

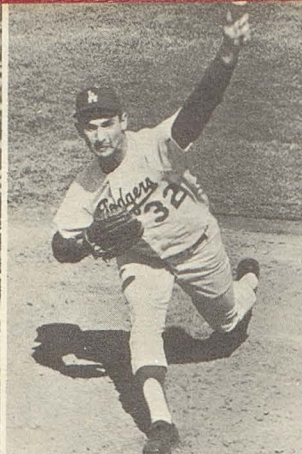

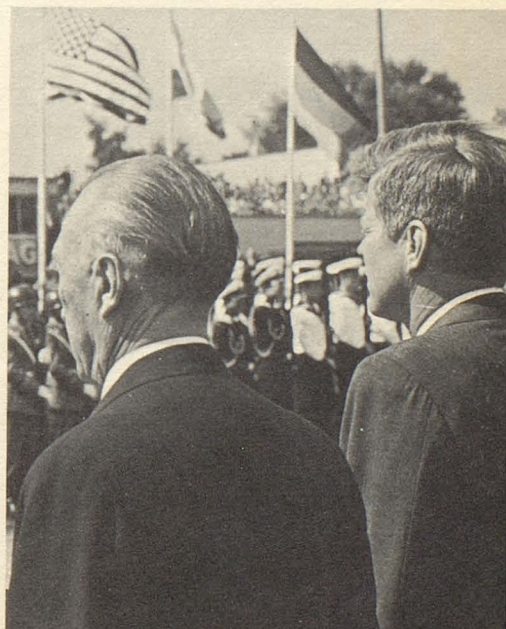

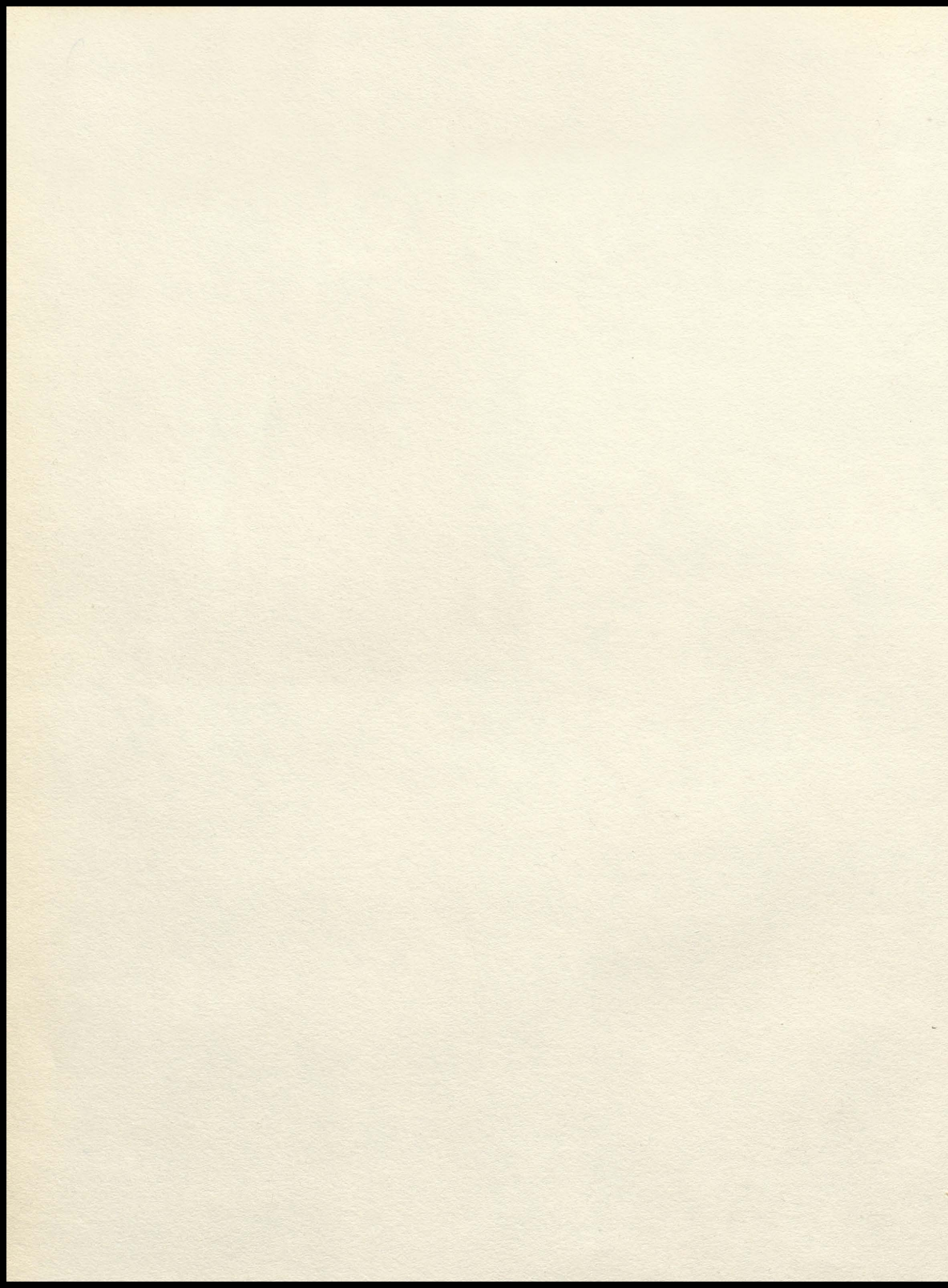

Every morning first period and at various times during the day, Mr. Abel announces activities and discusses school policies.



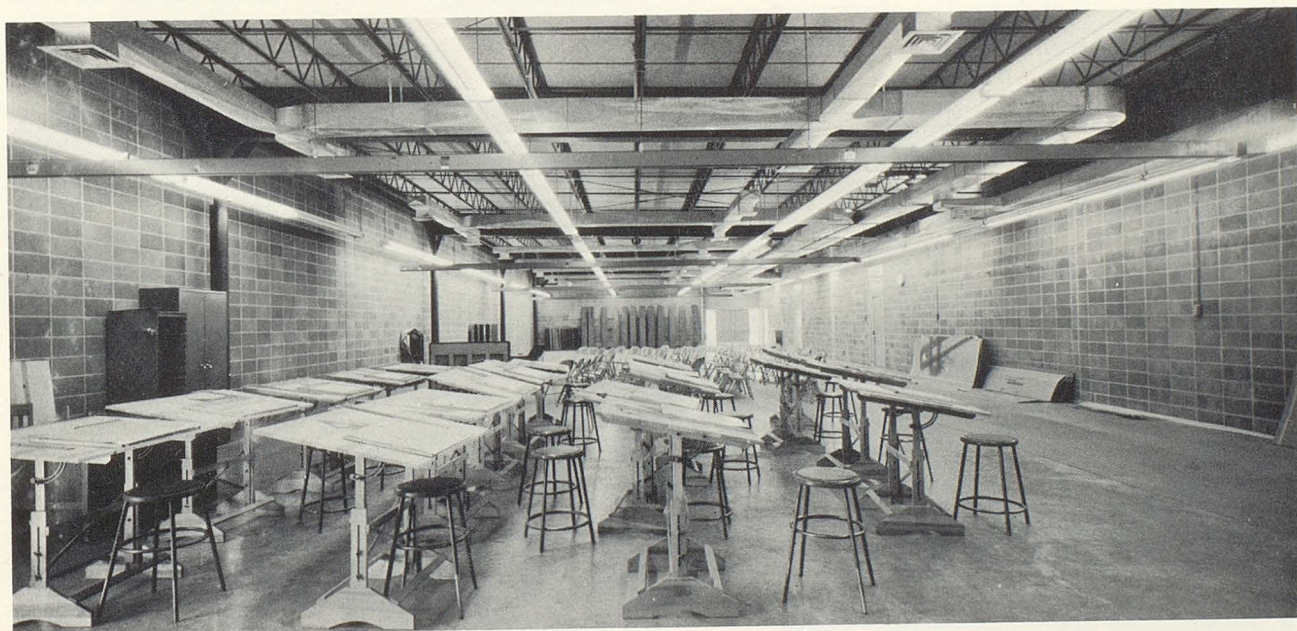

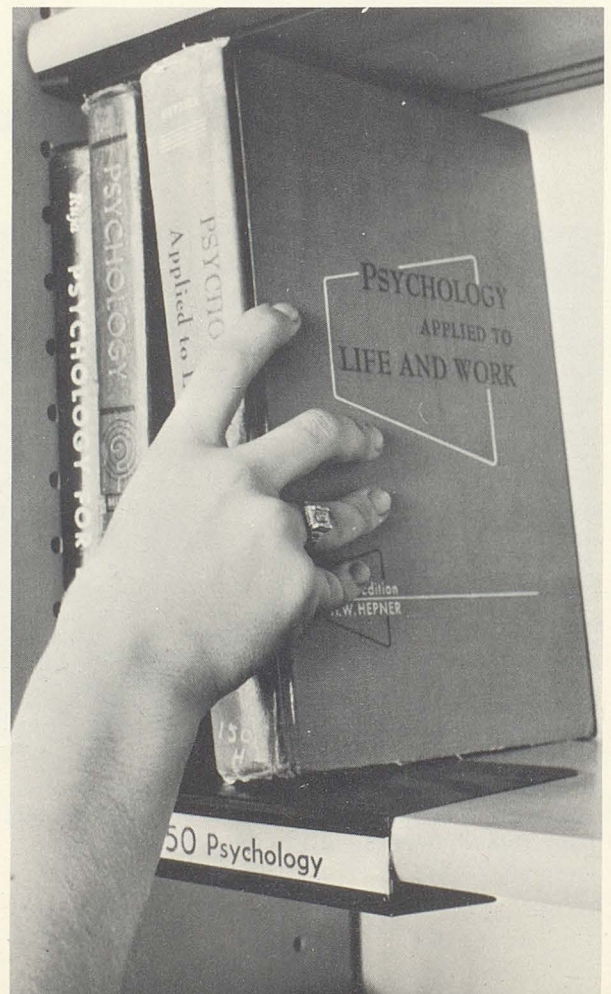

Auxiliary and Tri Kappa make this experience available to two boys and three girls the summer before the senior year. Jean Johnson also attended.



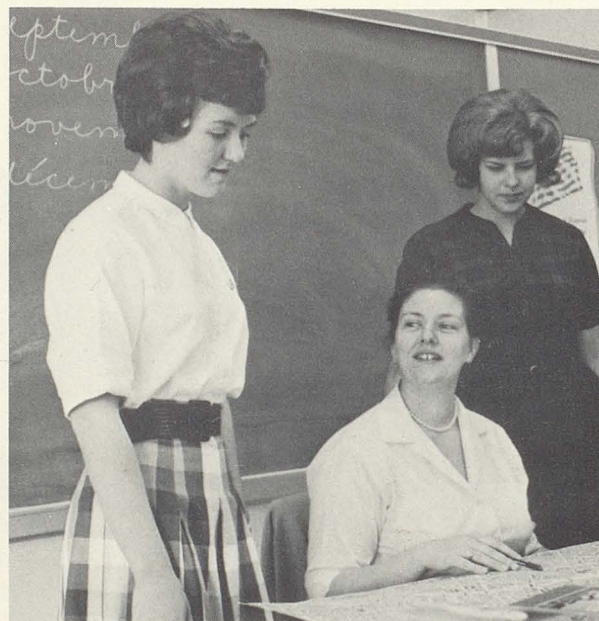
## Language-English and foreign-stresses understanding

Perhaps it was because of the many "heated" discussions in the language arts classes, or perhaps it was because of the "hot" teachers, but whatever the reason, English and language courses now occupy the air-conditioned rooms in the new wing of the building.

Recognizing the need for better communication among people and countries, PHS stresses the importance of a good language background for all students.

Four years of literature and English are offered, three of those being required of all students. Journalism and speech are also available for interested students.

Latin, French, and Spanish offer students an opportunity to become acquainted with other peoples of the world and their customs.

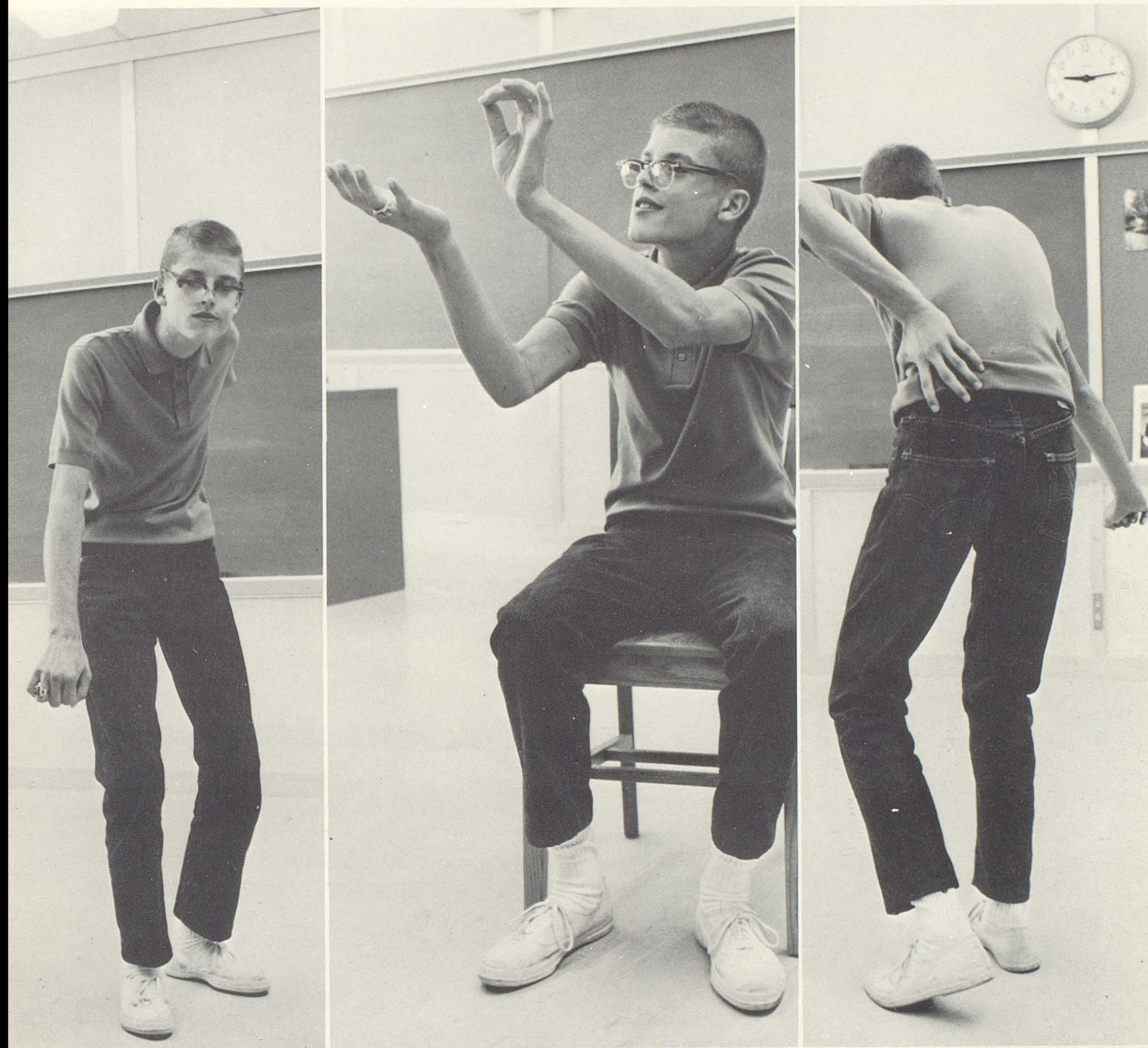


English department students benefit from the use of films, reports, records and outside reading. Tom Osborn informs the class of his reading.

home. By having other students guess what has been acted out, the student can see how gestures portray character and meaning.





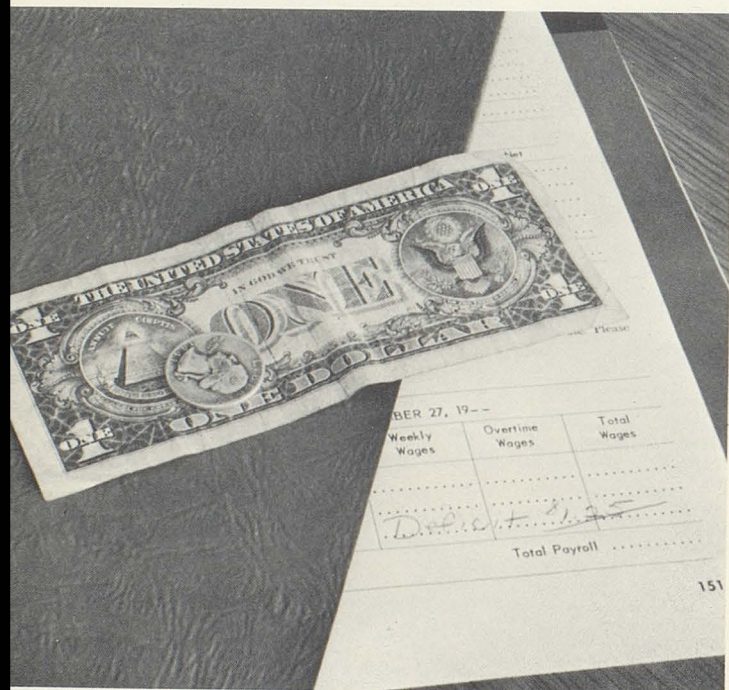
The stop watch plays an important part in commercial courses. When preparing to go into the business

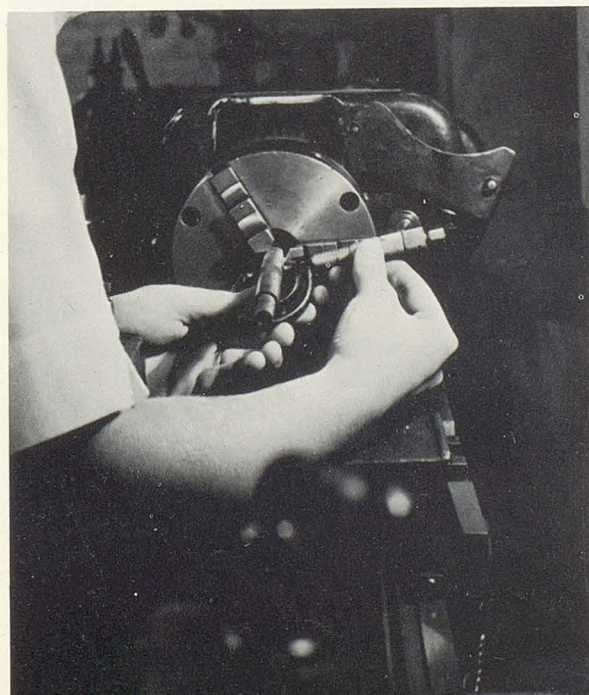

New this year is the shop area in the "barn." Although it is not yet complete, drafting classes are now meeting in the high school. The large vacant area suggests a promise of a large, complete shop program at PHS in the near future.

With over half of the girls in the school enrolled in a home economic course, all of the facilities are in use every period in the day. In the modernistic suite of rooms girls learn practical basis for building a good home life.




## From geometry and trigonometry to physics and

Plainfield High School offers a complete course in mathematics. Administration and teachers alike acknowledge the need for students' knowing how to cope with figures.

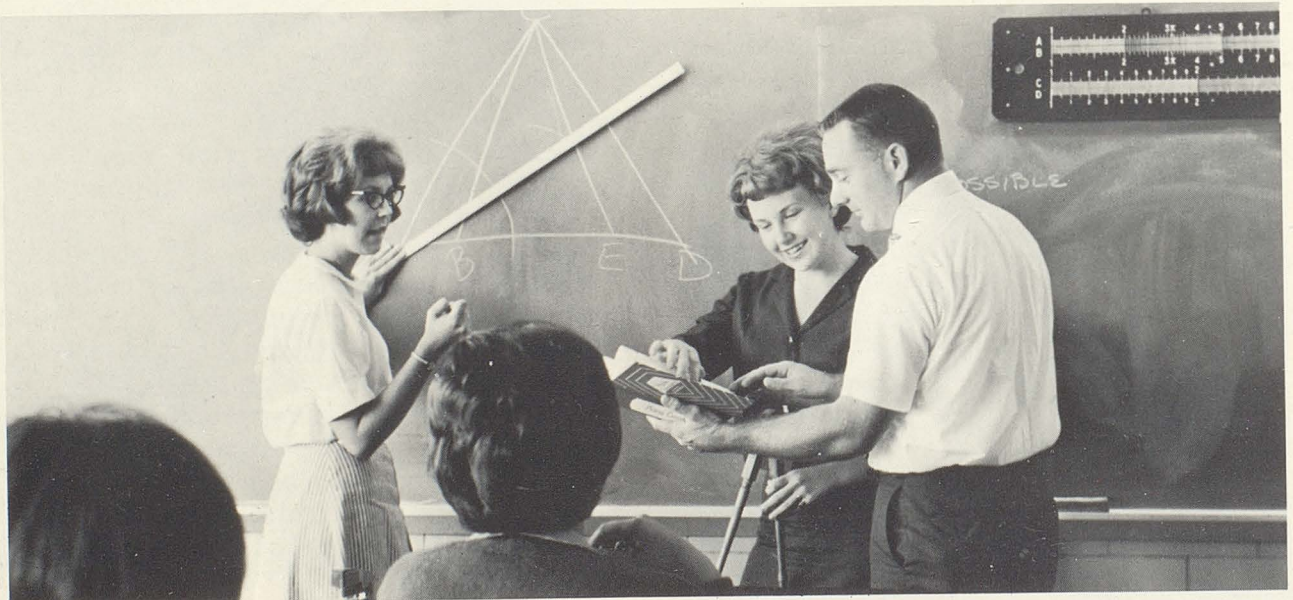
Plane geometry, dealing with plane figures, Algebra II, setting the background for higher math, trigonometry, using the basic fundamentals of the triangle, and college algebra, preparing the college-bound math students, set the pace for the PHS math courses.

Besides learning to work with numbers and figures, PHS math students learn to manipulate such tools as the slide rule, compass, protractor, and such tables as log tables, square root tables, and trigonometric functions.

Solid geometry, as of this year, is incorporated into plane geometry and trigonometry. Also, as a result of growth and increased interest, a new full time teacher was added to the math staff.



Physics students apply what they learn in class to their laboratory work. Barbara Dickey and Bill Muncy measure water temperature.

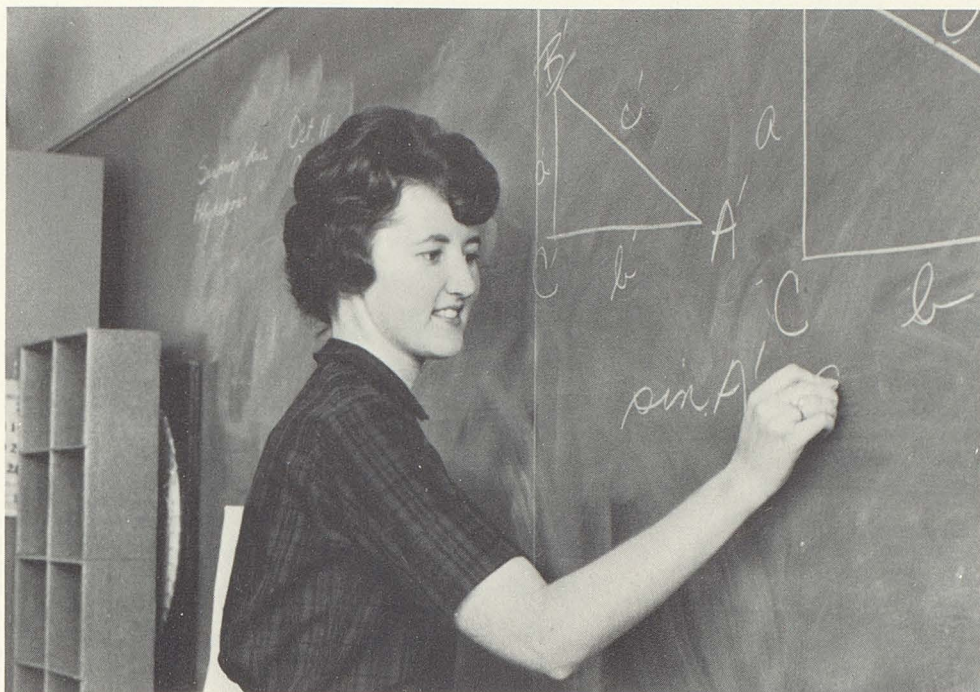

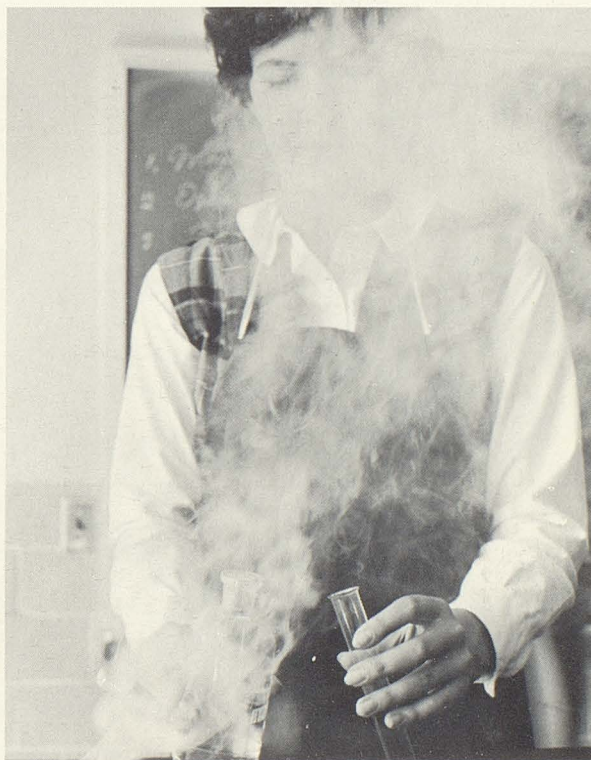
Miss Trion, a student teacher from Indiana State College, explains to one of her classes in trigonometry the proof of similar triangles.

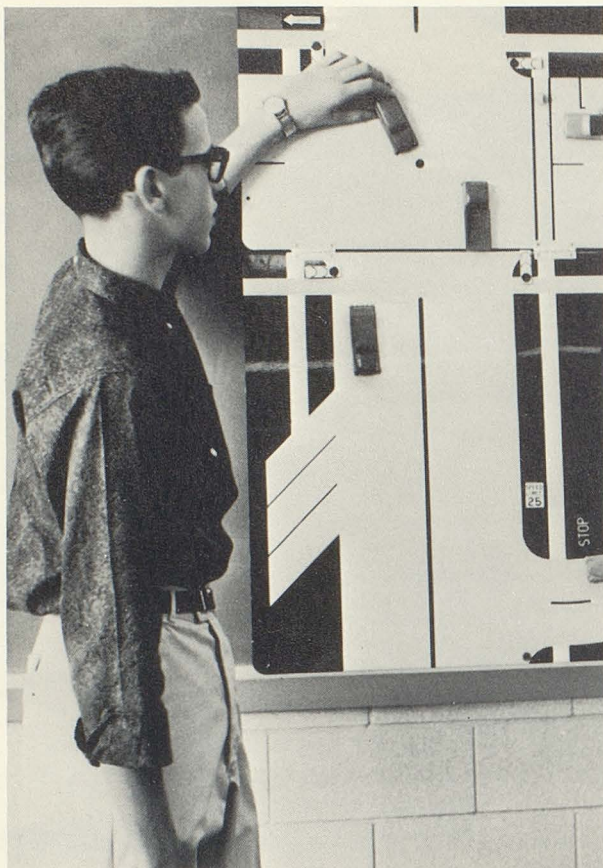

The fumes of sulphur drift from the chemistry room as students experiment. Sue Lowery uses some laboratory equipment in one of the many experiments.





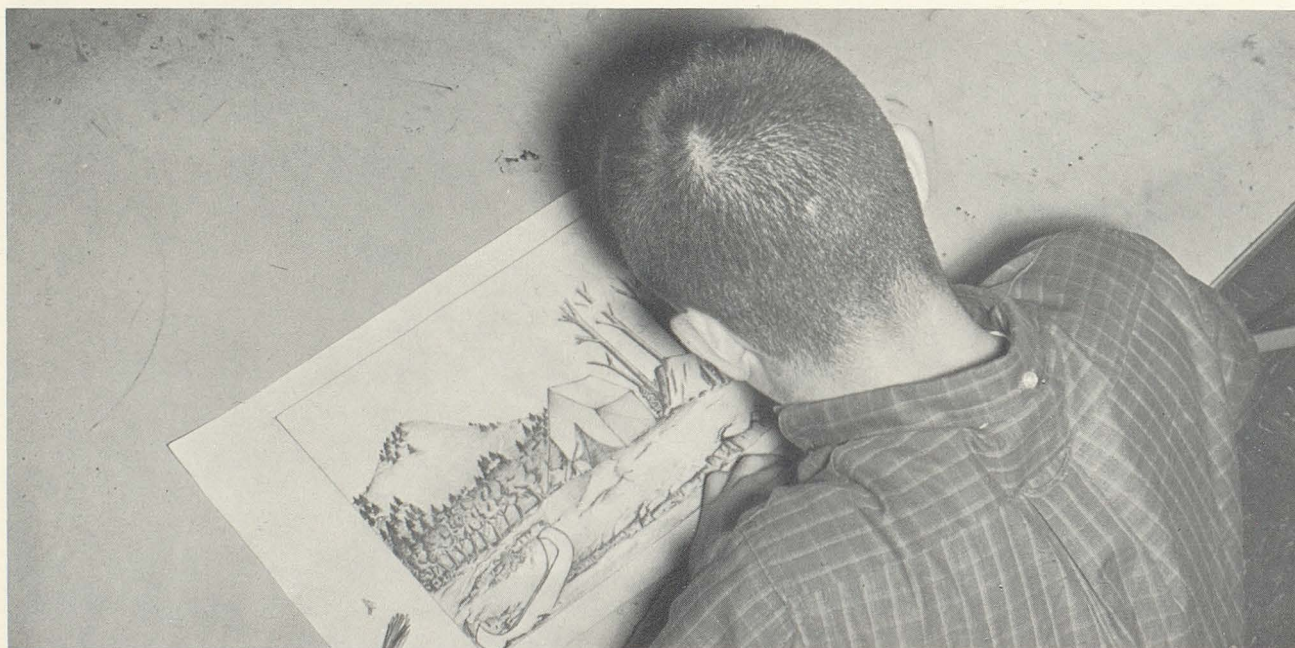


The magnetic driving board, operated here by Bob Cooper, allows students to simulate actual driving practices.

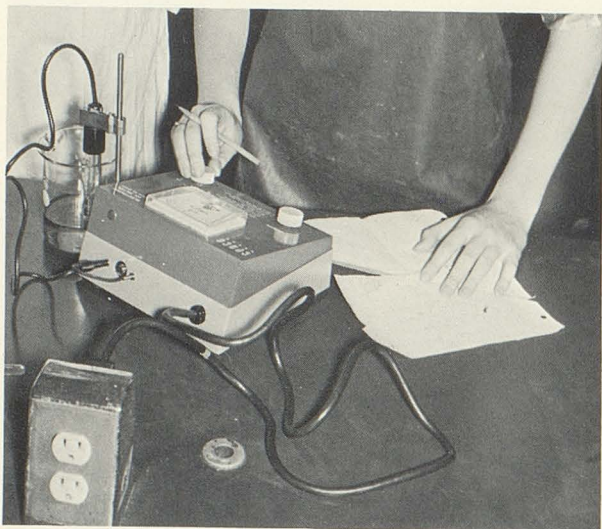

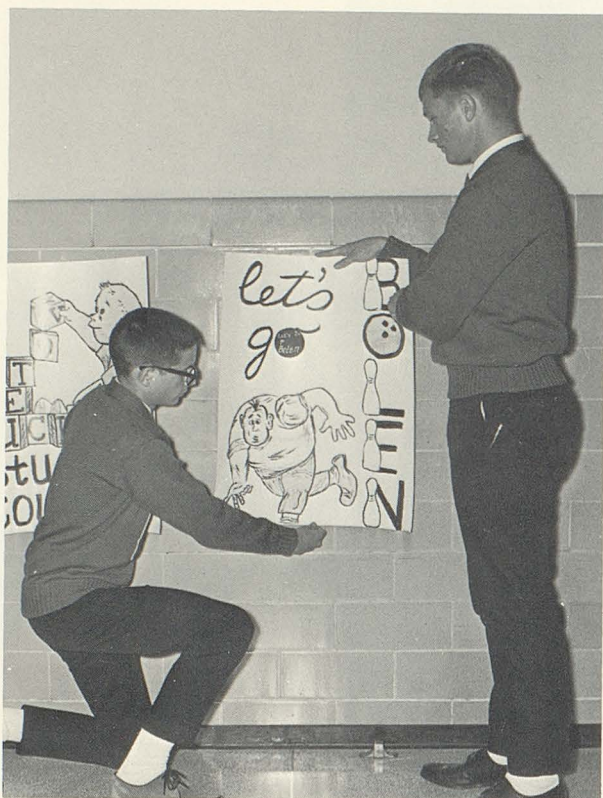

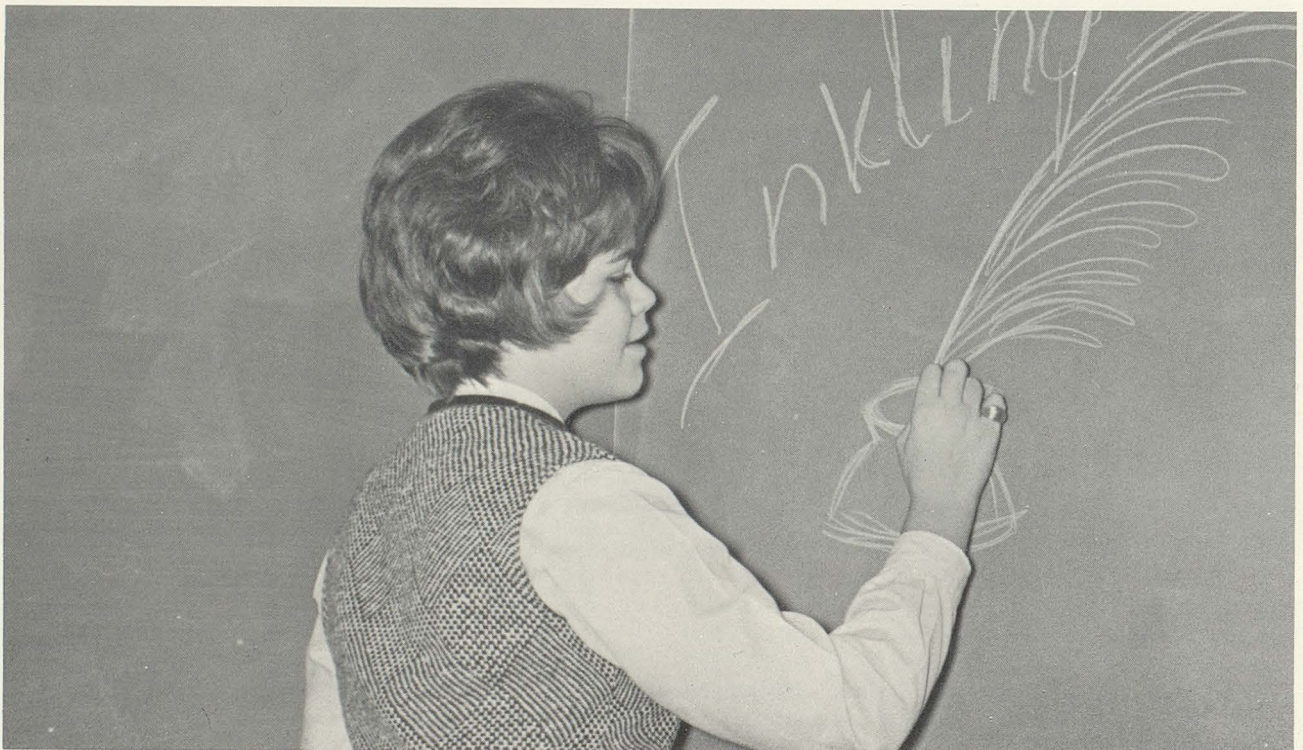

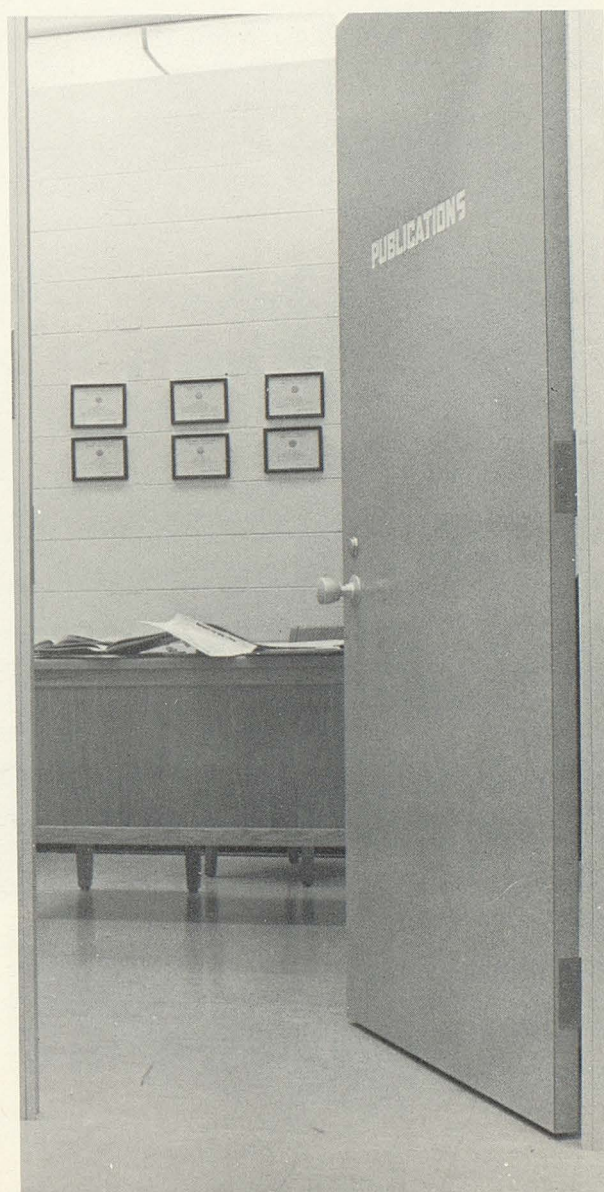
Both the monthly school paper, Quaker Shaker, and the yearbook, Silhouettes, have their headquarters in the new publications office.

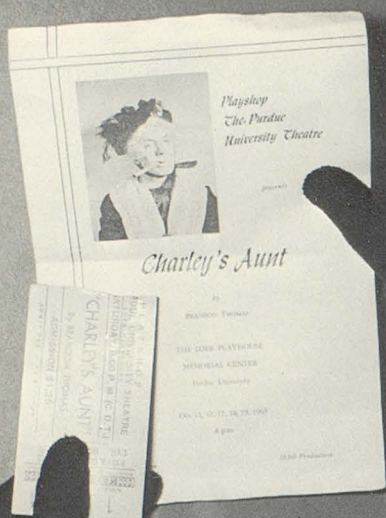

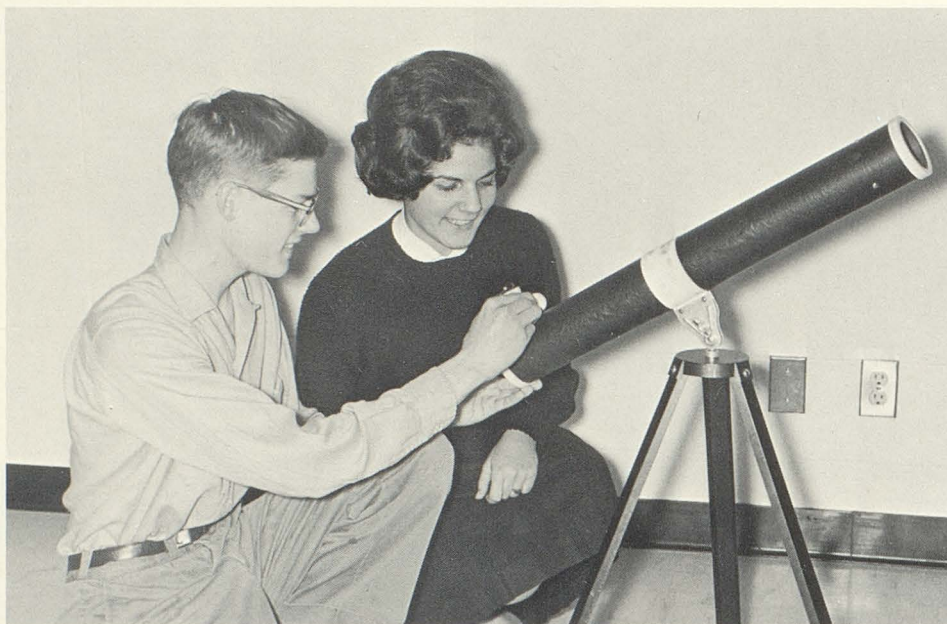

In their bright blue uniforms the PHS band members provide music and color for football and basketball games and concerts throughout the year. The band this year is under the direction of Mr. Jackson.

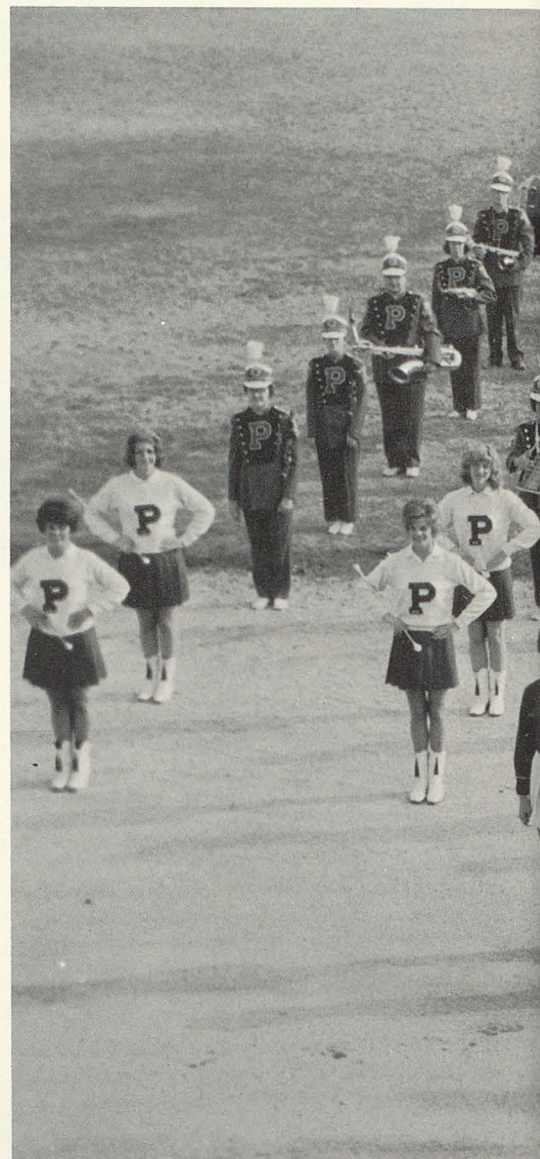
Marching into clever formations, the band puts on lively halftime shows at football games. A smaller group, the Pep Band, plays from the bleachers during basketball games.

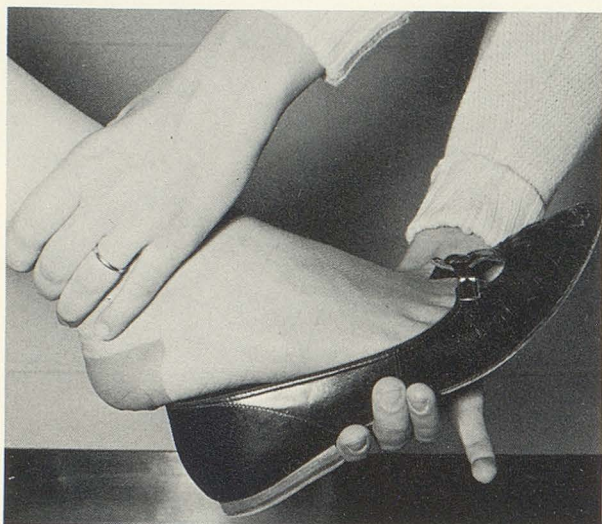

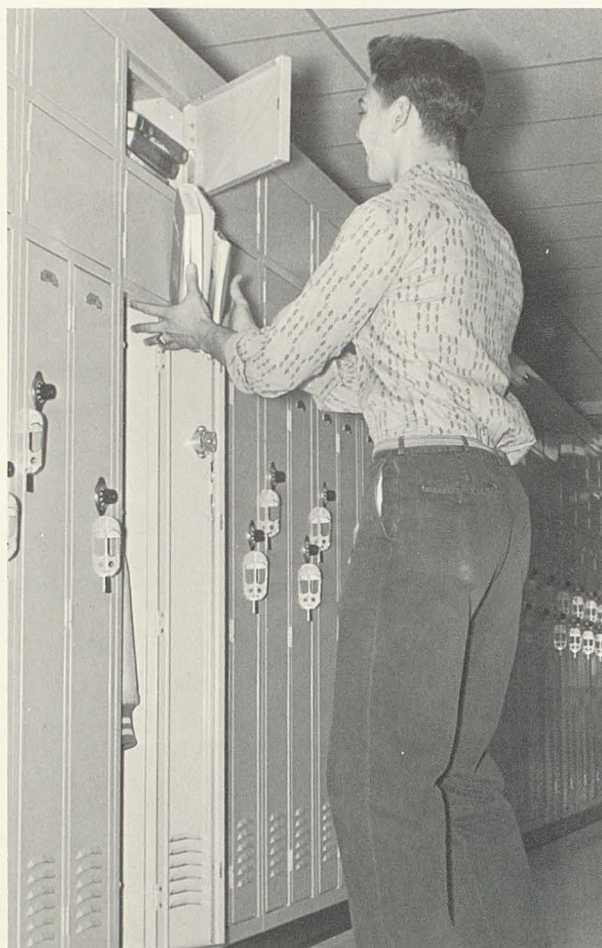

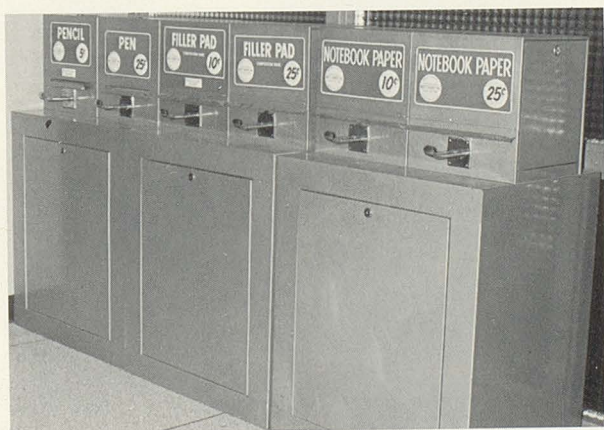

the class floats.

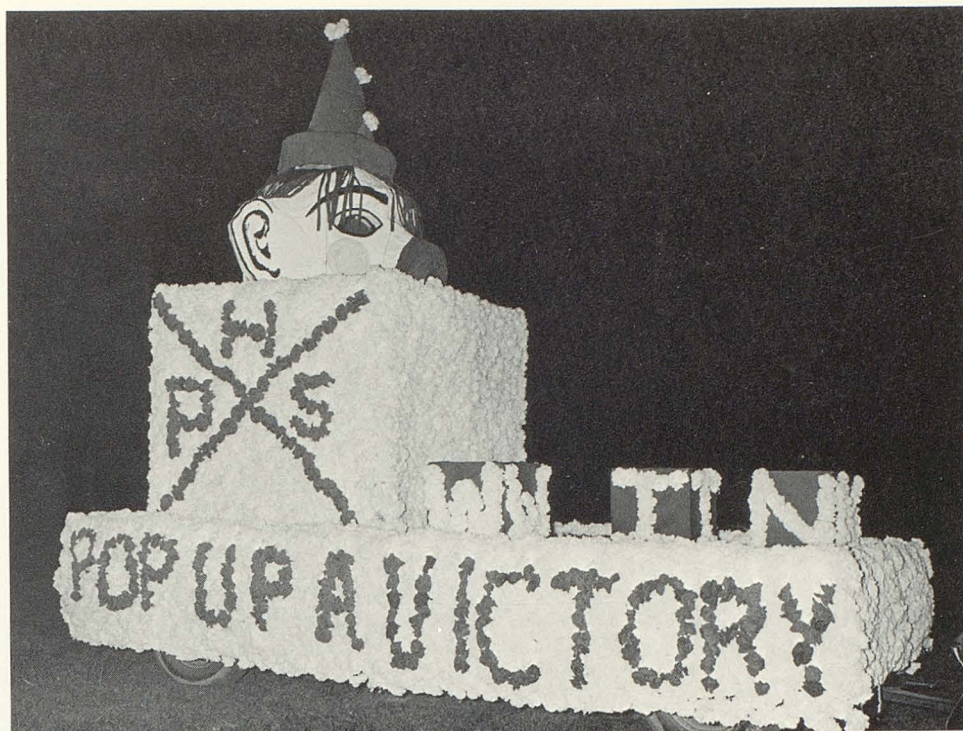
The game was victorious, with the Quakers giving Avon a 34-0 defeat.

Ending the evening was a fabulous sock hop with disc jockey Wally Beethoven.

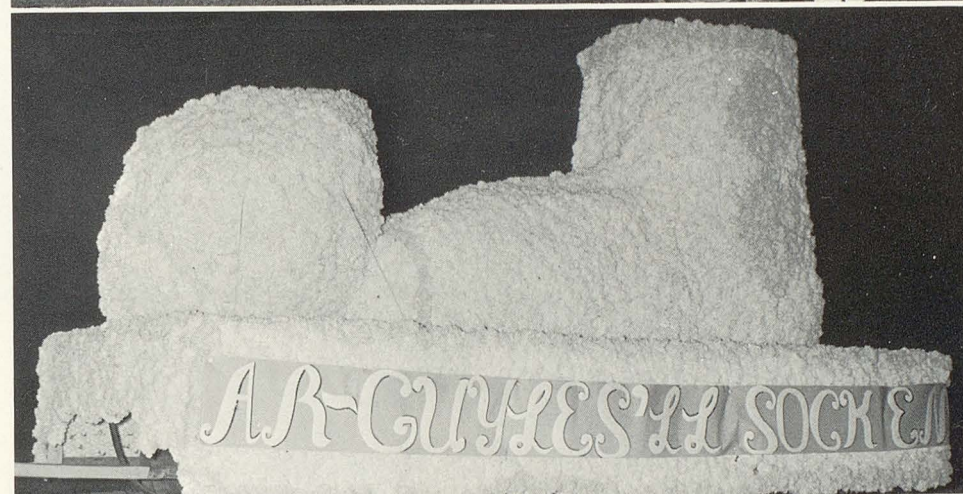

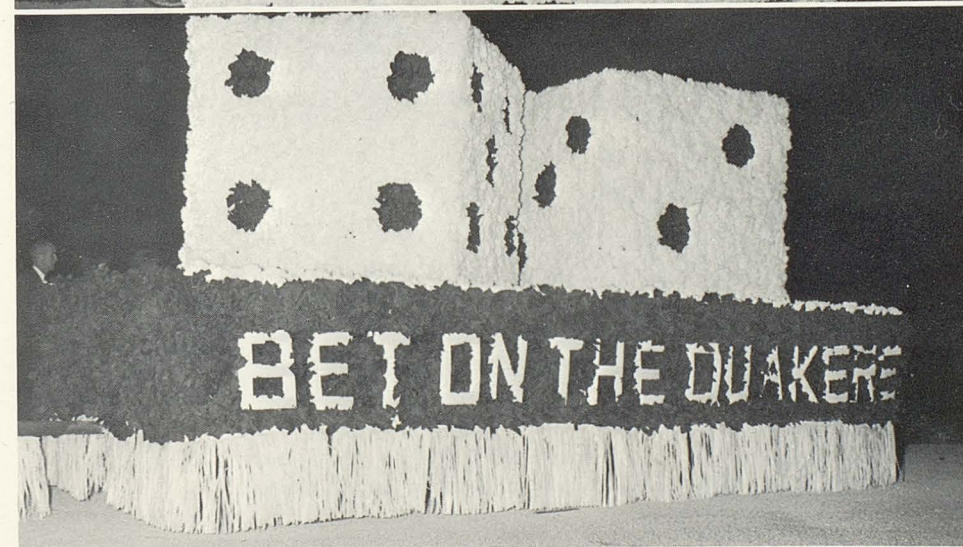

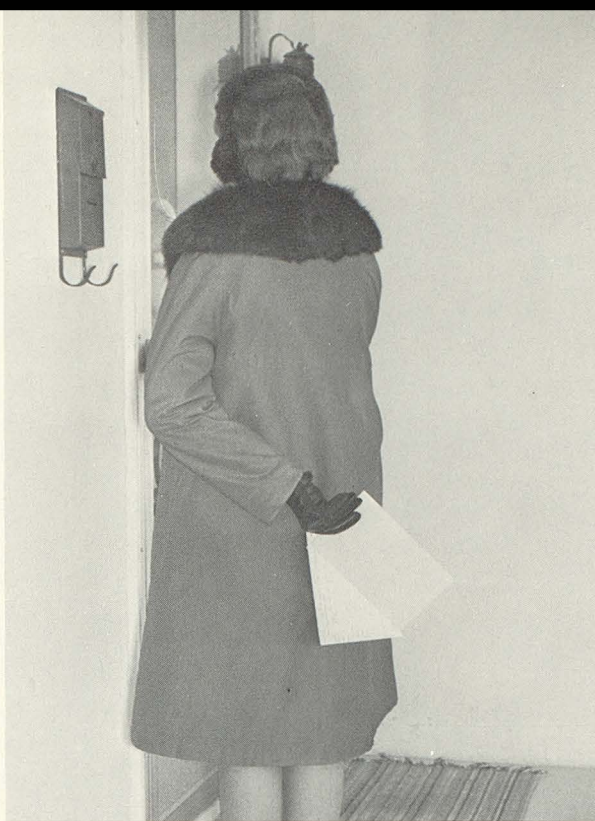

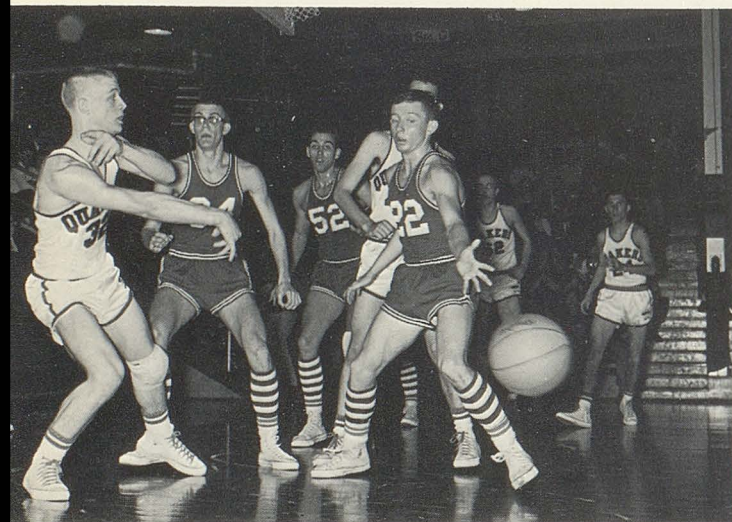

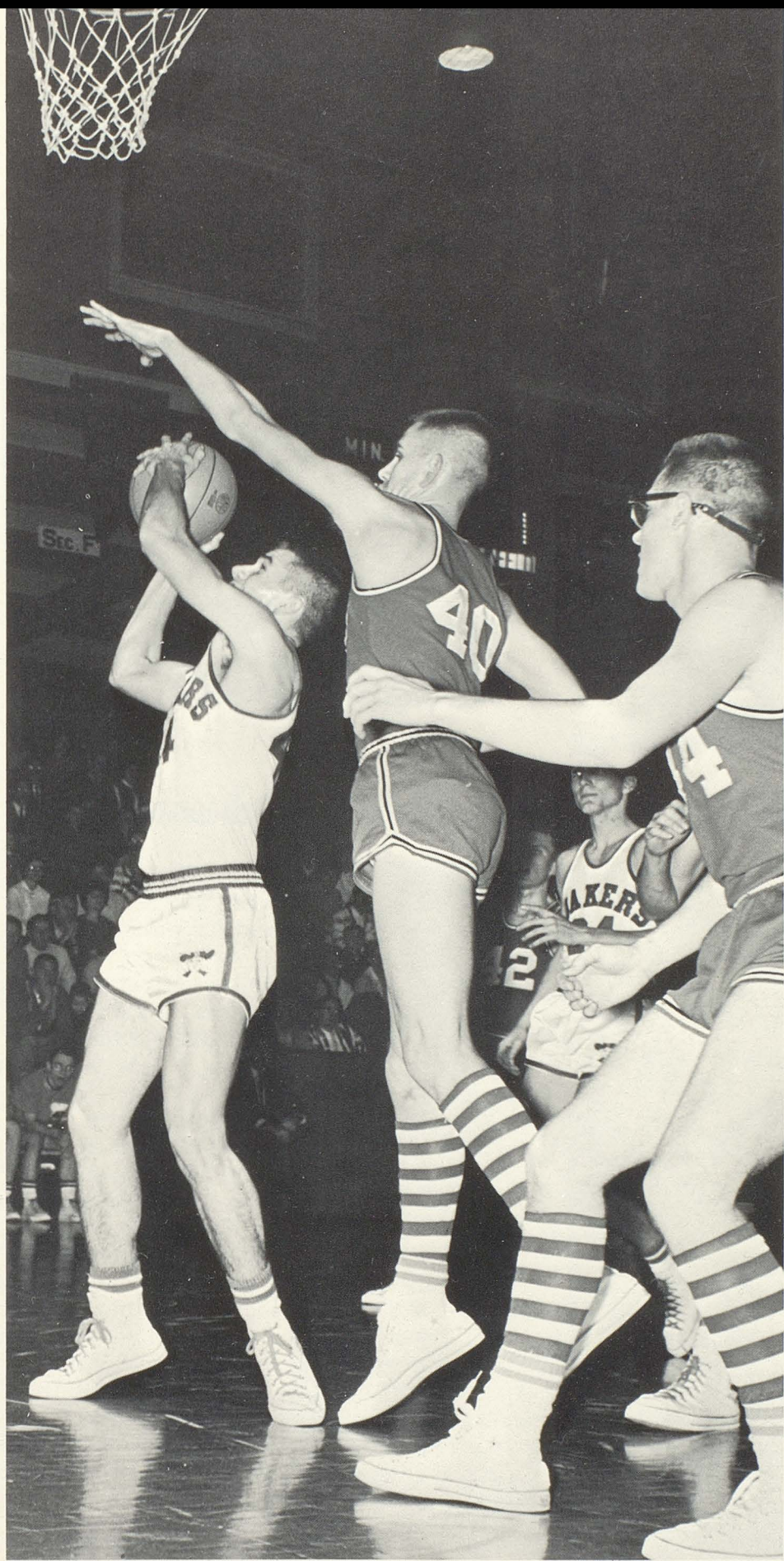

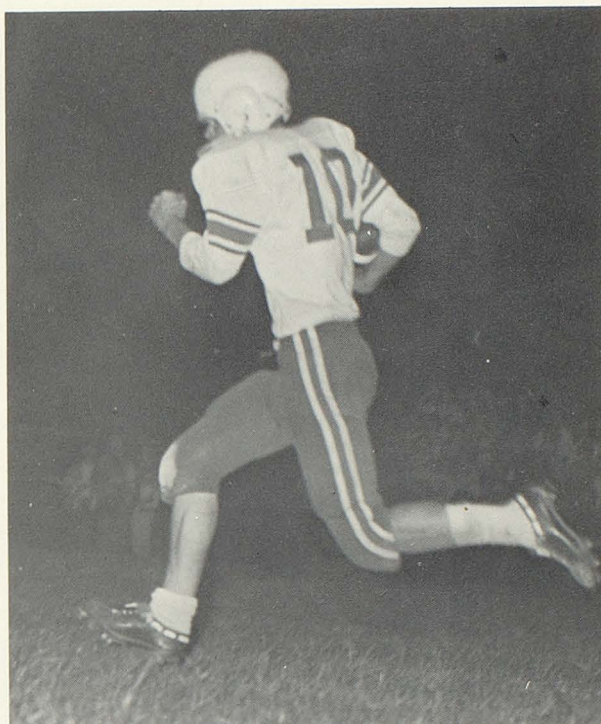

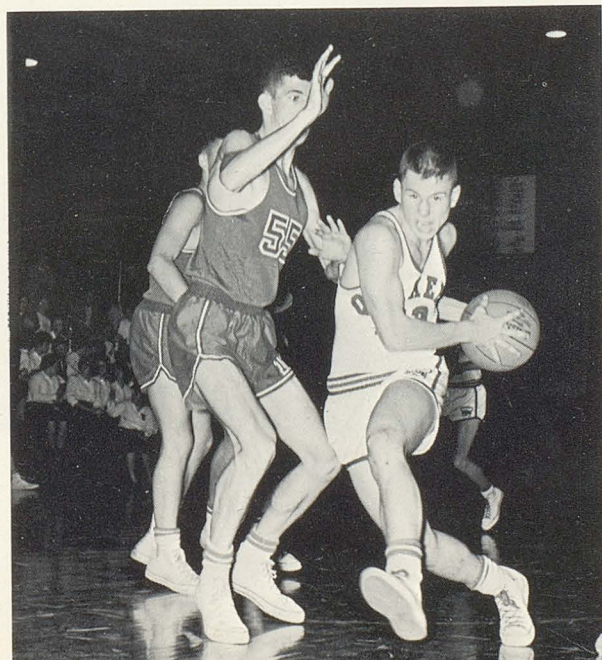
Although our Quaker team did not have an outstanding season, they displayed teamwork and spirit in their games against taller opponents.

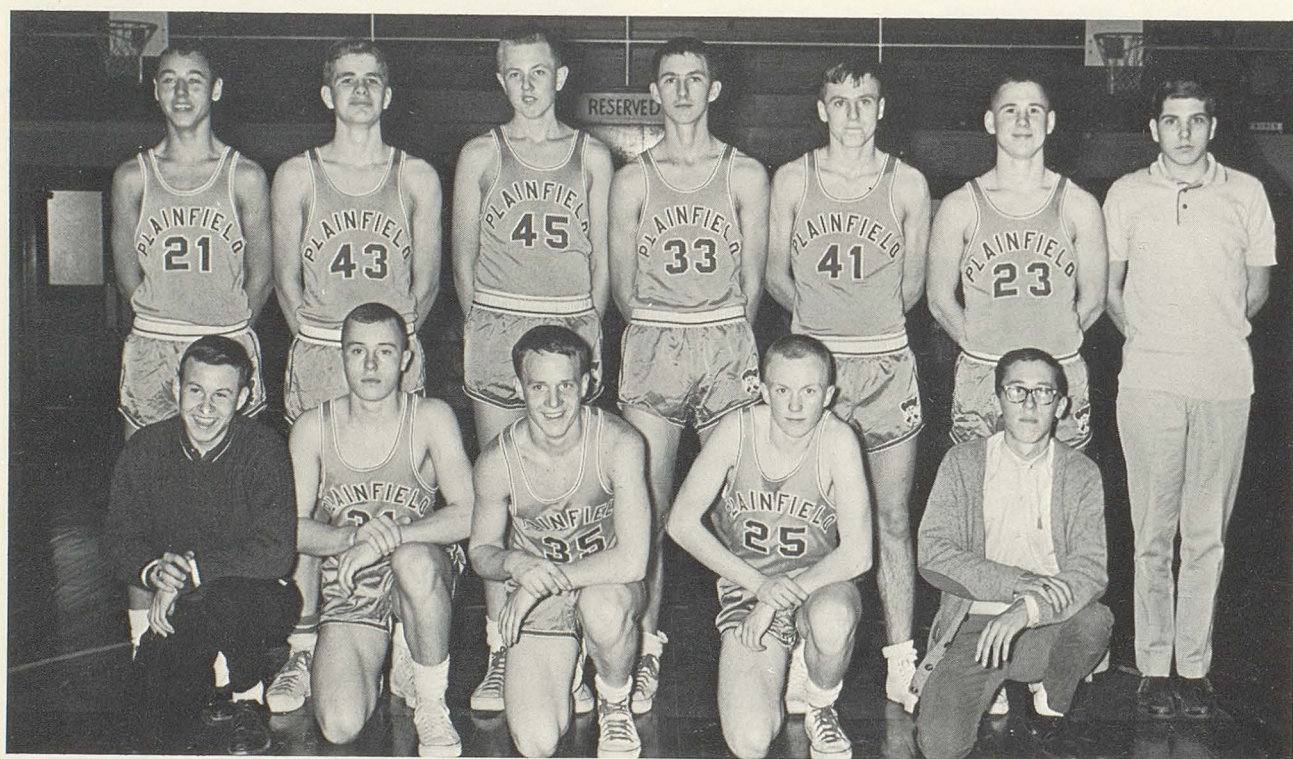

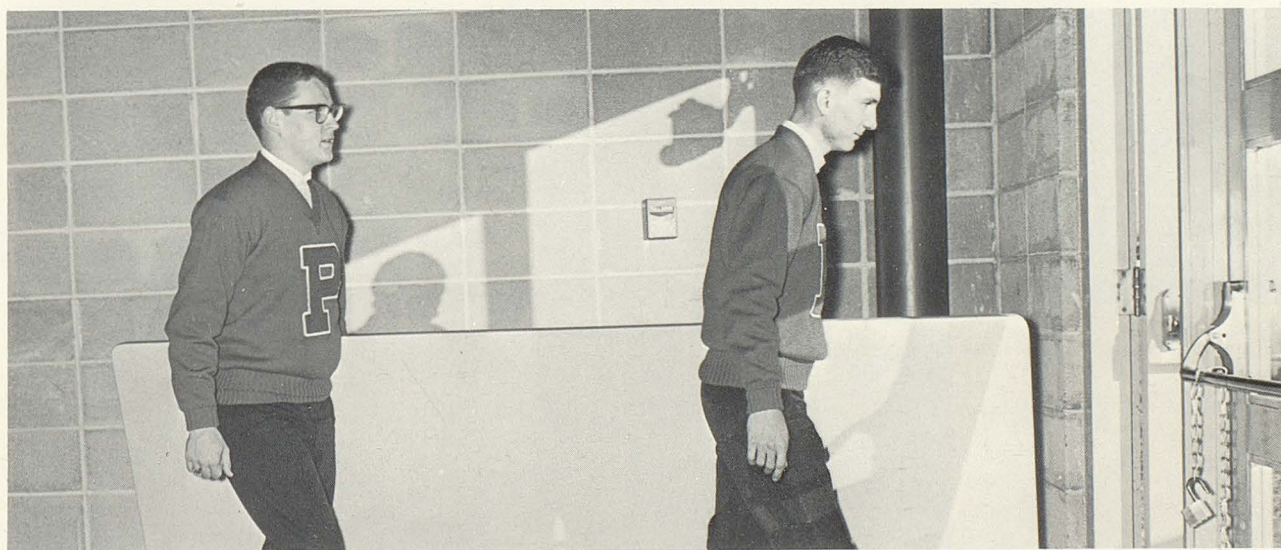
## *Lettermen strive to set examples of good citizenship*

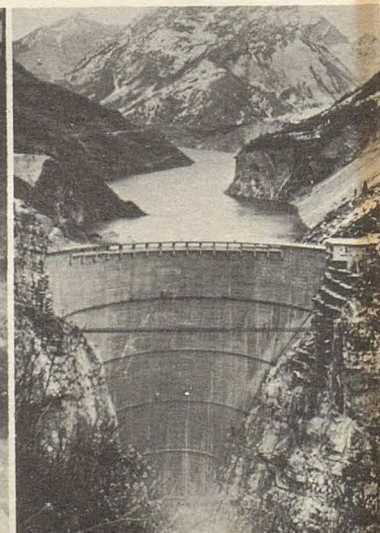

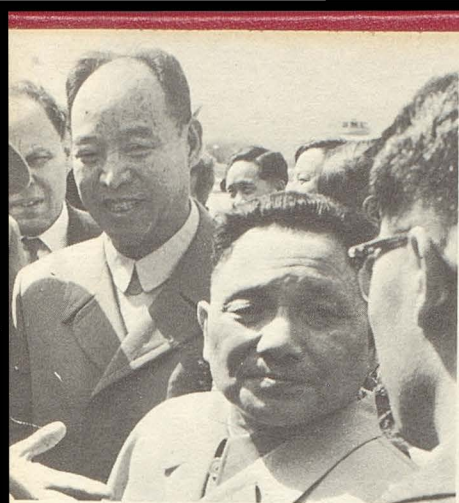

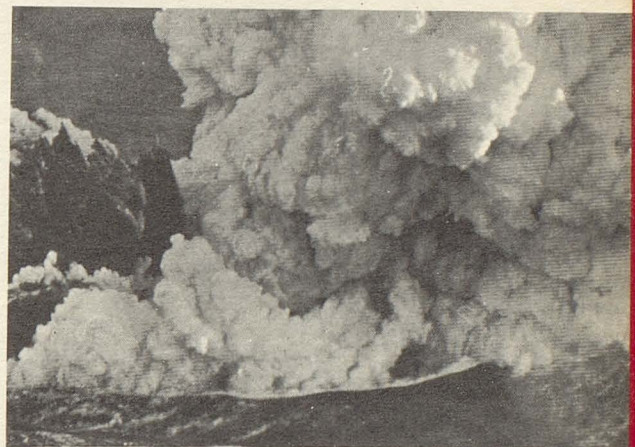
