The craziness of crying at nothing and laughing at everything. The wonder of finding loyalty where least expected.


These were a few of the highlights that illuminated PHS in 1973-74.





Tragedy struck PHS on December 1, 1973, when Superintendent Roger Sturm died in an accident on his Owen County farm.

In April, 1970, Mr. Sturm assumed command at Plainfield in the midst of the black armband controversy. He first established a new high school administration and things began to happen for PHS'ers.

Mr. Sturm encouraged an open atmosphere in which school administrators could begin to break with the traditional in all areas from dress code, to structured study halls, to course offerings.

Concerned for non-college bound students, Mr. Sturm greatly expanded vocational offerings at PHS. He encouraged the development of distributive education and vocational auto mechanics.

Thus, the tragedy deprived PHS not only of a superintendent but also of a friend.


Accident claims life of Superintendent, PHS loses a friend

With the sudden death of Superintendent Roger Sturm, the school board acted quickly to appoint Mr. Jack Hobbs as the acting superintendent at Plainfield.

Mr. Hobbs came to Plainfield from the Lowell, Indiana, school system during the 1970-71 school year. At Lowell, Mr. Hobbs had been an assistant principal at the high school and, later, part of the central office staff.

Business manager at Plainfield for the past three and a half years, Mr. Hobbs was prepared to step immediately into his new post. Thus, in the transition, existing programs proceeded smoothly.
















The administration eased many of the headaches of scheduling and record keeping this year when they enlisted the services of the I.U. computer center.

### Secretary Esther Copeland retires after twenty-six years of service to Plainfield School Corporation


An era ended in 1974 with Mrs. Esther Copeland's retirement. A 1925 graduate of PHS, Mrs. Copeland returned to her alma mater as a secretary in 1948 to become a mainstay through 26 years of changing administrations.

She witnessed the growth of Plainfield from a small one-secretary school to today's sprawling complex with ten secretaries and aides. Consequently, she became the person to consult about questions of PHS history and tradition.

Over the last quarter of a century, no student attended Plainfield without meeting Mrs. Copeland, either to enter school, pay fees, register for the draft, or any one of a hundred other things.

And, in October, the student council said thanks for those years, inviting Mrs. Copeland to marshall the Homecoming parade.



Bright and early, twenty-seven cafeteria employees arrived at PHS to prepare the 1400 meals to be served in the Jr.-Sr. high complex.

In an effort to spice up the menu, the dietician introduced a line of Hostess cakes and fruit pies. These added to the most popular meal—french fries, tenderloin, and a shake.

Bus service was provided by eighteen drivers who began their routes at 7:00 A.M. They picked up students within a ten mile radius of PHS driving a total of 720 miles per day.

Work began with endless hours of flower making. Through the next two weeks, construction proceeded at a snail's pace, hampered by football practices, jobs and band rehearsals.


Fear that they would not meet the deadline prompted a rush of seniors to closing work sessions. And, they were still wiring things together as their meatgrinder pulled out for the judging site.

Then Homecoming was over and the juniors had won the float competition. Disappointed, the sophomores burned their float at Paul Nysewander's house and swore revenge on all next year.




#### Lettermen make room for GAA





In July, the varsity and reserve cheerleaders attended a camp at Vincennes University where they won five firsts and three seconds. The varsity squad also made the finals on the last night.


Both teams entered the Hendricks County Fair competition where they each won second place. From here they went on to enter the State Fair contest.




Credited with five new course records, MVP Steve Montgomery joined Mark Wendt on the MSC team while Rick Belcher and capt. Bob Dowden received commendations.




Mark Wurfel missed the entire campaign with a broken ankle and Howard Bradley sustained a back injury midway through the season which further reduced the team roster.




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


Through a discouraging season the varsity team fought an uphill battle registering in the win column only once. Not until their final contest did they get it all together, beating Carmel in a tense three game match.






Success during the football season was not restricted to varsity play. The reserve team began its campaign with a five game winning streak before losing to Greenwood, its only MSC defeat.





# Four new schools appear Varsity schedule


The 1973-74 varsity basketball team was a blend of quickness and youth. Only six lettermen returning for the beginning practice sessions and only three of those were seniors.


This year, PHS played the toughest schedule to date, adding Perry Meridian, LaPorte, Noblesville and Bloomington to the roster.

With youth, inexperience, and a tough schedule facing them the 1973-74 swim team set out to improve the previous year's 2-12 season mark . . . and they did.


Seven returning lettermen, including just one senior, led the tankmen through the hectic season. They seldom got together as a whole team except at meets as after school jobs made split practices necessary.





Amy Ward then went on to State placing 3rd in the 200 I. M. and 6th in the 400 free.


Meanwhile, inexperience hampered the gymnasts, in advanced competition for the first time.

Having only three of eight lettermen return for the 1973-74 campaign, PHS could not boast the balanced, well-experienced team expected from the preceding season.











Depth and experience marked the Quakers as strong conference contenders even in early practices. PHS strength held throughout the season with the tracksters dropping only two meets.


Easily conquering all conference foes during the season, PHS sur-

Setting two new school records, MVP Johnson finished the 440 in :50.9 and Wurfel tossed the discus 146' 2.5".













PHS's girls' track team played their first full schedule in 1974. Fielding over a dozen experienced tracksters, the girls improved throughout the season, winning their last three meets.


Practice sessions shared with the boys began to pay off as the Quakers moved into tourney action. PHS took second place at Sectionals and advanced seven girls to Regional competition.


From here Dru Cox (in the softball throw) and Cindy Harbin (in the 220) moved on to the State where Dru placed sixth.

Being a young sport, there were many opportunities for the girls to set records. Therefore, this year's team established new marks in almost every event.


A tennis team joined the sports lineup for girls in 1974. All ninth graders but two, the team played only a partial schedule before the Sectionals.

### Baseball team sets up new council





As the season progressed, the Quakers dominated all comers but two. One of the six also snagged medalist honors at almost every meet.


Moving into tournament play on top of another eight meet winning string, the PHS'ers were determined to better last year's second place finishes in the County and Conference meets. And, they did!







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### Team teaching draws English, Social Studies together, moves







The PHS language clubs might better have been called gormet clubs as most of their activities centered around food.





















## Math, science departments bend to electronics age as

























# FHA, SSS girls hold bake sales in cafeteria to


Working in retail lab groups, these students made signs on the new sign press, drew up ad campaigns, ran a simulated supermarket, and gained practical experience in the high school bookstore.
















### DECA, OEA, FBLA attend a total of 5 conventions,
















# Current interest in physical fitness attracts PHS'ers to












The photography students put in more time outside the classroom than in it. Looking for that dramatic shot or for a photo essay, they ranged all over the Indianapolis area.







Blending these basic ingredients with simplified costumes, a minimum of props, and pantomime, the cast dealt with illusion. And, supplying the last ingredientimagination-the audience transformed illusion into reality.






The photographic staff was composed entirely of sophomores, These boys had a lot of fun, used a lot of film, and spent more time than anyone else working on the 1974 PHS publication.


Fifth period each day became more of a play than a work time for many of the staff. As a result, approaching deadlines found the dedicated workers burning the midnight oil each night to finish on time.

Of course, the new look called for a new name. Therefore, the staff conducted a name-the-paper contest and the R.S.V.P. was born.


