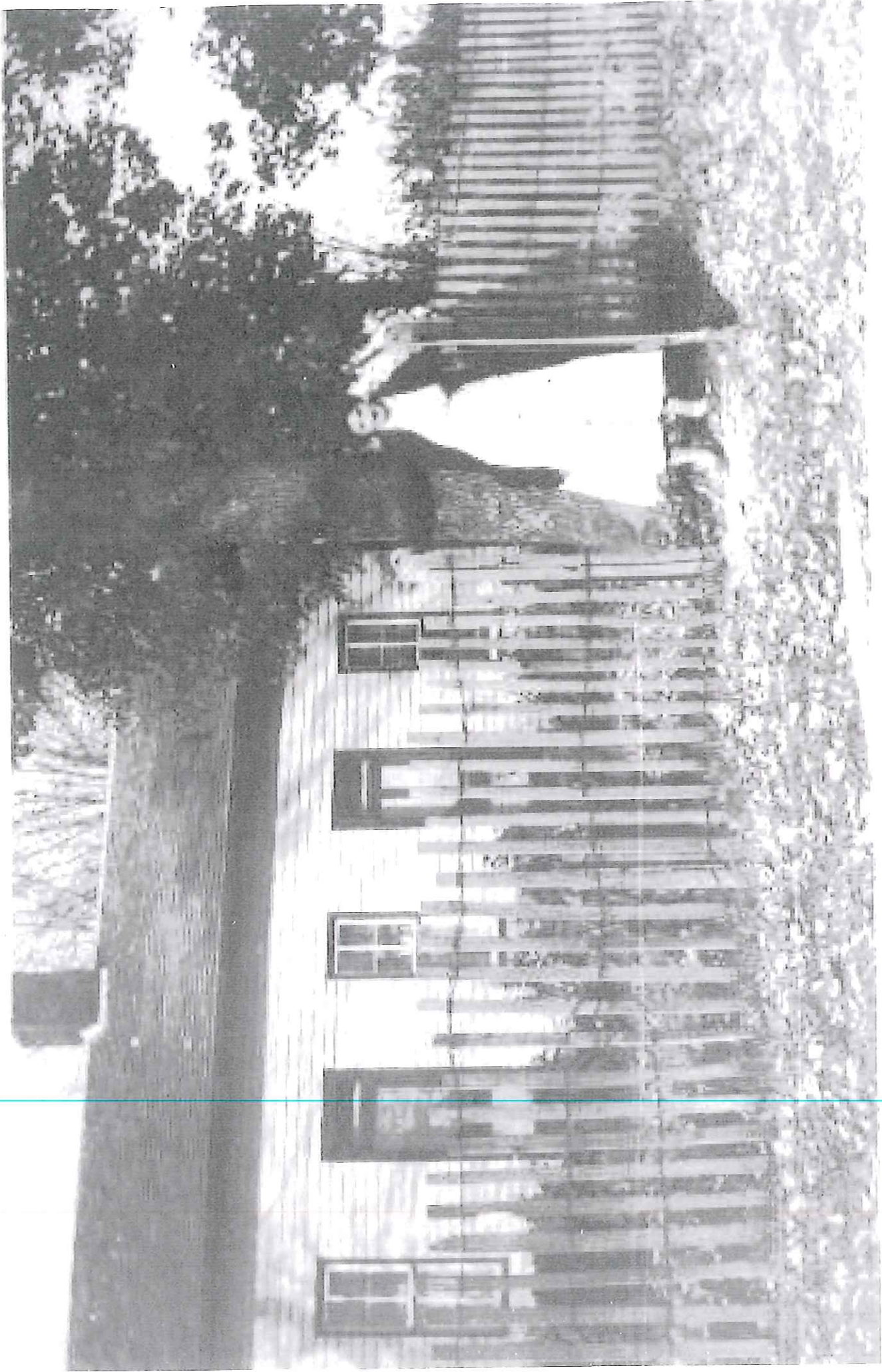
Friday evening she was in the milk house getting milk for supper. She set the lamp on the ice chest and leaned over to get the milk. In some manner the lamp fell off, and breaking, the oil in it was scattered around, much of it falling on her dress. The blaze was not extinguished and blazed up, shattering her off from the door. There she was hemmed in a small space with a dangerous fire between her and safety. Only a moment did she debate what to do, and gathering her skirts about her she jumped over the flames to safety as she hoped. But the lower parts of the dress was saturated with oil and as she went over the flames these caught fire and blazed up. Her husband rushed to her aid and finally succeeded in putting out the fire, but not until his wife had been terribly burned and he himself had not escaped the fiery breath. All the physicians of Clayton were summoned but medical aid could do nothing in the face of such injuries, and although her wonderful vitality was able to sustain life until the next afternoon, it was realized that the end could not be far away. She was conscious and knew full well that life could not be her's much longer.

Her grief-stricken husband was badly burned on the left hand and the flames badly scorched his inner nostrils. He will not be permanently disabled, however.

The funeral of Mrs. Winsted was held Monday, interment being at Indianapolis. Mrs. Winsted was well known all over the county, especially among the teachers, for before her death she had been one of their number as Miss Kirby. She and Mr. Winsted had lived a happy married life and two little ones had come to brighten their home. In the innocent sorrow of the childrenj and the nameless grief of the husband, a host of warm friends extend their heart-felt sympathy.

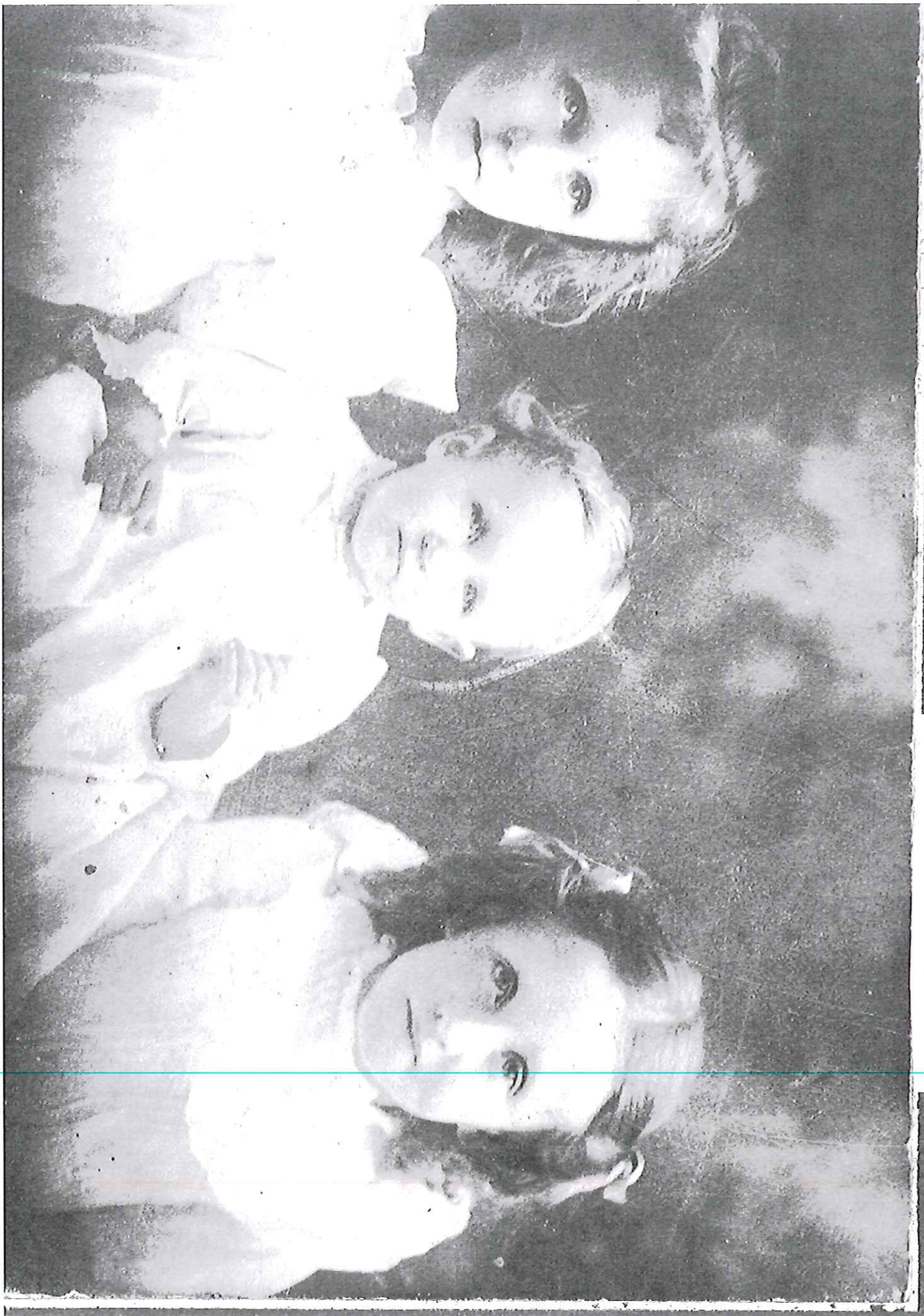
