I supose you have heard all about the battle before this time Well I canot say mutch about it because ower corps was not ingaged in the battle but I got to see here and smell a portion of it We got shelled a little We had to or three killed in our brigade. We just now received martching orders I haven't no idea where we are going some says we are going to cross the river and some says not.
