





## Class History

In the third grade, with the addition of Bill and Dale Richardson to our class, Mrs. Edith Bly and Mrs. Etter undertook the task of broadening our little minds with the hated subjects--spelling and arithmetic. By the end of the year everyone could count to twenty without taking off his shoes.

All this and multiplication, too, came with the fourth grade. Charles Cummings, Carole Hobson, Esther Reece, and Ethel Retherford, who joined our happy class this year, were made welcome by Mrs. Bly and Mrs. Elliot, who a year later looked back longingly upon us as fifth grade pupils under the guidance of Mrs. Jessie Gibbs and Miss Mary Hagee. It was they, now, who were to punish us when paper wads were shot or we were caught copying.

With the addition of Mary Anne Eiler, Lee Miller, Esther Pell, and Pat VanLandingham, we entered Mr. William's and Miss Kluka's sixth grades with all the ambition and energy possible.

Through the patience and prodding of all the Junior High School teachers, we struggled through the seventh grade, during which time Mary Frances Brandau and Connie Orner had joined our ranks.

Our feeling of importance was much increased the next fall, for as eighth graders, we were the upper classmen of Junior High School. One outstanding event of this year was our production of a Christmas skit, entitled "The Little Lame Girl." The names of Marvin LaRoche, Judy Ratcliff, Donald Whitaker, and Velma Wilburn were added to our class-roll this year.

The GREAT day came in September 1949, when the Class of '53 entered high school as freshmen with the great fear of initiation. Stuart Hancock and Janis Hodgins were added to our growing class roll. The business of the class this year was conducted by the following officers: president, Nancy Davis; Vice-president, Charles Cummings; secretary, Stuart-Hancock; treasurer, Virginia Masten.

The sophomore year progressed peacefully and successfully, with our major project being the sponsoring of the movie, "Treasure Island." Two more names--Bernard Mayo and Anita Martin--appeared upon our roster at the beginning of school. After the organization for the year was completed, we found ourselves under the capable leadership of Velma Wilburn, president; Charles Cummings, vice-president; Carol Hobson, secretary; Virginia Masten, treasurer.

The junior year was a happy one, marked by the arrival of the junior rings. We elected Charles Schendel as president; Tom Newlin as vice-president; Ethel Retherford as secretary; and Virginia Masten as treasurer. Our successful salesmanship was well demonstrated this year by the rapidly mounting receipts from the sale of concessions. Many new recruits--Norma Brock, Carol Cokain, Bob Consamus, Wayne Drake, Mary Gray, Janice Wagner, and Bill Walls --joined us this year. Again the class displayed its dramatic ability with the presentation of the play, "Room for One More," which was an outstanding success. The climax of the year's social activities came May 9, when we honored the seniors with a reception at the Rivera Club in Indianapolis.

In September, 1952, the class met to effect its last organization as a group, with Karla Alexander, Bill Bradley, Albert Leyner, and Barbara Miller as new members. The officers chosen were president, Tom Newlin; vice-president, Stuart Hancock; secretary, Ethel Retherford; treasurer, Virginia Masten. Among the outstanding events of this, our senior, year were the successful presentation of the class play, "You Can't Take It With You," under the direction of Mrs. Claire Gaddy, the publication of "The Plainsmen," and a most enjoyable reception given us by the juniors. The year was climaxed by the two occasions to which we had looked forward during the four years of high school--the Baccalaureate service on May 17 and Commencement on May 21.

A vote of thanks is due Mr. Grosskreutz, who served as sponsor during our four years of high school. With his advice and guidance, many projects have been carried to a successful conclusion.

Thus ends, on graduation day, the final year for the class of '53, with happiness in anticipation of new adventures and regretfulness in leaving good friends and happy memories behind.

I, Velma Wilburn, do will and bequeath my ability to be on good terms with my principal for four years to Charles Acton.








The Plainfield Chapter of Future Homemakers of America is honored to have among its 52 members the State F.H.A. president, Jo Ann Moore.

The Plainfield girls participate in many playdays and sportsdays throughout the year. This enables girls to become acquainted with girls from other schools in athletic activities.



Lee Fields, a P.H.S. freshman runner, placed 3rd in sectional competition and 29th in a field of 140 in the state meet.


