












Comprise Assignments of English Pupils



Journalism students study the developing of news stories, editorials, features and such issues as propaganda.


Both speech and journalism help to lay the foundation for the future of all PHSers.

Scientists Seek the World Beyond




Inclined planes are used to determine the amount of force exerted. Bill Abel and Charles Traugh experiment with it while in Physics.


Expansion of PHS in size will provide for an expanded science program. Through these actions, Plainfield High School plans to meet the various ambitions of the science student.

Dean Ziegler shows the Algebra II class the graphing method of solving simultaneous equations.


THE ATOMIC-AGE calls for more young people of today and PHS has accepted this challenge.


Students equipped with slide rule, protractor, compass, log tables and ruler set out to meet the challenge of today.

The opportunities in the business field have grown rapidly and will continue to expand.



FOR THE ACADEMIC line, PHS offers to all an ever-changing curriculum and wide variety of elective courses.




Communication Stressed in Foreign Tongues







A determined foe is Gary Brown, junior halfback, when trying to be tackled by opponents.














