

The senior float, which depicted Coach Kermit Davis as Kermit the Frog of the Muppet Movie, receives top honors in the float competition.









Next came the clash between the juniors and the seniors. It was really a rough and tumble game, but in the end "seniority" prevailed with a score of 34-24.



Nearly 90 students under drama teacher John Reedy's direction and Suzie Roberts' assistance put in many late hours to prepare and present Thornton Wilder's *Our Town* to audiences in early November. In addition to cast members who portrayed the characters, stagecraft class built the set, prop crew members collected necessary items, publicity crews advertised the coming event, and others travelled to the Goodwill store to buy extra costumes.

Despite the fact that the dimmer board had malfunctioned during rehearsal and was still under repair the day before presentation, cast and crew alike were ready for John Himmelheber, the play's Stage Manager, to walk on stage, survey the audience, and begin his play.

The cycle of life and death was the theme of the play which deals with the courtship of George (Dean Black) and Emily (Beverly Alpine), their marriage, and Emily's death in the small town of Grover's Corners. Wilder's "slice of life" style of presentation and excellent interpretations by both the major and supporting characters combined to make the evening a touching and enjoyable one. The use of pantomime and a stark, contemporary set further highlighted the acting abilities of the cast.

The faculty ran a close race all evening, but age overcame them and they collapsed under the immense pressure.





After a tearful ending, the audience rose to their feet to applaud the excellent work of the cast and crew on this enjoyable and meaningful production.





As the evening concluded, students realized that they had had quite a memorable evening.















One "outstanding player" was not singled out from this year's reserve football team. However from their terrific record we can see that all the players displayed exceptional talent this season.



Because Plainfield has team members that are willing to work and very supportive, our freshmen finished their season with a record of 8-1, and our reserve team has a season record of 7-1.

























Language Students Have an Extra Edge in Life

Students at Plainfield High School have the opportunity to take as many as four years of French, German or Spanish. First year begins with simple conversations and vocabulary. Curricula include verb conjugations in a few tenses, memorization of the gender of nouns, and study of certain characteristics unique to the language, such as accent marks in French and Spanish and the umlaut in German. Third and fourth year students find out





As one can see both the English and History departments did offer a wide selection of interesting and educational classes for the students.










Minds and Bodies Are Conditioned



Art and business classes, although not required for graduation, are often selected by students to help prepare them for a future career.









After the marching season was over the auxiliary corps entertained the crowds at home basketball games, including a performance at the basketball game at Market Square Arena.






