Since most communication is done through speech, all students are encouraged to take a speech course. They learn to organize their thoughts and to present them in an effective manner with self-confidence and poise.

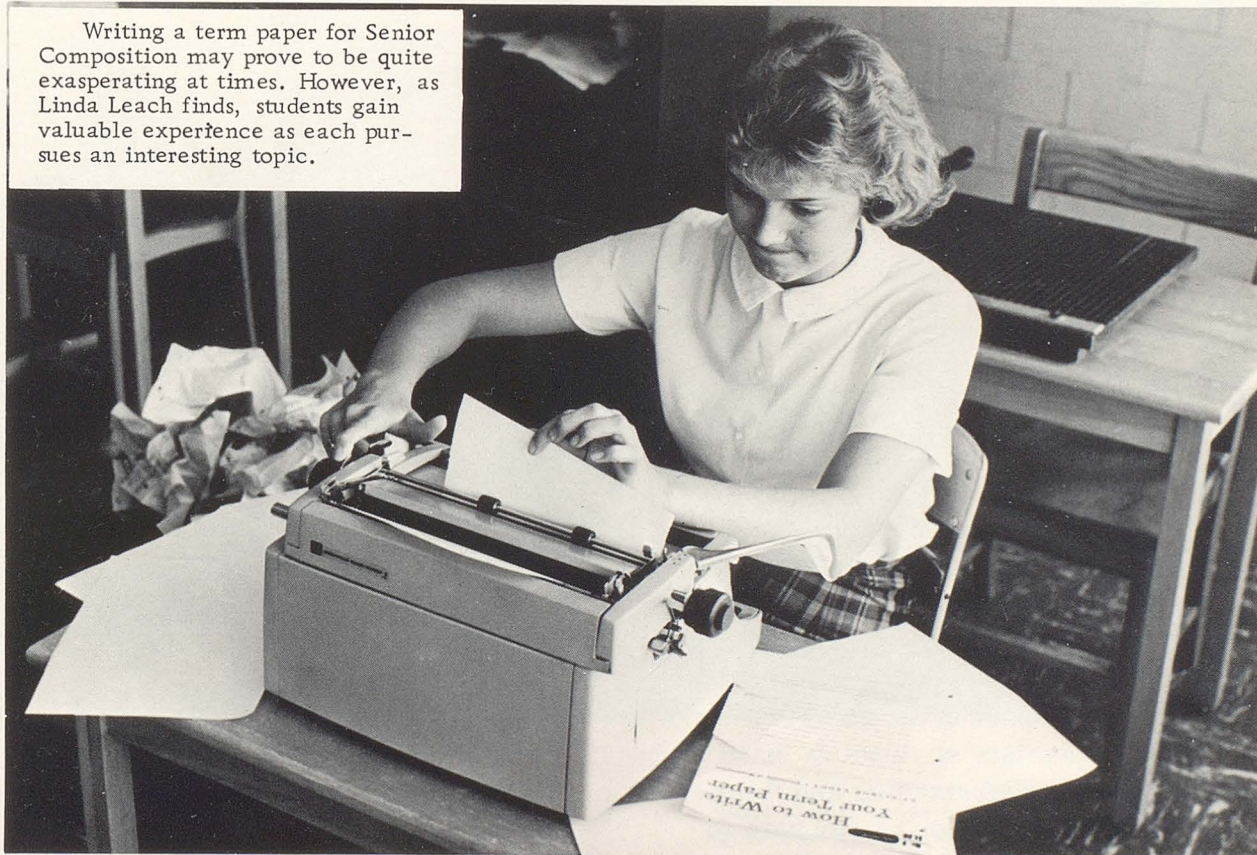
English grammar courses are designed to improve writing skills. A mastery of grammar, growth in vocabulary, and clarity in writing are their goals.

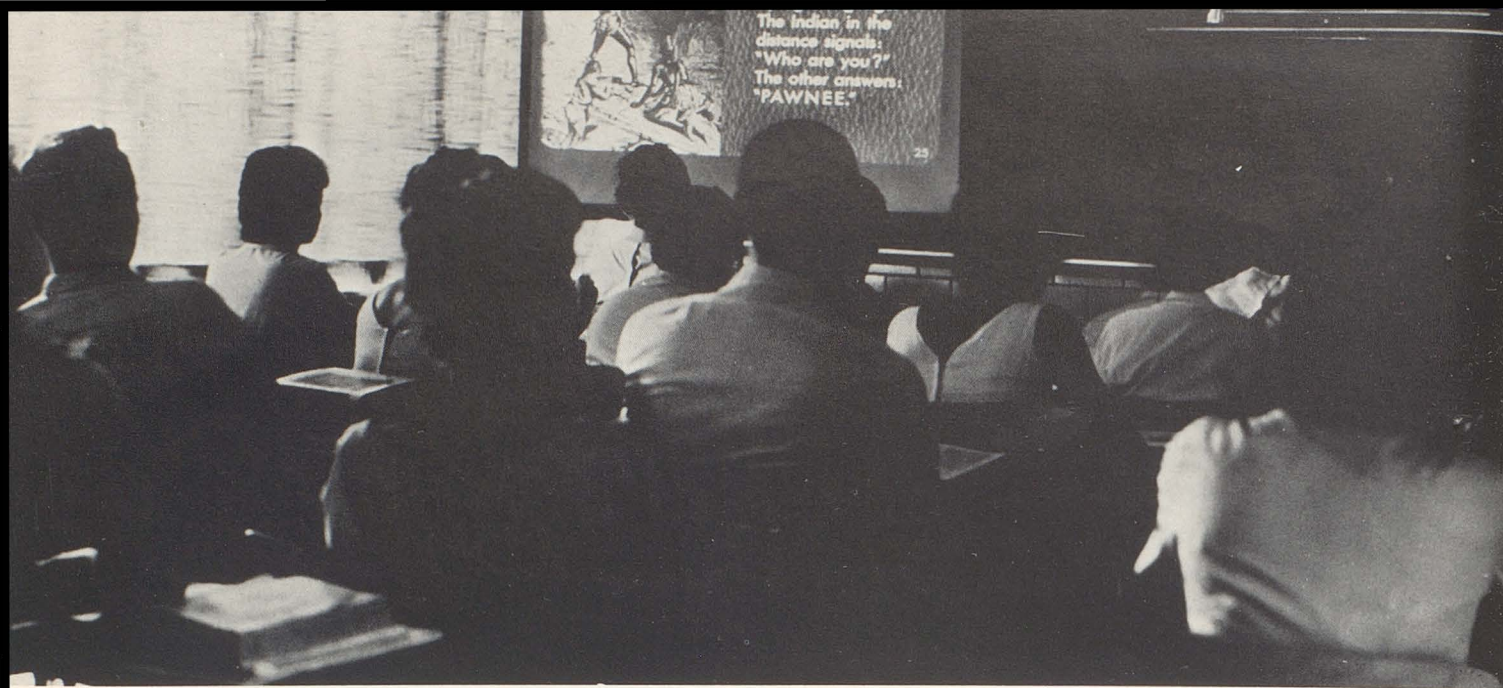
Literature-world, American, and English-introduces the old Masters. The goal is two-fold: to develop a love for reading and to teach living through reading.

The Plainfield High School social studies department has a complete course of study. The history courses - world and United States - not only help students to understand the present by studying the past, but they also instill in students an appreciation of the richness of our American heritage.

Plainfield graduates better citizens because its students have been instructed in government and economics and the American way of life. A study of current events is a large part of all social classes.

Math encourages logical thinking

Very progressive, Plainfield has encouraged students to enroll in four years of math to keep pace with the nation's demand for mathematicians in our scientific age. A wide variety of math courses is offered to all students of Plainfield High School, each challenging and encouraging analytical and logical thinking.

Geometry with all its theorems and axioms, Algebra II with its many equations, Solid Geometry with its three dimensional thinking, and College Algebra with its imaginary numbers all teach students to analyze problems, seeking a solution in an orderly, logical manner.

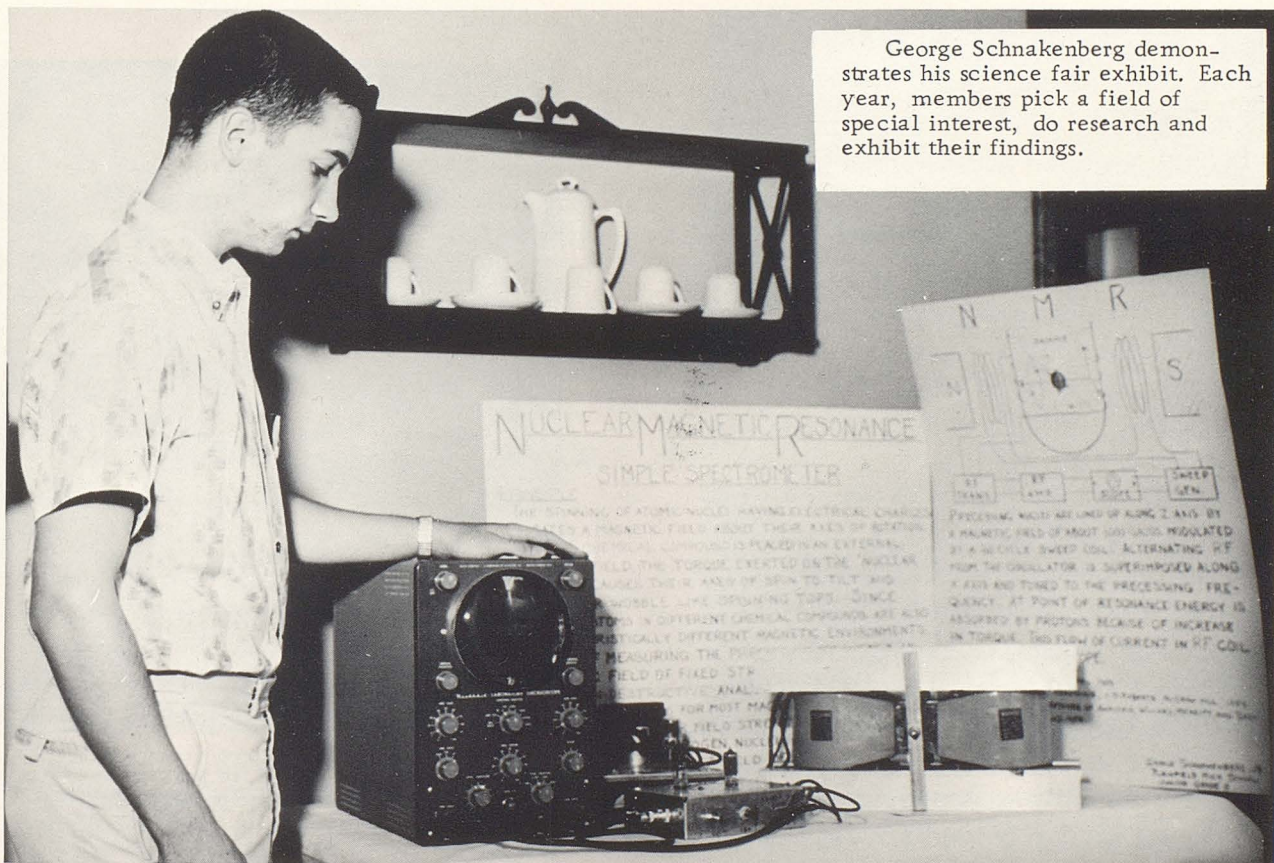
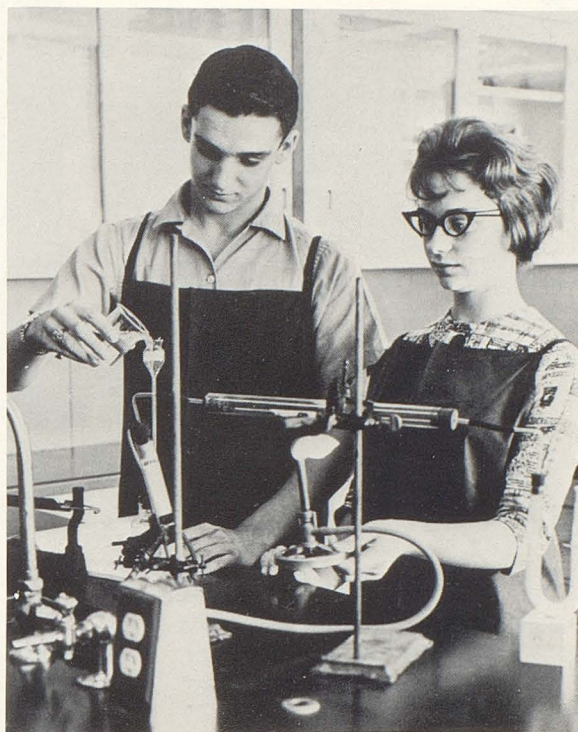

Science clarifies a modern world

In this day of rockets and space exploration, Plainfield High School is striving to meet the demands of a scientific world by enlarging the science department. Added to the curriculum this year is an advanced general science course which will enable students, for the first time, to have four years of science.

Opening the door to a better understanding of "H" bombs, rockets, and space are the old "stand-bys" -- physics and chemistry -- dressed up to meet the needs of an atomic age.

Being precise in all calculations is essential in performing a successful experiment, as Rosemary Osborn and Dick Hardin are finding out. Chemistry includes many lab periods.

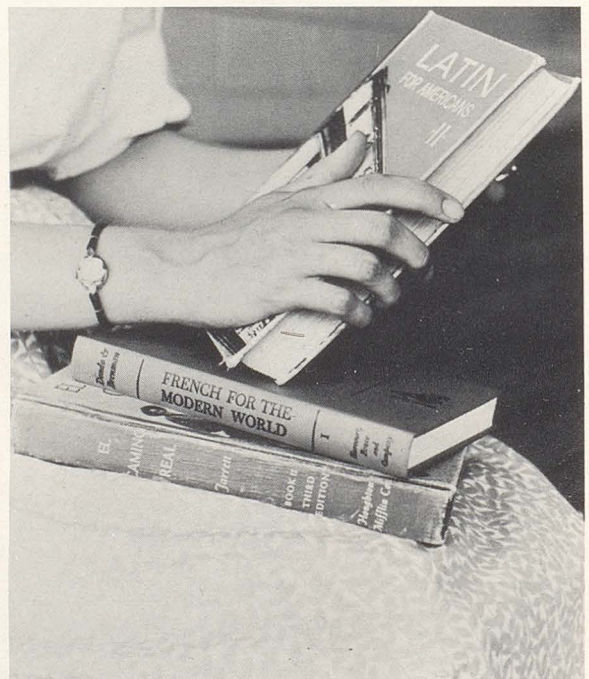


In today's rapidly shrinking world it is becoming more necessary that students be able to communicate understandably with peoples of the world if we are to have world unity.

The PHS language department offers students Spanish, French, and Latin to broaden their knowledge and understanding of other countries that are now our next door neighbors.

Spanish and French classes concentrate mostly on conversation and pronunciation because many students will at some time probably have occasion to speak these languages. Latin, the mother of all languages, still is recognized for its part in studying word derivations.

Students know that, if we can communicate forcibly with peoples of the world, we have achieved a major breakthrough toward world unity.



Which language is best for me--Latin, French, or Spanish? The choice does present a problem. However, no matter what he chooses, a student can depend upon a thorough education in any one of these three languages.

Art and music complete education



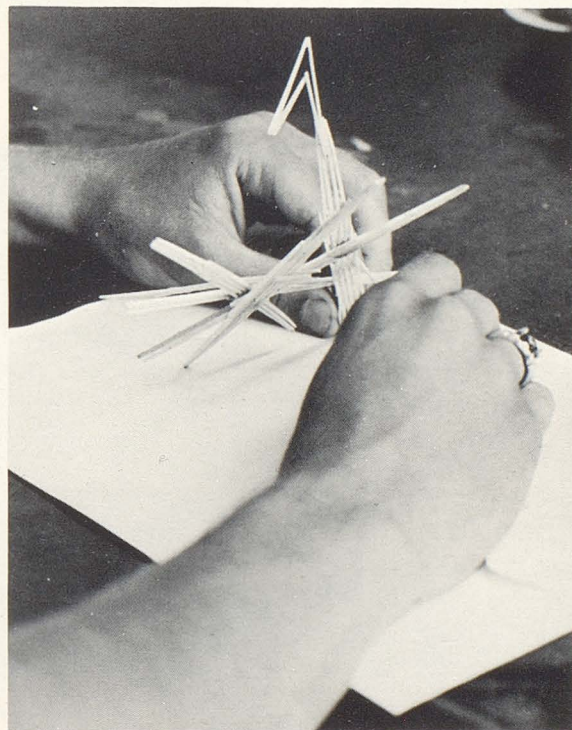

Music, art, and band-the cultural subjects-are an important supplement to the sciences and languages and make a complete, well-rounded education.

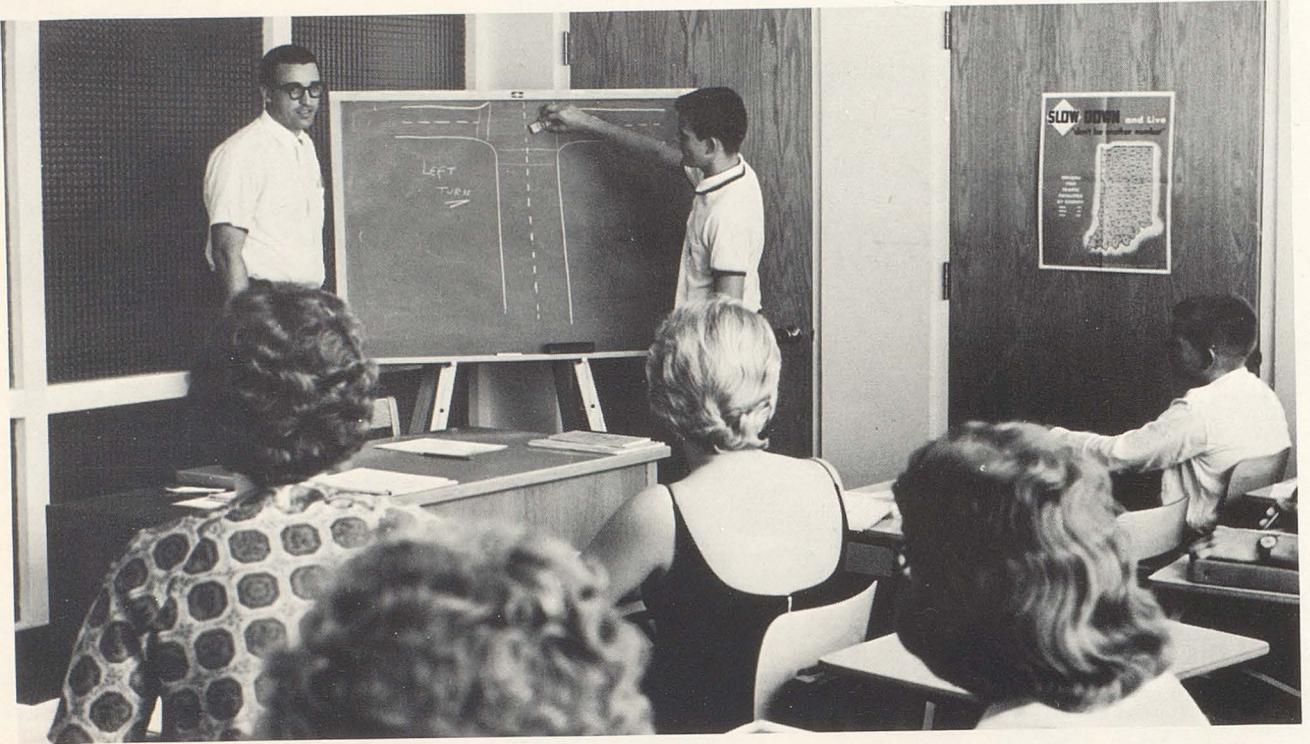

The largest of the departments, the commercial school graduates really proficient secretaries.

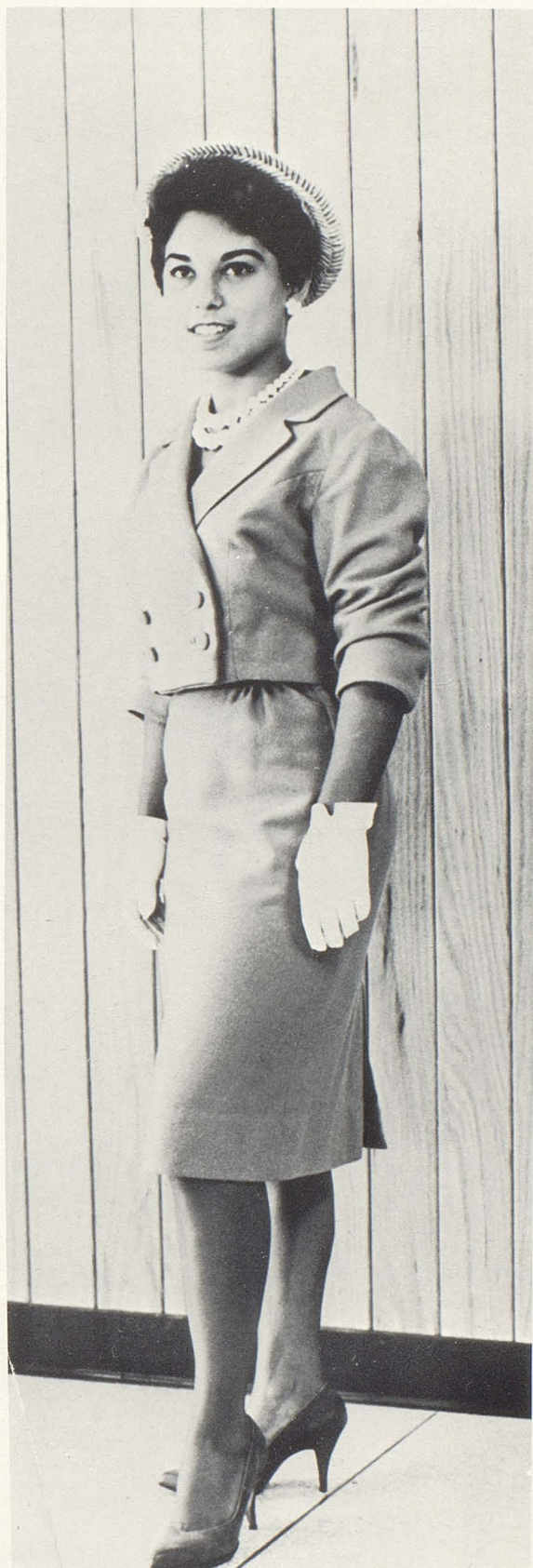

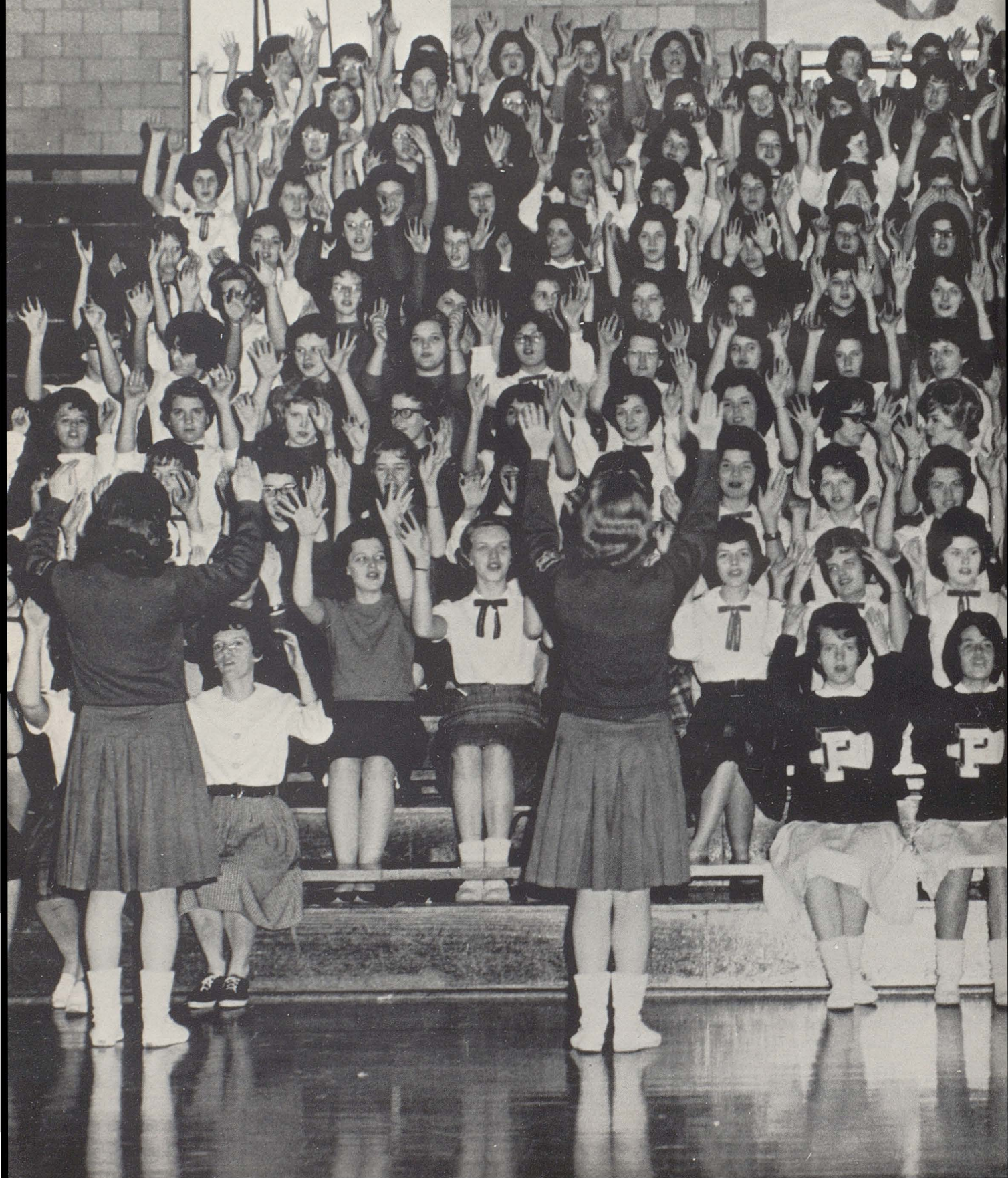

Cream for Victory--Soda U," caught the judges' admiration and a first place!

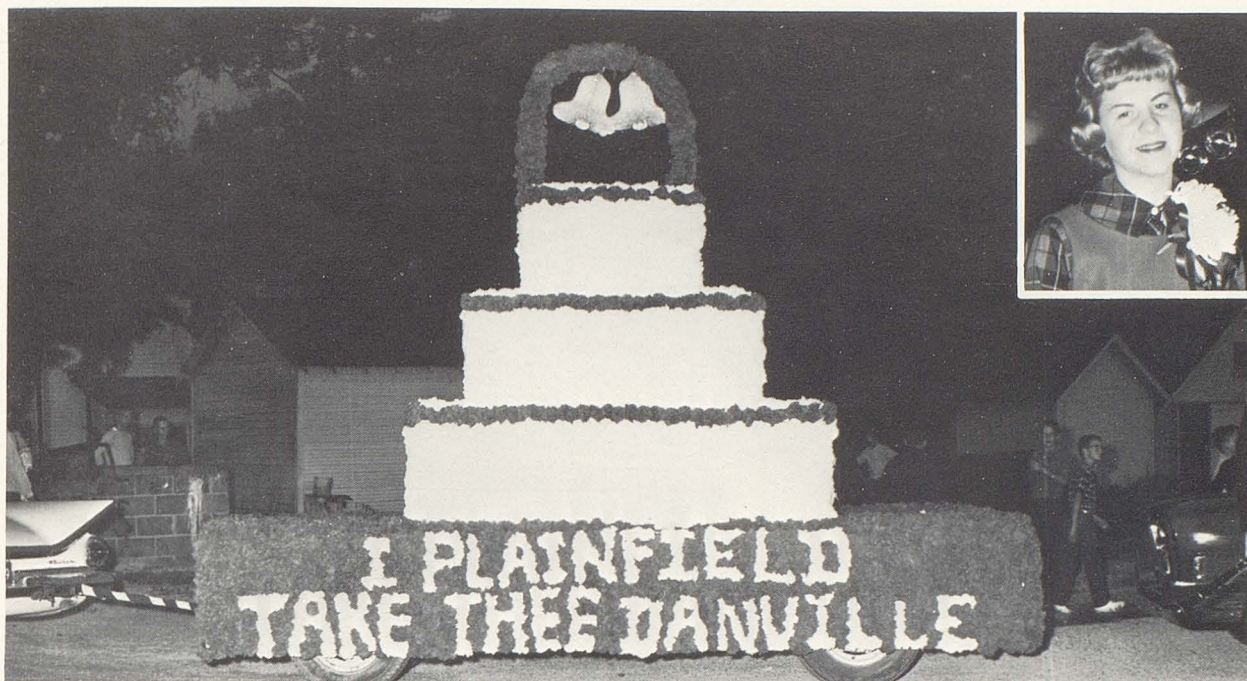

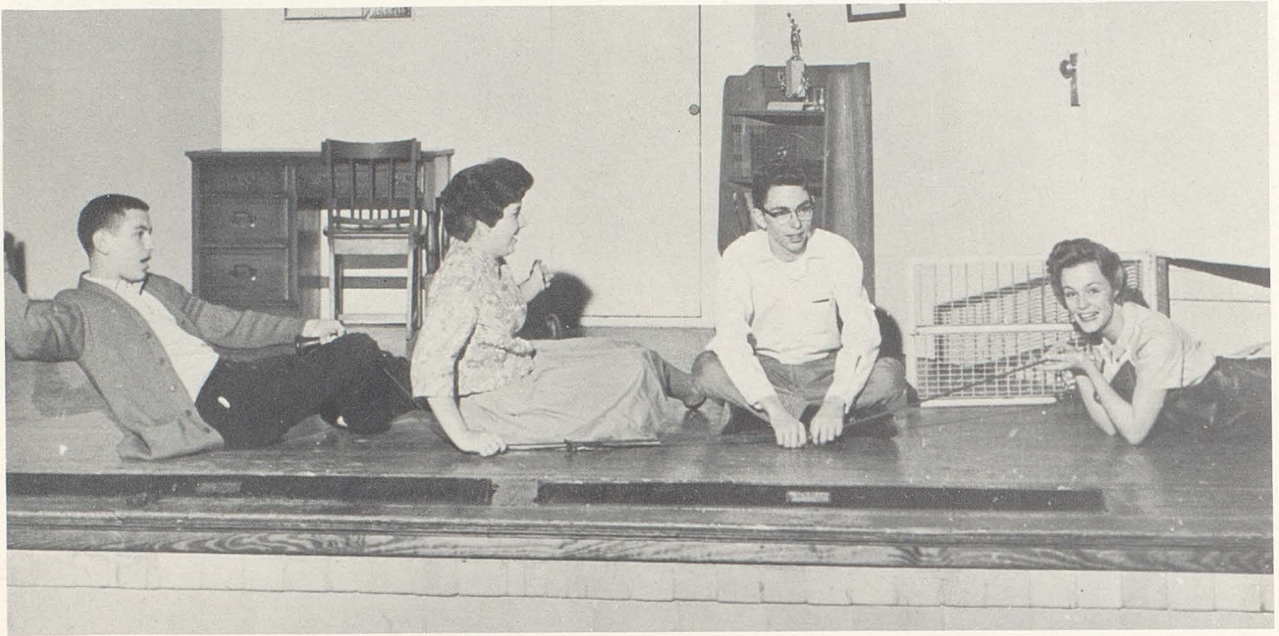

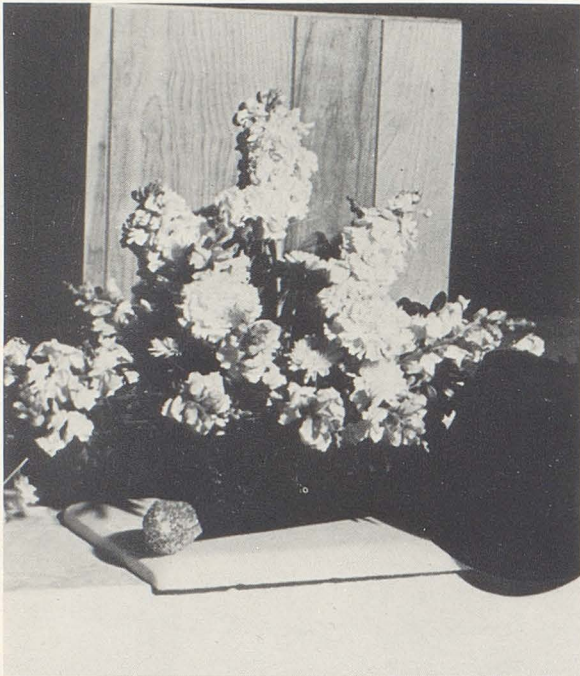

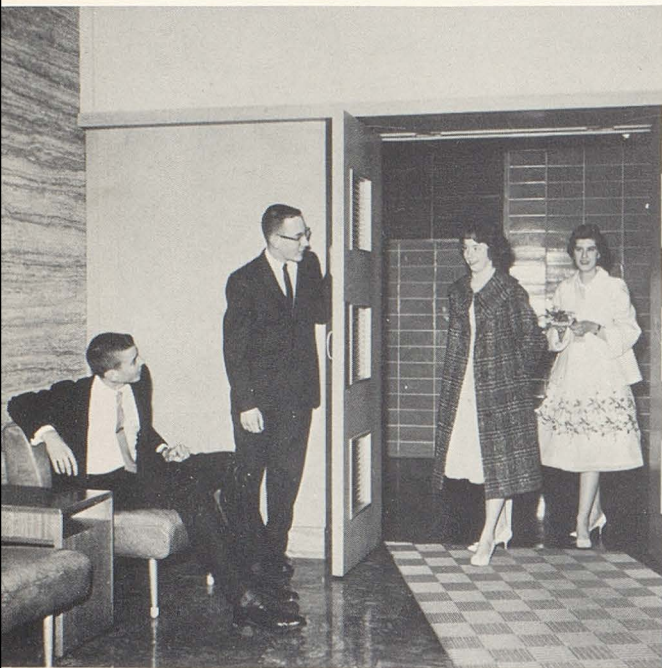

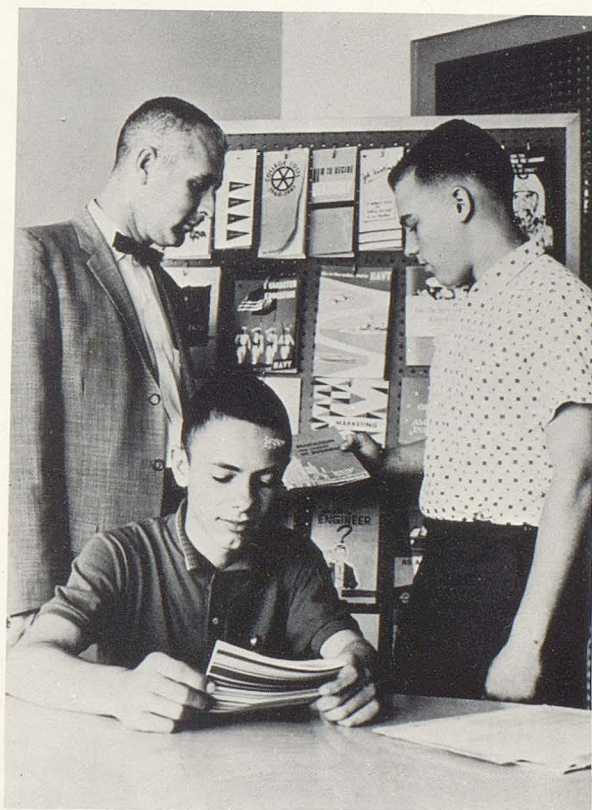

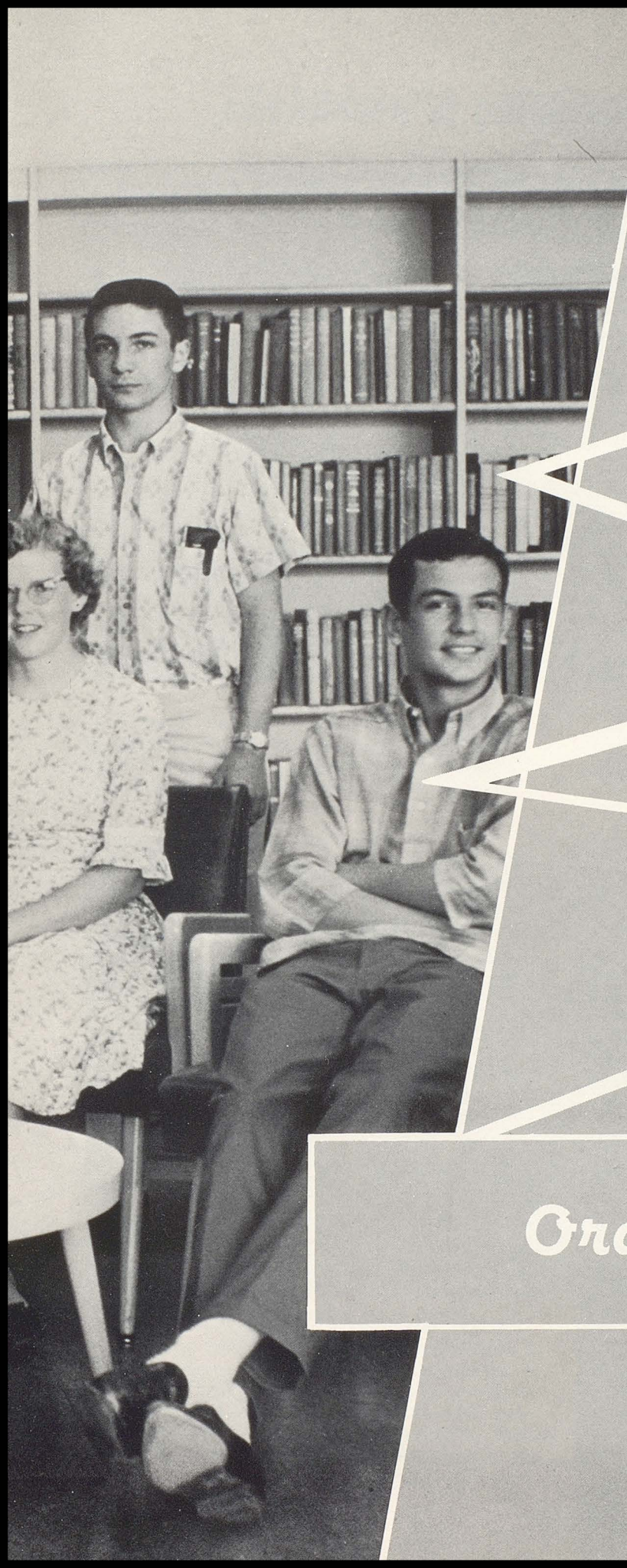

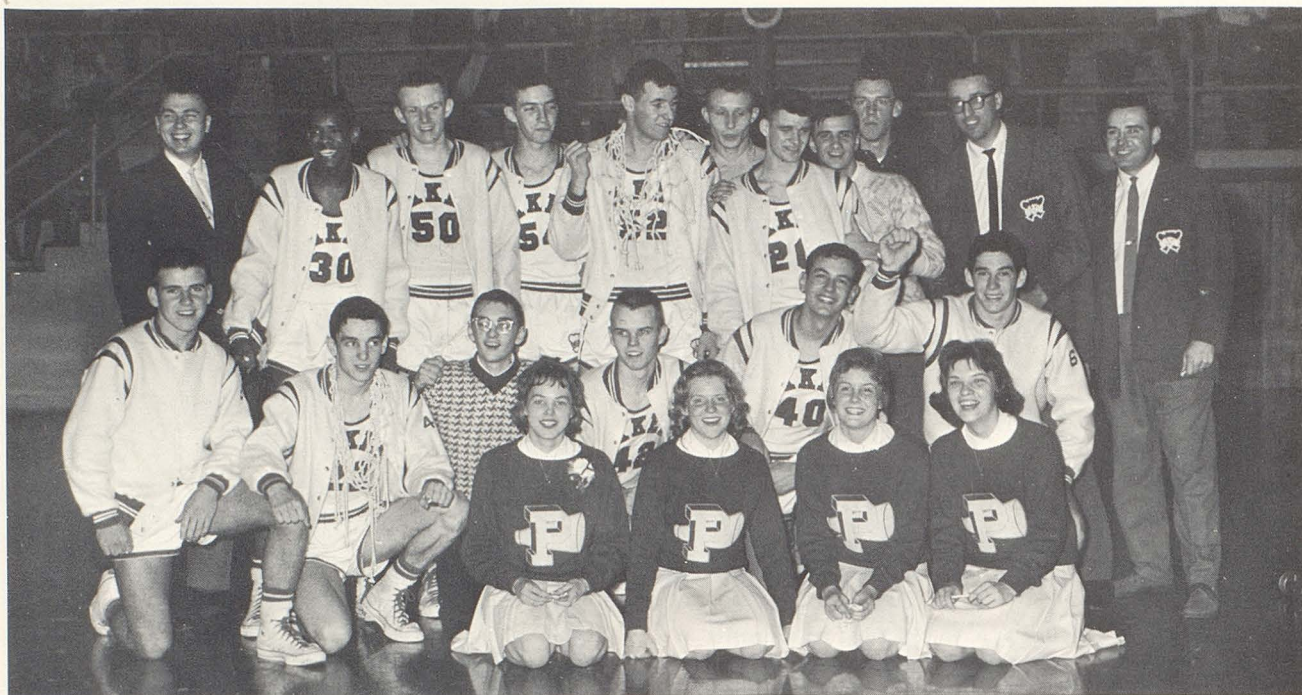

Although producing their highest score in 16 games and making 34 points in the last quarter Plainfield lost its final Mid-State game to Speedway, 87-77.

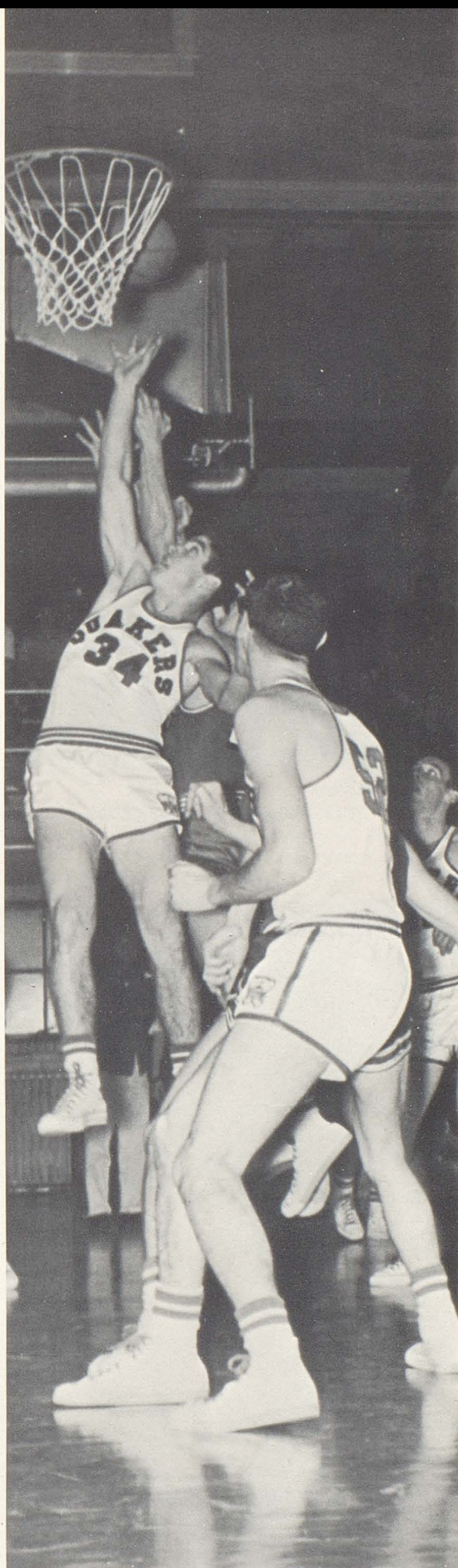

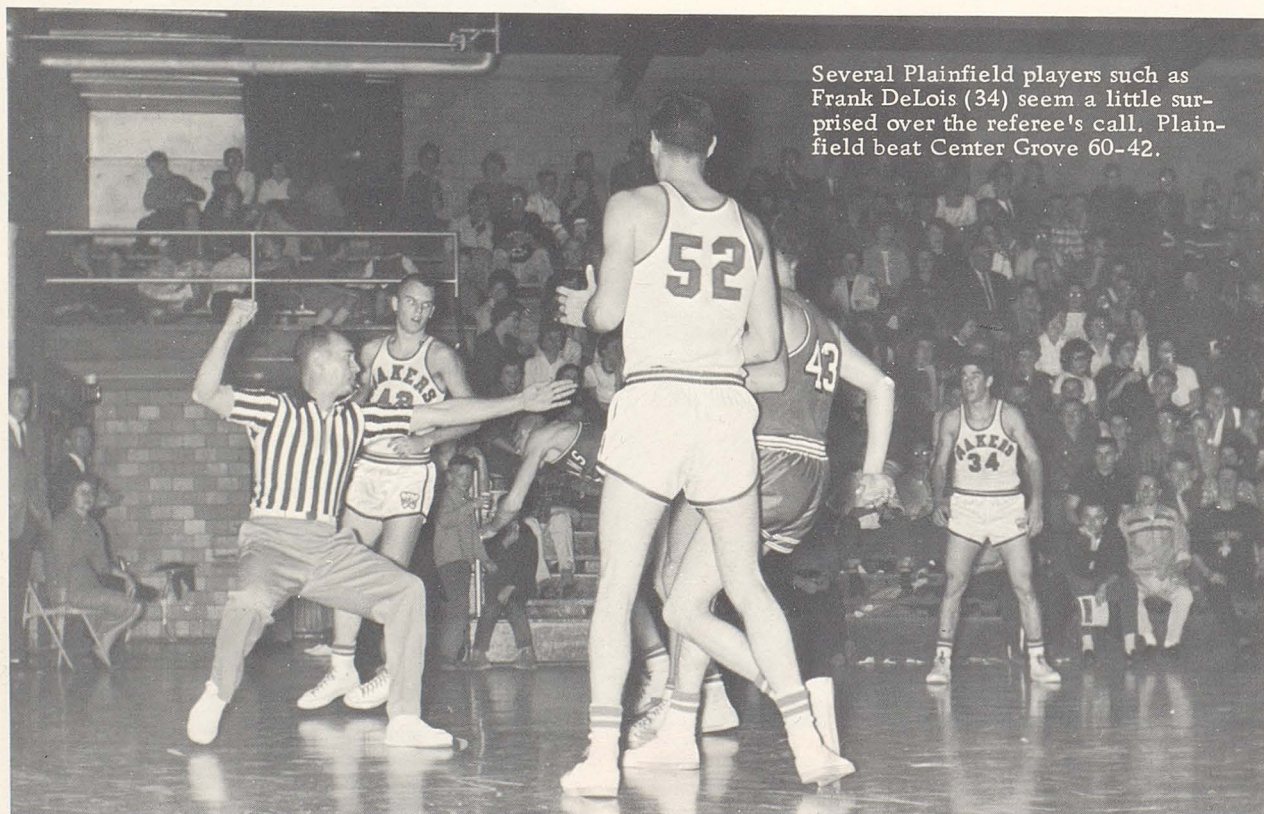
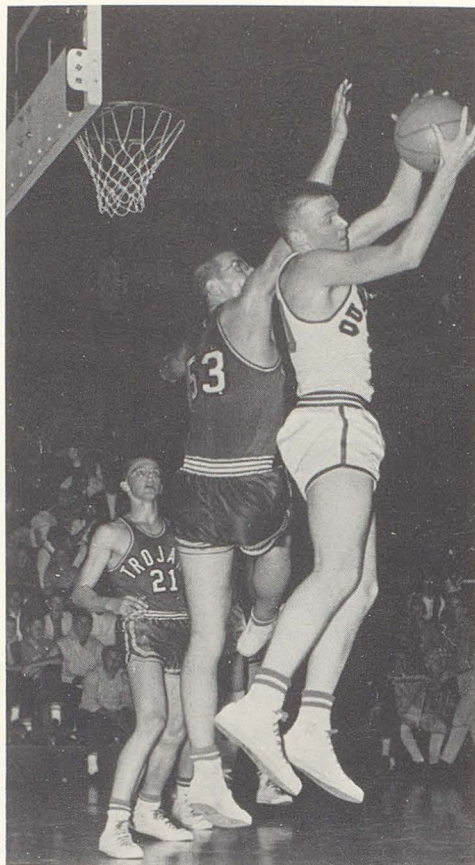

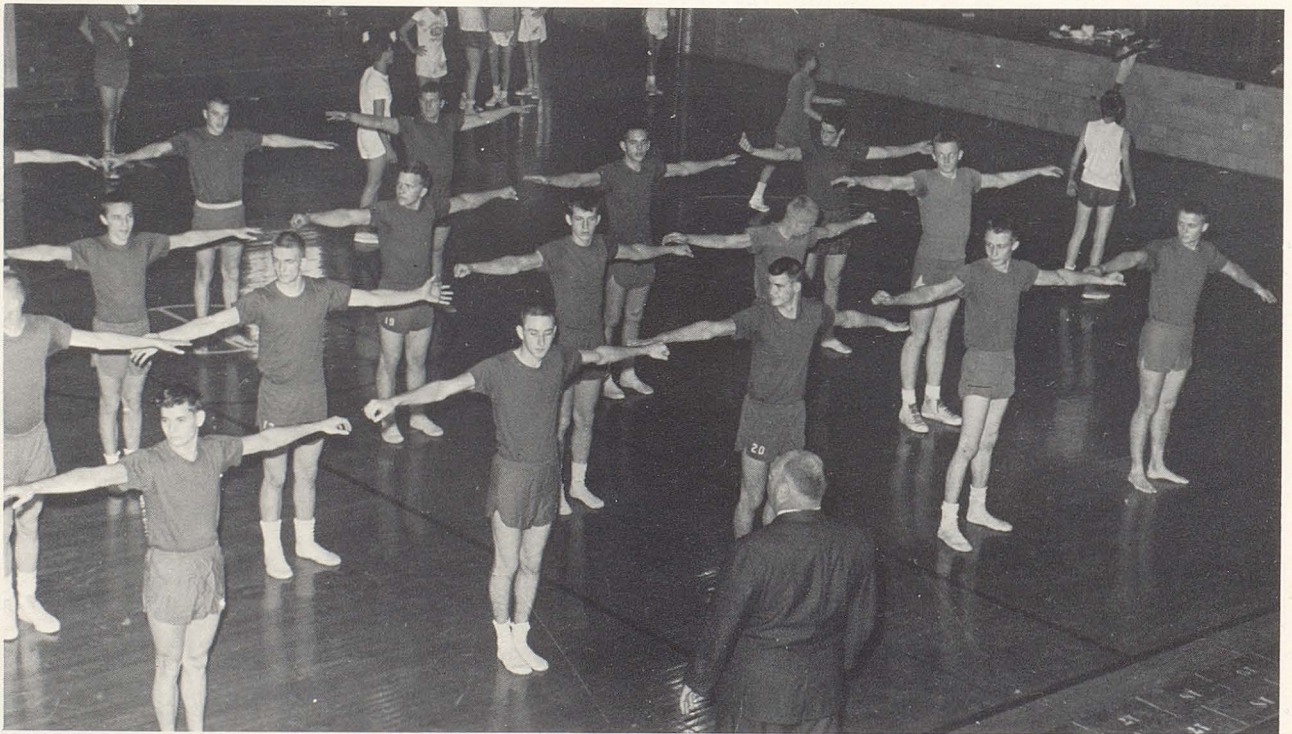
Quaker cindermen

The Cross-Country team equaled Decatur Central 29-29 in the only dual meet of the year. Russell, Abell, Bogan, Leach, and Euler all received letters.

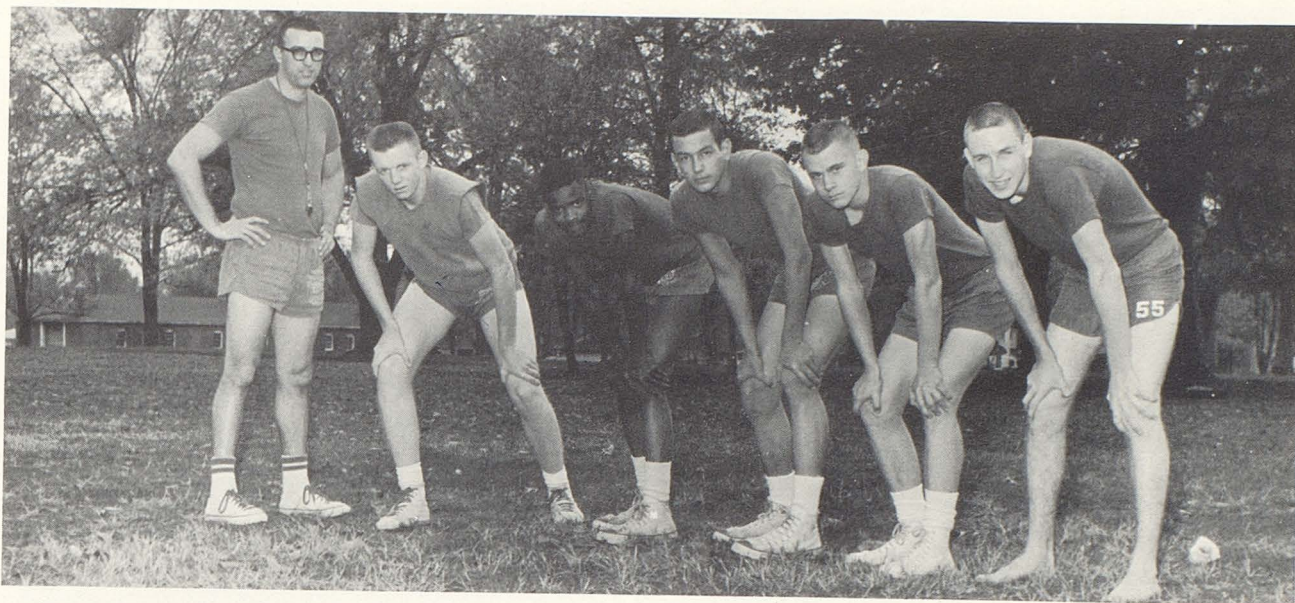

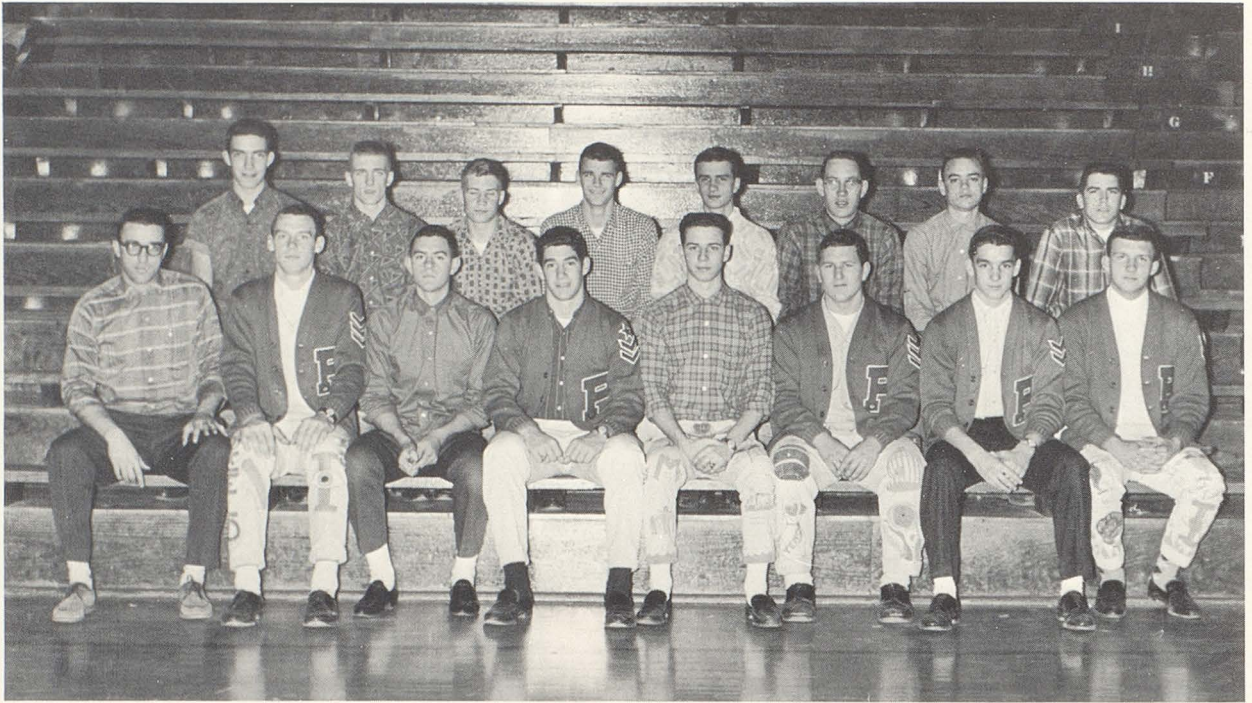
