I was happy to hear that you were well, I think the last letter or two that I wrote since wee came here was delayed or you would have rec. them before the one rec. to day was written but they probably have been rec. before this time, it is very cloudy this eavening and our window is so small that I cant see to write very well. The weather is very cold here though not so cold as it is farther north wee have had no show here to amount to anything wee have quarters fixed up so that wee keep pretty comfortable

6 oclock after night. I have took a seat at our table to write a little more for your perusal. I wrote Charles and Amos a few days since I gave the names of our mess the boys are setting by the fire talking on diferent subjects it seems almost like civil life but our duty is pretty heavy wee have to go on guard or fatigue duty every third day but the men keep in tolerable health so far, they have got so used to exposure that wet and cold weather dont have mutch effect upon them. I think that the prospects are better for the terminations of the war befor many months than it has been at all my for thinking so it that the rebels are very scarce of provisions & their best teritory for provisions is in our possession I may be badly mistaken as to the length of time that they will hold out. wee dont get papers regular from the north consequently wee dont get the connexion of the news. I believe I will quit writing for this time, I am nearly out of postage stamps please send me some in your next.
