

REMARKS ON COURSES OF STUDY.

Careful attention is given throughout the entire course to Reading, Spelling, Writing and Composition.

To be admitted into the Grammar School, students must be acquainted with the general outlines of Geography, with elements of English Grammar and with higher Arithmetic through Denominate Numbers.

Academy Certificates are granted to those students who have satisfactorily completed each course as follows: Certificates of Promotion from Grammar School Course; Certificates of Proficiency in the Teachers' Course; Academy Diplomas for the English or Latin Courses. These Certificates together with explanation of work performed will be good, as far as they go, at Earlham College or DePauw University, without further examination.

Examinations in the different studies will be given at the close of each term and a grade of 75 per cent for each study and general average of 80 per cent. will be required for graduation in the English, Latin or Grammar Courses. A grade of 90 per cent. for each study and an average of 95 per cent., together with a Teachers' License from a County Superintendent, will be required for graduation in the Teachers' Course.

For aids to instruction, besides globes, maps and Anatomical Charts, the Academy has an excellent compound microscope and apparatus for illustrating elements of Chemistry.

A library of two hundred volumes in the Academy building is free to all the students. Besides many books of general reading, it contains Encyclopaedias and other standard works, for historical biographical, classical, geographical and biblical reference.

Lectures will be given each term by persons not connected with the institution and all students will be required to attend unless excused by the Principal.
