Our play, "A Change of Heart," culminated the money-raising work of the year.

The class did not believe in all work and no play, so we enjoyed two parties, one, after the play at Mary Edwards; and the other, on the Gymnasium stage in the spring. Our sponsor, Mrs. LaVonne Ramsey, and her husband were there to join in the fun.

Hoping to show the senior class of 1950 a good time at the 1949-50 Reception, we entertained them with a banquet and dance in their honor. This, the most outstanding event of the year, took place at the "Old Trails Inn". Carl White, President, gave the farewell address; and Raymond Andrews, Vice-


President, was the very entertaining Master of Ceremonies. Frank Davis, Treasurer; and Freda Hylton, Secretary, were also seated at the ceremonial table.

The year of 1950 found us, as Seniors, beginning our last and most important affairs of the year, the Junior-Senior Reception. This time, instead of being hosts we were the honored guests of the class of "52", when we were entertained at the Columbia Club of Indianapolis on May 11, 1951.






Now that you've met my class, what do you think of them? I wish that you could know themall personally.


JUNIOR CLASS




The class flower is the American Beauty rose; the colors, maroon and gray; and the motto, "Before us lies timber; let us build."


FRESHMAN CLASS


The class of '54 came to Senior High School with fifty-seven members. Twenty-three of these were original members of the class that first entered Plainfield schools in 1942.



Under the direction of Charles Henley, the Plainfield High School band spent an interesting and profitable year.


The band increased in membership from forty-five to fifty-two. In addition to this number were the members of the Junior Band organized to provide material from which to build.



THE LITTLE SHEPHERD WHO WAS LEFT BEHIND






The Council undertook a new project this year when they tried sponsoring a Teen Canteen and found it a very worthwhile interprize.


