## HISTORY OF THE CLASS OF "51"

Four short years ago in 1947, we, the class of 1951, ventured into the halls of Plainfield High School as "Freshman Greenies". We selected Frank Davis, President; Tom Hilligoss, Vice-President; Audrey Estes, Secretary; and Carl White, Treasurer. Our sponsor was Miss Virginia Dubois. Getting adjusted to high school was the outstanding feature of the year. The freshman party was held on the gym stage in the spring, and we sponsored a movie, "Love and Learn".

In our sophomore year we set forth on our business ventures all together. We sold pennants and pins and sponsored our second movie, "The Return of October". Our party was held after the holidays. The officers of the year were John Martin, President; Barbara Jenkins, Vice-President; Tom Hilligoss, Secretary; and Lucky Stephens, Treasurer.

We, as Juniors went all out to earn enough money for a worthwhile Senior trip by selling hot dogs and coffee at football games, and concessions at basketball games at noon. Our magazine sales, individual and group, broke the standing records, which have yet to be surpassed. We were the first class at Plainfield to sponsor an American Athletic Union Tournament, which we found to be a very profitable business venture. Our play, "A Change of Heart," culminated the money-raising work of the year.

The class did not believe in all work and no play, so we enjoyed two parties, one, after the play at Mary Edwards; and the other, on the Gymnasium stage in the spring. Our sponsor, Mrs. LaVonne Ramsey, and her husband were there to join in the fun.

Hoping to show the senior class of 1950 a good time at the 1949-50 Reception, we entertained them with a banquet and dance in their honor. This, the most outstanding event of the year, took place at the "Old Trails Inn". Carl White, President, gave the farewell address; and Raymond Andrews, Vice-



President, was the very entertaining Master of Ceremonies. Frank Davis, Treasurer; and Freda Hylton, Secretary, were also seated at the ceremonial table.

The year of 1950 found us, as Seniors, beginning our last and most important affairs of the year, the Junior-Senior Reception. This time, instead of being hosts we were the honored guests of the class of "52", when we were entertained at the Columbia Club of Indianapolis on May 11, 1951.

Baccalaureate was held in the gymnasium on May 18, 1951, at which Rev. Shepard spoke.

The day finally came for which we had eagerly awaited the past twelve years. We were glad (in a way) that it was May 24, 1951--our graduation. The speaker was John J. Haramy. His subject was entitled "Our Heritage."

Now, we are on our own--no more punishment for failing to study, no more protection from the big world outside. That is history.

## S O P H O M O R E      C L A S S

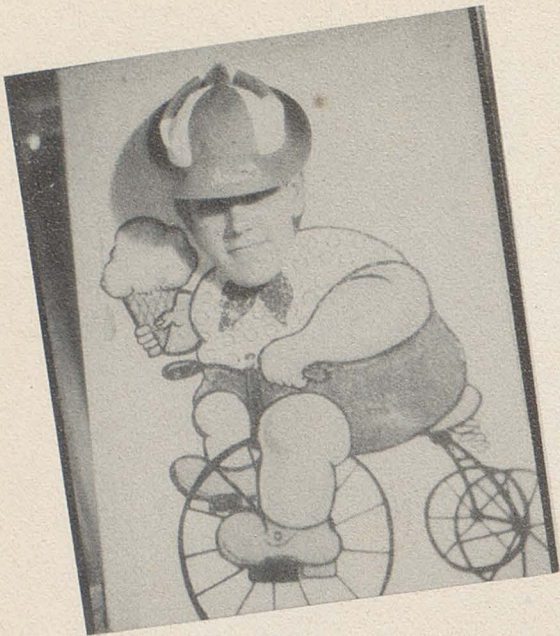

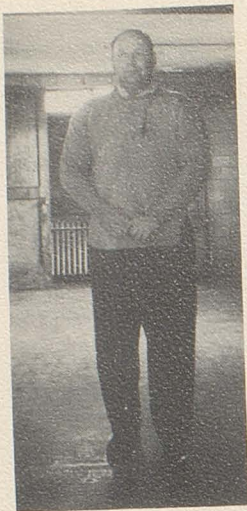
The next four games handed the Quakers losses with scores ranging from 12-0 to 38-6. These losses were to Decatur, Danville, Speedway, and Mooresville.
