Roswell Ga. 7th month 16th 1864

Honored Parents Brothers & Sisters

The opportunity is once more offered for me to write you a few lines to inform you of my welfare. my health is reasonably good I have not had the ague since the last of February. The health of the boys that are with the camp is pretty good. I have heard nothing from those that are back at the hospital. The last letter that I wrote we were in our works on the left of our lines south west of Marietta since then we have marched to this place some 15^{to} miles ^{west}. Roswell is a small town

on the west bank of the
Chattahoochee River it is a
small country town consisting of
near a dozen fine dwellings
owned by some wealthy persons
There was several extensive cotton
factories here they also made a
lot of work for the confederacy
wagons shoes &c. These works
were burned by our forces
some two weeks ago there was
a lot of provisions stored
here that we destroyed, our
cavalry burned the factories
and stores before the main
force got here, there has but
two corps. crossed the river viz, the
15th of 16th at this place we left
the 17th of 20th near the river where
the enemy crossed, they may
have crossed somewhere else since,
we have orders to be ready to ma-
rsh in the morning early where

I cant tell, the Chattahoochee
is a considerable river it is
about 200 yds wide but not very
deep There is considerable bluffs on
each side and but little bottoms,
I have had no letters for several
days The last one was written by
Mother & Charles. it has been extremely
warm here for sometime it was
very hard on the men marching as
we came around here There was
a lot of stragglers. we saw
Vincent Carter as we came through
Marietta he has shipped a lot of
Sanitary stores down there and is
staying there, I had a fine
bath of black berry's as we came
to this place they were very plenty
but the army soon cleared them
out. we have been throwing up
breast works since we came here
I presume there will be a
force left here to guard this

crossing. It has been reported
that our forces were in atlanta
but I do not credit the report
though I dont think they aim
to fight at the city.

I have nothing more to write
this time, please write often

There has but two corps crossed the river viz. the 15th & 16th at this place we left the 17th & 27th near the river where the enemy crossed, they may have crossed somewhere else since. We have orders to be ready to march in the morning early where I can't tell, the Chattahoochee is a considerable river it is about 200 yards wide but not very deep there is considerable bluffs on each side and but little bottoms. I have had no letters for several days the last one was written by Mother & Charles. It has been extremely warm here for sometime it was very hard on the men marching as we came around here there was a lot of stragglers. We saw Vincent Carter as we came through Marietta he has shipped a lot of Sanitary stores down there and is staying there, I had a fine basket of black berries as we came to this place they were very plenty but the army soon cleaned them out. We have been throwing up breast works since we came here I presume there will be a force left here to guard this crossing. It has been reported that our forces were in Atlanta but I do not credit the report though I don't think they aim to fight at the city.
