I noticed in the papers that Sherman is reported to have Atlanta but I think different and I probably have a better chance to know than the correspondent who announsed it Sherman has not taken Atlanta yet but he will take it before a great while is my opinion. The army has been mooveing from the left to the wright for a week and the rebels will be forsed to leave the citty or be flanked by our forces and have their railroad cut Wm. Bayliff has come up from the Hospital he says that his btother Henry died last night & Wm. Curnutt night before last I have not heard from I. S.
