
Beverly Ballard built a log cabin for his family on 71.10 acres entered from the Government in 1834 in sec. #6 T 16 N R 2 E Brown Township Hendricks County, Indiana. He also entered land in Lincoln Twp., where later his son James Ballard (B. 2-26-1819 d. 7-22-1892) would build and operate a sawmill.

At the death of Beverly Ballard, James Ballard became the owner of the land where the log cabin stood. In 1853 James Ballard and his brother George Ballard (b. 1- -1822 d. - -1912), who was a cabinet maker, felled trees, hauled logs to the sawmill owned by James Ballard and hewed the sills for a new house. In 1854 the house consisting of two rooms 15 x 15, two rooms 9 x 10, and a 9 x 10 porch enclosed on three sides was completed. It was heated by a fireplace, there were five windows and three doors lead outside; one to the north just a few steps away from the log cabin. Sometime during the 1880's, the porch was fully enclosed and became the fifth room of the house.

When James Ballard died the house and some of the originally entered acreage was willed by him to his daughter, Mary Jane Ballard (b. 2-25-1858 d. 10-20-1922), who lived alone on the farm until her marriage (8-8-1895) to Daniel B. Ennis (b. 1-12-1864 d. 4-17-1921). In 1907 they tore down the log house built by her grandfather, Beverly, put a brick foundation under the house built by her father, James, (up until this time it rested on rocks), took out the original fireplace, and built a 16 x 30 addition consisting of two rooms over a brick walled cellar, and a cement porch. The cellar had a framed, roofed outside entrance, with cement steps which are still in use. A false outside chimney and solic walnut fireplace mantle were built into the house built by James and a larger matching porch was added to it.

At the death of Mary Jane Ballard & Daniel B. Ennis, the house and approximate accrage of 84 acres was willed to Margaret (Hogan) Haag (b. 9-6-1890 d. who was the niece of Mary Jane (Ballard Ennis, and who had made her home with them following the death of her mother until her marriage (6-4-1913) to William Haag (b. 9-1-1891 d. 8-29-1972). William and Margaret (Hogan) Haag completely modernized the house during the period from 1922 to 1972; first electricity was installed, the cellar was enlarged to create room for a furnace, an inside cellar-way was constructed, closets and a bath were created in the 1854 house, hardwood flooring was laid over the old rough boards, and the kitchen was completely modernized.

BALLARD CEMETERY

Brown Township, Hendricks County, Indiana

Common in pioneer times was the "Family" Cemetery.

The Ballard Cemetery is located on ground entered by Beverly Ballard in 1834 & 1835, and is presently owned by Margaret Haag, great grandaughter.

There are two versions of how the cemetery came into being:

- 1. A young man who was working for James Ballard, (son of Beverly) died leaving no known relatives and was the first person buried there.
- 2. James & Sarah (Corbaly) Ballard had lost one son who is buried in Walker Cemetery in Lincoln Twp. When their second son died, James Ballard said "I will start my own burial ground."

In either instance, the cemetery was begun about 1850 and perhaps earlier, and was originally planned as a family burial ground, however, after the migration of the Irish to Brown Twp., there was an epidemic which killed so many babies in the community, and some of the Irish Catholic families requested that James Ballard allow their unbaptized children to be buried in his family plot. At that time all Catholic children were baptized at St. John Church, Indiamapolis, so it was not unusual for a child to be a year or so old before baptism. Proof of these children's proper burial is evidenced in 1928 when during the opening of a grave tiny gold casket crosses and a piece of glass were unearthed. Many protestant children are also buried there, and many of the graves that are marked are no relation to the Ballard family.

There are numerous unmarked graves, some stones practically illegible, and some stones buried. (These I hope to unearth this summer). Each rock is a grave marker and there are two red cedar trees which I have always been told are also markers. The cemetery is about half the size it originally was, due to it's placement on a hill overlooking Shoal Creek to the immediate west, erosion has taken place and though it has always been well fenced, the stones are in a bad condition at this time.

JOSHUA BALLARD

Joshua, son of Jesse and Sarah Carter Ballard, was born in Morgan county, Ind., near Center Valley in the year 1834, passing away June 10, 1917, at his home in Minnesota, at the ripe age of 82 years, 8 months and 15 days. He was one of the youngest of eight children, all having gone on before except one sister, Mary Ann Hadley who is living. He was married March 26, 1859, to Nancy Eames and to this union was born three daughters and two sons, the daughters preceding him. He lived in Hendricks county, Ind., until 1884 when he and his family moved to Goodline county. Lumbrota, Minn., remaining there un til his death.

He had a birthright membership in the Friends church, helieved in its principles and was a regular attendant as long as living near the church of his choice. He knew something of the carly pioneer life and the hardships connected with it. The sacredness of the homeland with its attachment, and affection brought him back each year for a visit which was always full of enjoyment. He was a man of a strong constitution and had remarkable physical strength for one of his age, until his last sickness which was pneumonia, his strength gave way and the suffering was too much for him to rally from. He realized the end was near and spoke of the bright beyond and was ready for the change. He requested that his body be brought back to his old home and laid in West Union cemetery with two of his daughters. The remains was accompanied by his son Abbott. He leaves a wife, two sons, one sister, with other relafives and friends to mourn the loss, which to him is gain. * * *

Mrs. Ann Ballard, widow of Joel Balard, deceased, died, Sunday 23rd inst. the residence of her son-in-law, Harison B, Heiner, in Mooresville, in her ightieth year. Mrs. Ballard, came to darion county with her parents in 1827. The married soon after and settled in Hendricks county, where she resided fearly fifty-seven years, being about he earliest settler on White Lick. She was greatly favored with health, and ip to her last sickness her mind was clear. She was an earnest Christian, being a life member of the Society of Friends She made her home with her wo daughters, Mrs. Louisa Heiner and Datie J. Ballard. Three sons are living John A. Ballard, of Geneva, Neb, and Wm. P. Ballard and Levi E. Ballard, of Indianapolis.

MRS. ELLA BALLARD, ILL TWO YEARS, DIES

Wife of Prominent Pioneer Grocer Was Organizer of Local Branch of D. A. R.

Mrs. Ella Woodward Ballard, age 66 years; died this morning at her home, 1624 Washington avenue, after an illness covering over two years. The cause of her death was Bright's disease. The funeral will be field in St. John's Episcopal church of which Mrs. Fallard was a member. The exact time of the funeral will be announced later as the family is awaiting word from relatives.

Mrs. Ballard was born March 30, 1849 in Mooresville, Ind., and was married to John D. Ballard in Mooresville in 1888. To this union wore born three children, two of whom are now living. They are Mrs. In Wherry of this city and Mrs. Charles Nordyke of New York City, who will be here for the funieral.

Mr. and Mrs. Ballard fame to Kansas Chr. in 1883 and settled in Parsons on February 14 of that year. For a number of years Mr. Ballard was a prominent business man here and was active as a Mason. Mr. Ballard died sixteen years ago.

Besides her two daughters, Mrs. Ballard is survived by one grand-son, who has made his home with Mrs. Ballard sinec his mother's death sixteen years ago, and one sister, Mrs/ W. A. Comer, of Martinsville, Ind., who has visited here often.

Mrs. Ballard was one of the organizers of the D. A. R. chapter of this city and was at one time president of the Athenaeum Reading club.

During her long illness Mrs. Ballard has watched with interest, the events of the day and was always bright and hopeful. She was a devoted mother and grandmother and while she has been in ill-health, for a number of years her death was unexpected and came as a great shock to her many friends in this city.
