



A work schedule is established and sponsors are lined up to supervise. And finally, the real work begins.

Beginning with a bare wagon, class members measure, saw and hammer to frame their float. Chicken wire is molded to the appropriate shape; flowers, poms or float paper hide the unsightly wire. Special effects such as light and sound are added. Fringed skirts and cut out letters complete the final touches to create a finished, and hopefully, award-winning float.





Before the actual performance, last minute preparations include helping; Heath Helgason lends a helping hand to Spencer Beaman back stage.






















Vocational




Special Classes




Drama

Red Pride Band

As always has been the case, the band was one of the most active organizations at PHS. Fund raisers, as always, were a priority but so was competition and fun. The marching band began its competitive season at the Paoli Invitational on September 9 with first place honors, including firsts for overall music, color guard and grand champion overall; there were 14 bands in the competition. The district contest on Saturday, October 1, resulted in a first division rating. 
































Above: The horse is just one of several pieces of gymnastics equipment the girls must master. Left: Kim Baker comes back to an upright position after a handstand.































