I had some of Hollarwells pills and
some of Ayers. I would like for
you to send a few boxes if you
have the chance by some of the
boys that are behind if they come
up. the health of the company
is pretty good Lieut Scott is
sane better he sits up most

of the time. I have plenty
of clothes, the pants we
draw are very good so are
all the other clothes we -
draw we need stockings
now & are looking for
some from mumpshisho
rtly. we are very comfortably
situated here with a good
fire place and plenty
to eat. the weather is
warm now it is almost
oats sowing time here
so say the Citizens. I wo
uld like very much to
have some of the apples
that the boys wrote about
we get some here someti
mes by paying sets a piece
for them. 2nd ~~for 10th~~ I dec.

myself This morning to finish
my letter. I feel pretty well
this morning. the company

care out on drill this morning
we drill in nice weather
only. the cotton trade is about
through with here now as it
is nearly all gone. There are
several citizens around
here that have taken the
oath of allegiance but I rather
think some of them are buttermilk.

there was a lot of the darkeys
taken from here to work at
Vicksburg there are a lot of
them here yet but they are
mostly wenches and little cubs
they look about like little monkeys.
there is one hotel here that makes
it pay steep boarding officers
and citizens from the north
that are here buying cotton.
I have a very bad position to
write in this but my knee
for a desk. I believe I will quit for

Dear Father mother brothers & sister. I now proceed to answer you letter which I received yesterday. I was very glad to hear of your good health.

I am not very well to day I have had a bad cold for several days and last night I had considerable feaver but feel better this morning I have had some medacine till now I have been out for a few days I had some of Hollowells pills and some of Ayres. I would like for you to send a few boxes if you have the chance by some of the boys that are behind if they come up. The health of the company is pretty good Lieut Scott is some better he sits up most of the time. I have plenty of clothes, the pants we draw are very good so are all the other clothes we draw we need stockings now & are looking for some from Memphis shortly. We are very comfortably situated here with a good fire place and plenty to eat. The weather is warm now it is almost oats sowing time here so say the citazens. I would like very mutch to have some of the apples that the boys wrote about we get some here sometimes by paying 5 cts apiece for them.

2nd mo. 13th I seat myself this morning to finish my letter. I feel pretty well this morning. The companys are out on drill this morning we drill in nice weather only. The cotton trade is about through with here now as it is nearly all gone. There are several citazens around here that have taken then oath of allegiance but I rather think some of them are butternut. There was a lot of the darkeys taken from here to work at Vicksburgh there are a lot of them here yet but they are mostly wenches and little cubs they look about like little monkeys. There is one hotel here that makes it pay steep boarding officers and citazens from the north that are here buying cotton. I have a very bad position to write nothing but my knee for a desk.
