


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

In Our Classes
















The P.H.S. Way

Logical thinking in modern mathematics +



Look over the shoulder of any plane geometry student, and what do you see? You probably see

angles, circles, triangles, and squares, all of which have a special meaning to these students.

With the precision instruments, accurate readings of a wide variety, and complicated formulas of this "scientific space age," mathematics plays a very important part in students' daily lives.

In order to keep pace with "modern math," P.H.S. offers a wide variety of courses in mathematics. Students can learn about plane, visible figures in plane geometry, solid, tangible figures in solid geometry, logarithms and intriguing equations in Algebra II, sines, cosines, and tangents in trigonometry, and sets, matrices, and functions in college algebra.

By solving math problems in a wellorganized fashion, students learn valuable training that can be applied to other situations in their everyday living.

organized work in science = today's teens


In today's growing world, there is an urgent demand for science and its applications. Our expanding population and complex mode of living present problems that must be solved.

P.H.S., recognizing this challenge, has made significant strides in meeting it by providing a good scientific foundation for our students.





Learning to speak and write correctly is the main objective of the P.H.S. language departments. Not only do students learn about English, but they also have the opportunity to enroll in Latin, Spanish, or French.

The Language Arts program includes speech, journalism, composition, and literature. Speech, the basic element for conveying thoughts and ideas, is important because students learn to express themselves in conversation. After learning to express their thoughts orally, students learn in composition classes to put them down on paper. Along with learning to express their thoughts, students learn in literature to interpret the thoughts of others.










