













With wizardry of drama, PHS goes to Oz




Rec Nights and dances spice up the work week





Weekends, vacations and free time-students love it!














Class of '89 arrives!






Seniors make waves





Class of '92 adjusts to high school life







Choirs and ensembles receive firsts











Math and science test hypotheses, offer proofs

















































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

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
