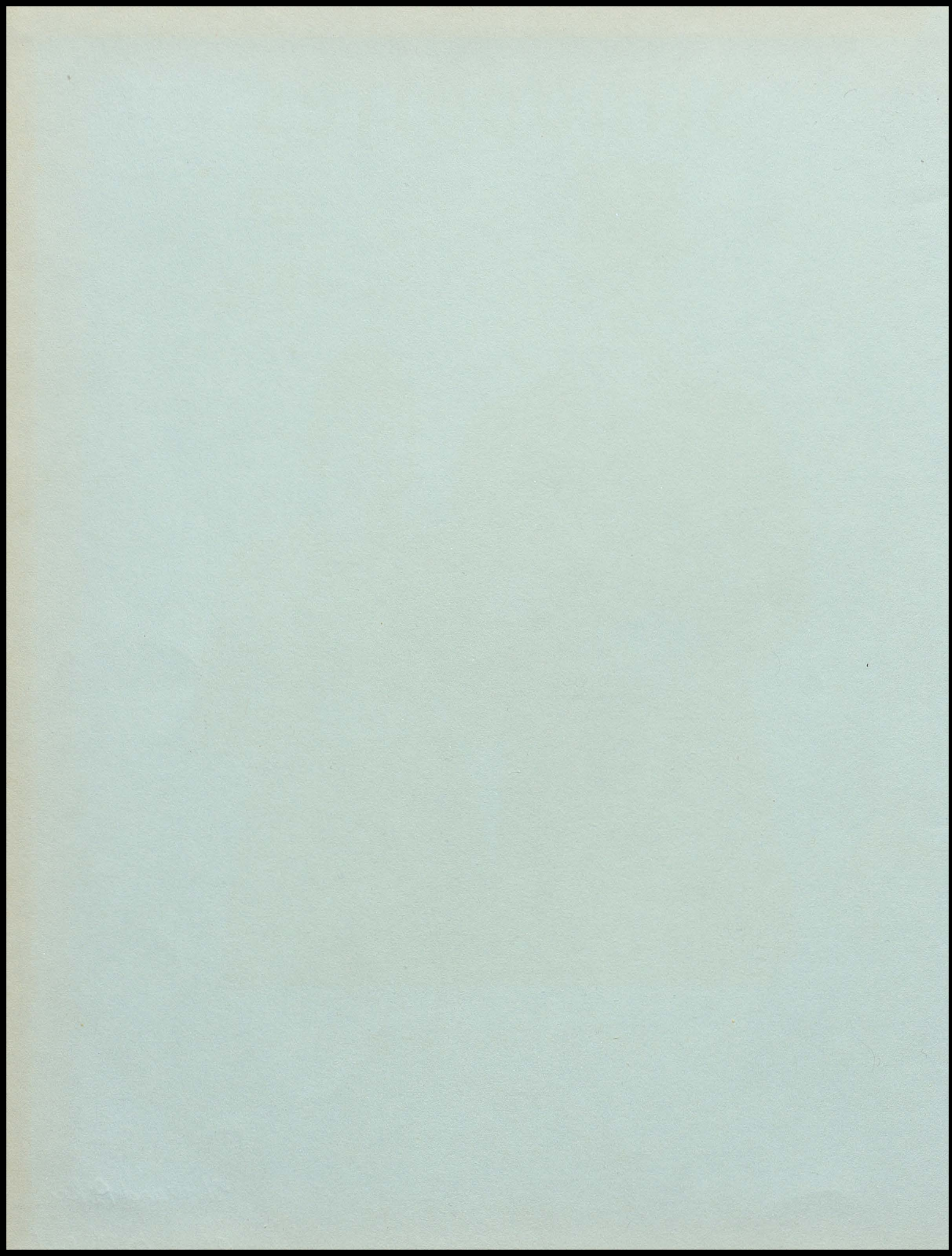

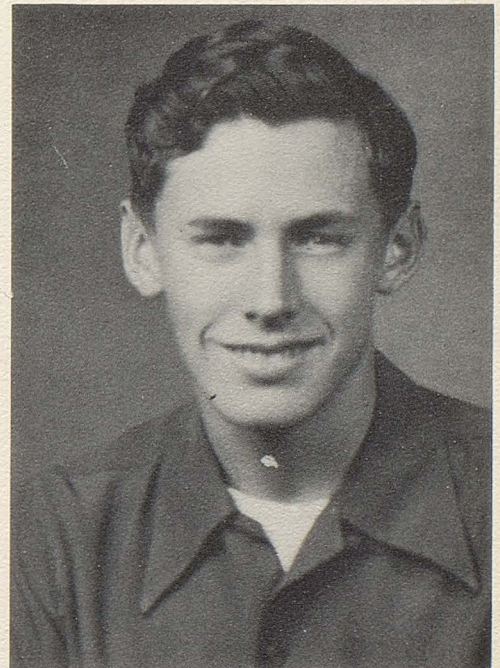

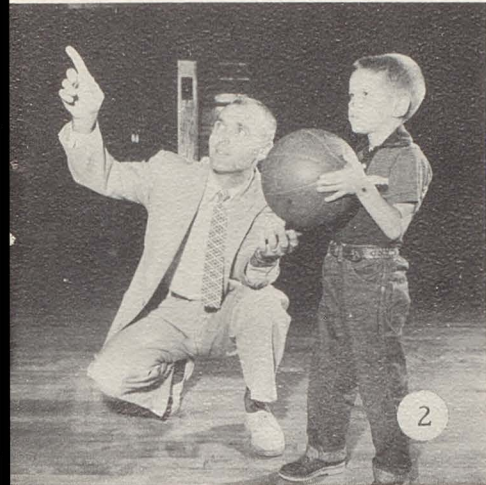




# Our Teachers Are Human...

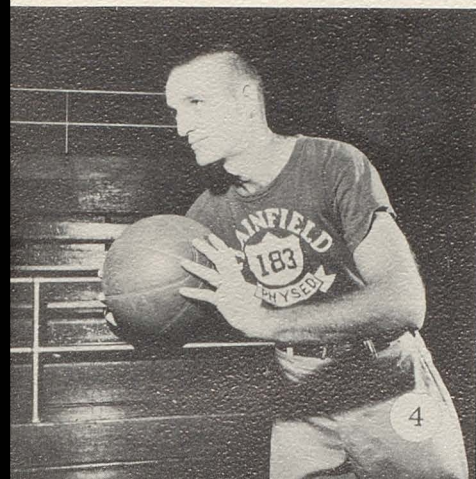
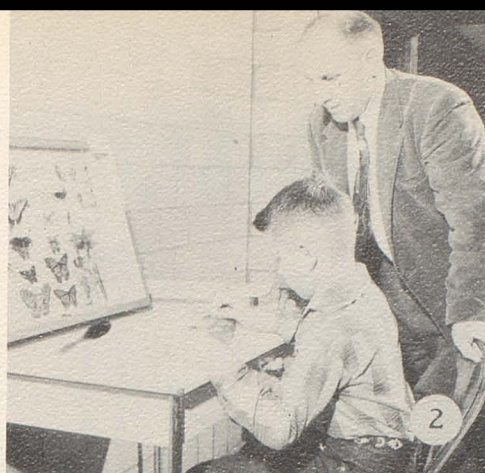


# (After School Hours)

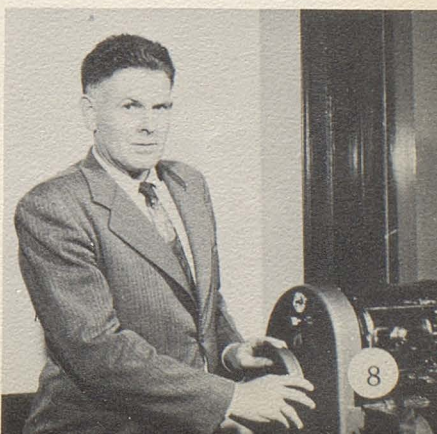
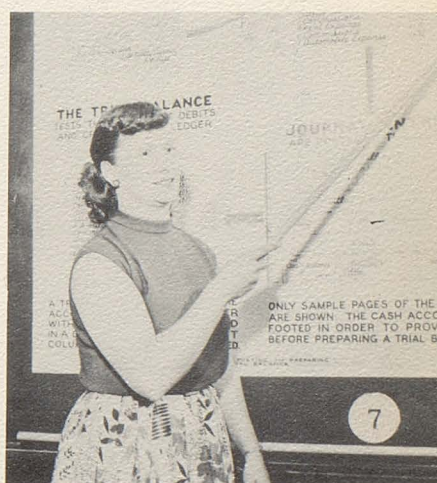






# In Their Hobbies And Interests.

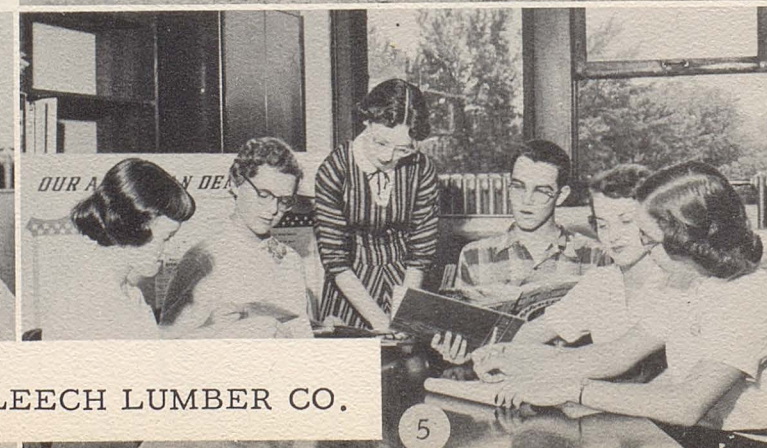
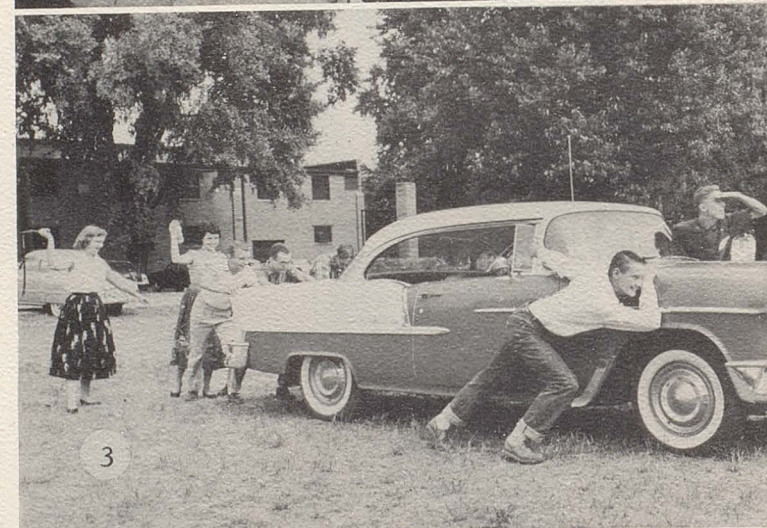
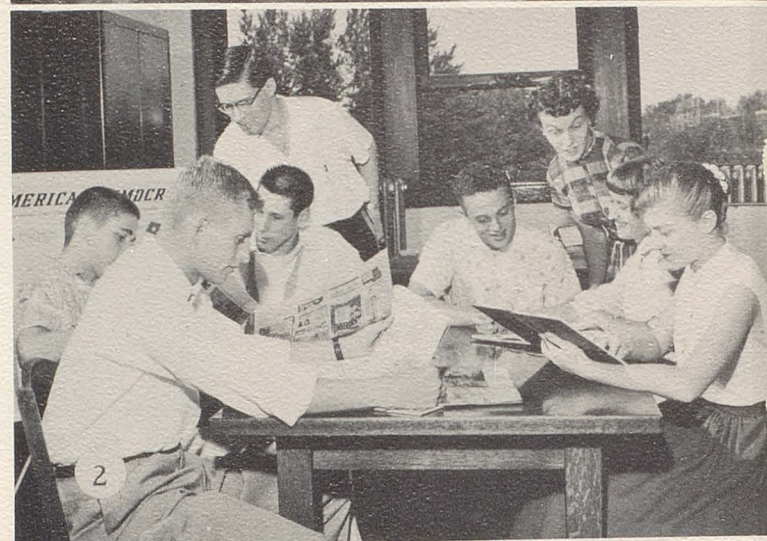


# From The Annual Staff: Our Memories

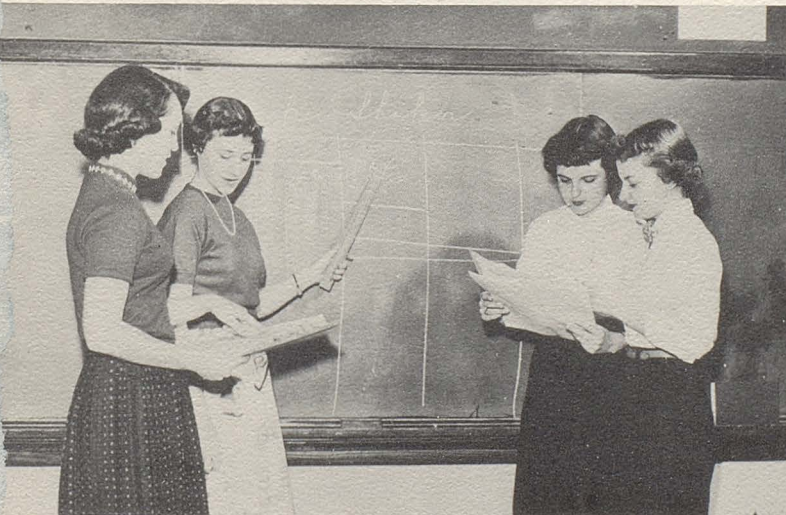

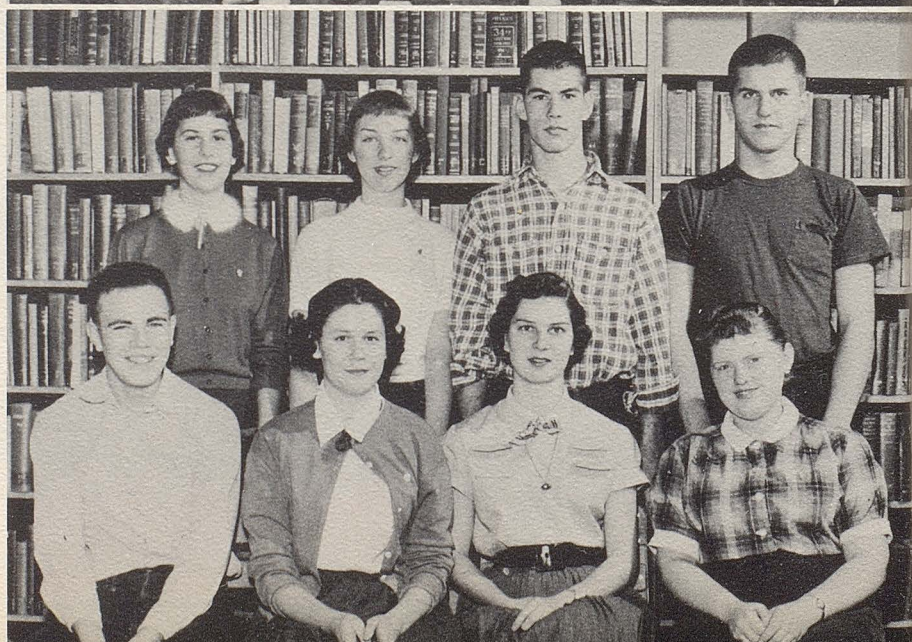

# And Our Future Teachers

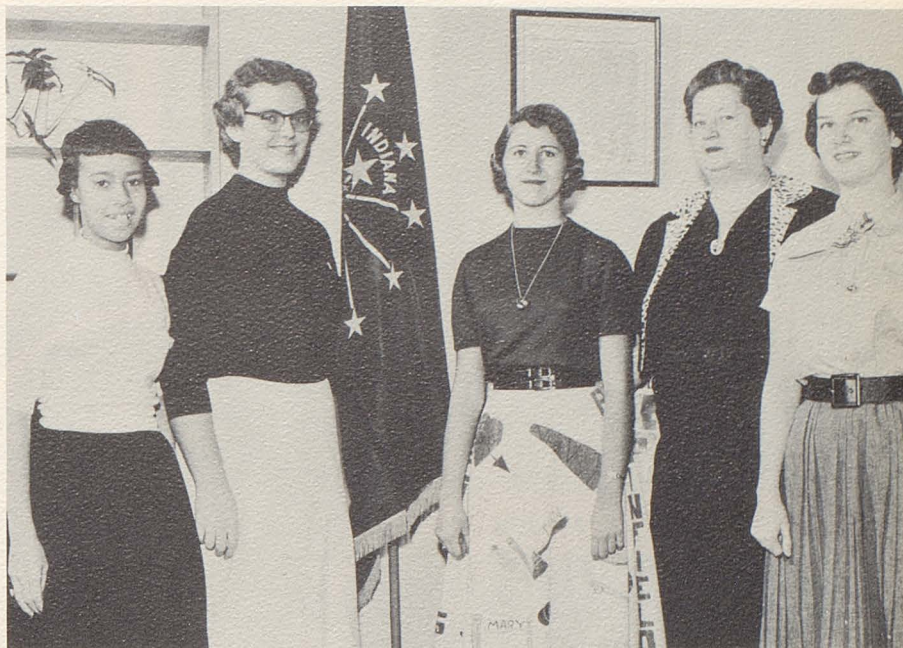

A spring project of this organization was to entertain some ladies, studying or working in Indianapolis, from foreign countries.

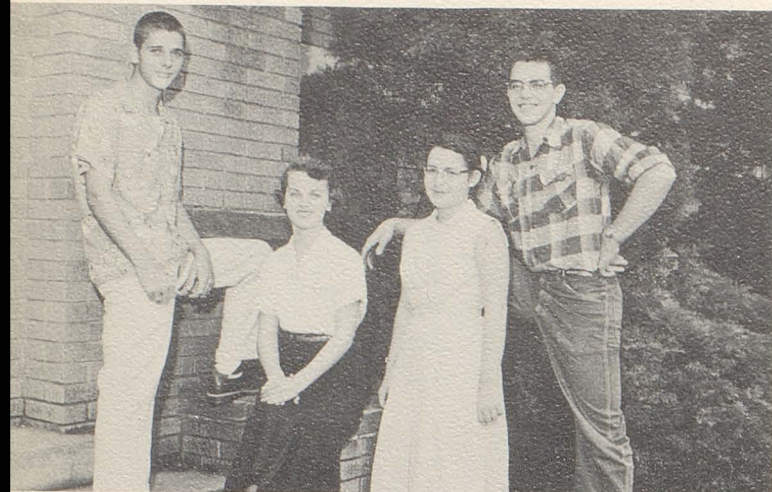

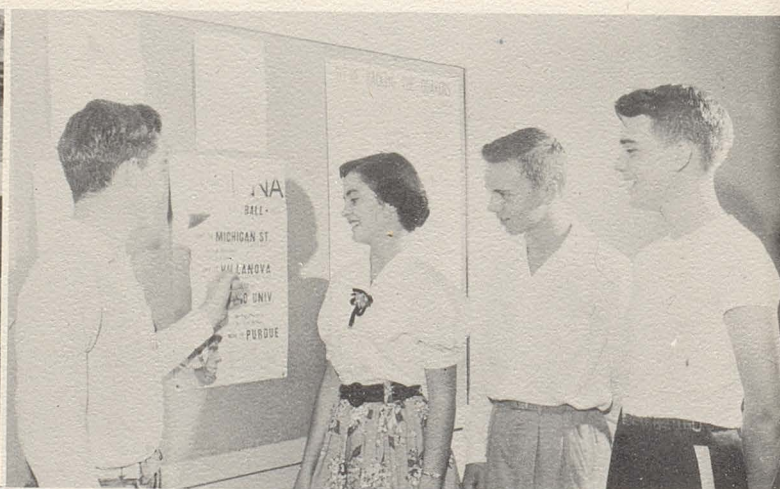
In the past year the student council, composed of the officers of the freshman, sophomore, junior, and senior classes, served the school in many ways.

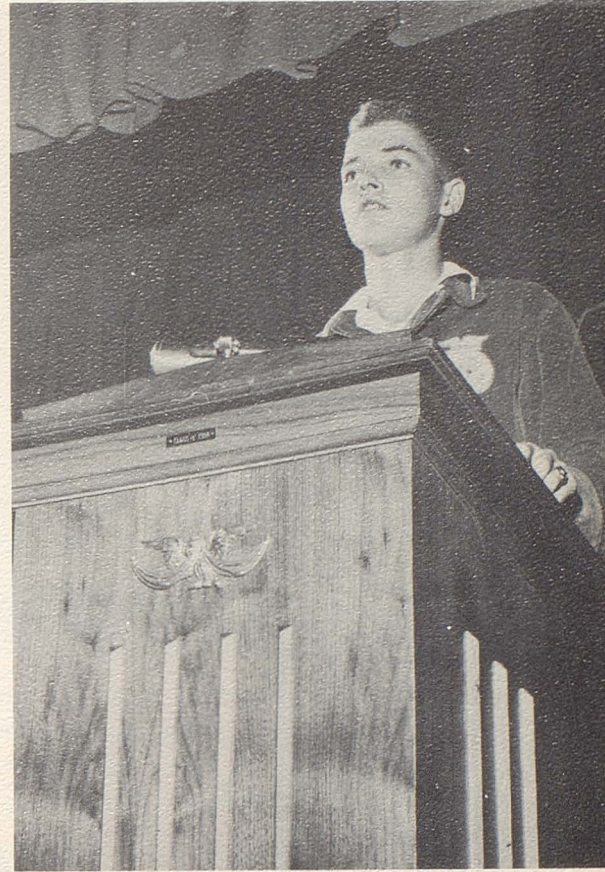
