






With the assassination of John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts, youngest president in U.S. history, the country lost a highly-regarded and remarkably capable statesman and administrator.






Whether at convocations or pep sessions, the 600 member high school now fills the entire south bleachers to overflowing.

Affectionately named "the barn" or "the Cow Palace," the southernmost section of the new building now used for drafting and chorus classes will be the industrial arts department when the building is completed.






An old-fashioned scene in a fast moving world . . . Students still enjoy being alone together in a crowded drugstore.

"When weather permits, students shall walk to convocations." With this statement in mind the student body "hikes" over the hill to the Jr. High Gym.



One of the outstanding projects of the year is to work with the Student Council in executing mock elections for student body offices.




Current events play an important part in any social studies class. In Mr. Kost's World history class three students look over "World News of the Week."

Perhaps it was because of the many "heated" discussions in the language arts classes, or perhaps it was because of the "hot" teachers, but whatever the reason, English and language courses now occupy the air-conditioned rooms in the new wing of the building.

Recognizing the need for better communication among people and countries, PHS stresses the importance of a good language background for all students.

Four years of literature and English are offered, three of those being required of all students. Journalism and speech are also available for interested students.

Latin, French, and Spanish offer students an opportunity to become acquainted with other peoples of the world and their customs.

New this year is the shop area in the "barn." Although it is not yet complete, drafting classes are now meeting in the high school. The large vacant area suggests a promise of a large, complete shop program at PHS in the near future.

With over half of the girls in the school enrolled in a home economic course, all of the facilities are in use every period in the day. In the modernistic suite of rooms girls learn practical basis for building a good home life.

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From geometry and trigonometry to physics and

Plainfield High School offers a complete course in mathematics. Administration and teachers alike acknowledge the need for students' knowing how to cope with figures.

Plane geometry, dealing with plane figures, Algebra II, setting the background for higher math, trigonometry, using the basic fundamentals of the triangle, and college algebra, preparing the college-bound math students, set the pace for the PHS math courses.


Besides learning to work with numbers and figures, PHS math students learn to manipulate such tools as the slide rule, compass, protractor, and such tables as log tables, square root tables, and trigonometric functions.

Solid geometry, as of this year, is incorporated into plane geometry and trigonometry. Also, as a result of growth and increased interest, a new full time teacher was added to the math staff.

chemistry, students learn basics of logic and reason.




Miss Trion, a student teacher from Indiana State College, explains to one of her classes in trigonometry the proof of similar triangles.


PHS has met the challenge of the "Space Age."

The fumes of sulphur drift from the chemistry room as students experiment. Sue Lowery uses some laboratory equipment in one of the many experiments.






The magnetic driving board, operated here by Bob Cooper, allows students to simulate actual driving practices.

Although PHS is primarily concerned with academic subjects, it does offer the student the following various elective courses--driver education, art, band, chorus, health and safety.






Both the monthly school paper, Quaker Shaker, and the yearbook, <u>Silhouettes</u>, have their headquarters in the new publications office.







After much preparation and anticipation, the big night of Homecoming finally arrived with the parade, the game, and the dance.


A colorful parade included the PHS band, the hopeful queen candidates, and the class floats.


























