I have plenty of clothes, the pants we draw are very good so are all the other clothes we draw, we need stockings now & are looking for some from Memphis shortly. We are very comfortably situated here with a good fire place and plenty to eat. The weather is warm now, it is almost oats sowing time here so say the citazens. I would like very mutch to have some of the apples that the boys wrote about we get some here sometimes by paying 5 cts apiece for them.
