& Sister.

I have the privilage of once
more writing you a few
lines after a silence of some
time. I am in only moder-
ate health at present I have
not been able to get the ague
cured so but what it will
come back in about two
weeks after getting it stoped
I cant get any thing but
quinine to stop it with
yet if you can send me
any good ague antidote I
would be glad of it we
are now on the railroad
that runs from Washville
to Chatanooga and mail

will come to us in a short
time we may not stay on
this road long, the talk is
we will go into east Texas
we near where Burnside is
but we dont know to a surta
inty where we will go. we
have been on a very long
march it had been very
fatiguing I have been fortun
ate enough to get through
pretty well we have lost
two men since we left mem
phis viz. Evan day & Hiram
Wood. Hiram had worried
through a long time he had
been sick a good deal but
had always got up till this
time marching and sickness
was to much for him to over
come. I received a letter from
you last night I was very
glad to hear from you there

was 10 postage stamps enclosed.
we have been in a very rough
country for the last 2 weeks
it has been very hilly and
rocky the teams have been
bothered a good deal getting them
ough. The last letter I wrote
we were at Luka on the Mem-
phis & Charleston railroad —
direct letters via Nashville;
— I suppose will be the proper
way.

I believe there is nothing
more of importance that I
need write at present, write
as often as convenient.

I have the privilage of once more writing you a few lines after a silence of some time. The last letter I wrote wee were at luka on the Memphis & Charleston railroad—direct letters via Nashville; I suppose will be the propper way.
