



Excitement rolled as homecoming week started at Plainfield and the Plainfield Quakers prepared for a homecoming victory over the Franklin Bears.



During Friday's pep session some of the Plainfield staff dressed up as musical superstars and sang to the football team.


As a grand finale, some of the staff sang a version of "Wild Thing", that Mr. Sweeney wrote.

What a night it was






The evening was brought to a close by a video dance. Music and dancing made the night a success. By Shannon Tucek

When we were in high school we didn't ever stop to consider exactly what it was that helped us through those rough four years. The people who were always by our sides.







November 19 and 20 hot suns, cool waves, fifteen sailors, and sixteen nurses graced the stage of the Milo Aiken auditorium for the fall production of South Pacific. Peter Sims, Jeff Van Paris, Pamela Murphy, and Brad Roberts and the pit band made the show a near sell out.

The pit band, directed by Brad Roberts, supplied the music. Roberts wanted them to gain an understanding of what it takes to play a different type of music as well as what their role in a musical was. "The most difficult part was getting high school musicians to play music that was originally written for professional players."

The Nobel Prize winning musical was written by the musical duo Rodgers and Hammerstein in the 1940s. The musical is based on a book "Tales of the South Pacific" by James Michner. It is set in the South Pacific during World War II.

"The day of prom and the days after were the most exciting in my life and I'm really glad I went. I was a little unsure about going but enjoyed myself once I got there," said





Two very tough games against Greenwood and Avon brought it to a halt. The Quakers went into sectional play with great enthusiasm but got stopped by a strong Cathedral team.


The season ended 5-4, with Jim Holsclaw and Eric Hartman being named offensive and defensive MVP of the season.

Unstoppable: Brian Laubacher heads for a touchdown in the homecoming game against Franklin.



The team was young this season, with the majority of the members as underclassmen.


The MVP was awarded to junior Robin Gibbs and mental attitude went to junior Hiley Smallwood.

These girls will be returning next season to lead a stronger more developed pack into a winning season.





2-0-2 in the final four games of the regular season.



With the support of all the fans especially at the county meet it gave the guys more inspiration and determination.





The Quaker team went into the county meet seeded third as a team by a twenty-point difference. Everyone on the team placed and a win was brought home by nineteen and a half points.


Their team record was now 9-1 for the season.











Mrs. Masariu, who knew Amy for four years described her as very open, easy going and energetic. Masariu said, "I admire her perserverence since we don't have a girl's team. She is very focused on her sport, and has a kind of concentration and consistency that last even through inclement weather.

Outside of school, Amy en-

joyed being part of her church youth group.

John Arvin, Amy's youth group sponsor, described Amy as a focused athlete and person.

"Before the state golf tourney, we played a practice round together and she absolutely smashed me. She also made me folow the real golf rules instead of the ones I usually make up as I go."

Amy has a list of accomplishments that seem to never end. In 1993 she competed in the IGA-PGA junior tournament at Valle Vista G. & AC. She shot an 83 and received 1st place out of 21 girls, age 16-17. The course played 5680 yards long, and par was 74.

These are just a few of Amy's achievements, which payed off by her acceptance to Bowling Green University to play golf.

HANKINS RETIRES AFTER 37 YEARS OF MAKING HISTORY

Mr. Jerry Hankins, the head of the Social Studies Dept. at PHS, retired at the end of the school year. Mr. Hankins had taught at Plainfield since the fall of 1970. Before coming to Plainfield, he taught at Shortridge High School for 10 years.

Upon graduating from high school in Terre Haute, he went straight into the U.S. Navy. After serving in the Korean War, he enrolled at Indiana State University, majoring in engineering. He soon discovered he enjoyed talking and getting to know people more than he enjoyed his geometry classes. Mr. Hankins soon changed his major to education.

Mr. Hankins' first teaching position was substituting for an ill COME ALIVE

league, Mr. Howard

teacher at Lab School in Terre Haute. He really enjoyed it but was very unsure of himself.

"I was not a very confident person. It was not until an old professor of mine urged me to seek a full time teaching position, did I find some selfconfidence," Hankins recalls.

Hankins moved his family to Indianapolis, where he found a teaching position at Shortridge. He began there in the fall of 1959, teaching history. Through the turbulent '60s, Hankins saw all kinds of demonstrations and riots at Shortridge. In 1970, he and a col-

Hankins said, "Even in this small suburb, national unrest had made a great impact. In fact, some teachers had been fired just before I arrived because they wore black armbands protesting the Vietnam War."

Hankins saw a similarity in the attitudes of the past and present generations. "Today's kids are just as serious about getting an education as the generation of their parents," commented Hankins.

Hankins' classes were unique. They were unique because of the way he presented the material. The stories he told and the way he taught made you want to know more about what happened to Mary, Queen of Scots, or George Rogers Clark. He made the characters of history come alive forhis students.

Even the people who didn't excel in history admitted that Hankins stirred something in every student, that made them want to try a little harder, or be a little better than they were before. Maybe it was because he went out of his way each day to mention every student's name at least once in class. Or maybe it was because he was always rooting for the underdog.

"Don't get me wrong, I love having the students in my classes who know and enjoy history. It's interesting because they almost always stay after class and we have great discussions. But I also enjoy having the students who maybe don't do so well in history, the underdogs. I want to teach them something that will stay with them for a long time," said Hankins.

Hankins, was a great teacher, advisor, and friend who made a significant impact in the lives of many people.

"Jerry Hankins is one of the best teachers that I have ever taught with. He really cares about his students."





STUDENTS GIVEN À ROADMAP TO HELP DECIDE UPON THEIR

College representitives from different state colleges and universities came to the Center to give out literature and talk about their college. "The Center was really helpful in

showing students the importance of going to college and choosing a good career," said PHS guidance counselor Richard Shew.

The second program, Student Portfolios, were relatively new to Plainfield. The Portfolios, donated by PSI. were divided into five main sections: Scholastic, Work Related Experiences. Service and Leadership, Personal Information, and Other Evidence. Throughout the four years of high school, students can collect essays, awards and other kinds of achievement that would make a good impression on future employers or university placement offices.

"I haven't gotten any material yet for my portfolio, but I'm working on it." said sophomore Todd Shahan. Other items that would be ideal to submit would be newspaper articles, diplomas, resumes, and certificates of achievement attained.

"Every Plainfield High School student is guaranteed a Student Portfolio by the time they graduate," said Shew.

By visiting the College/ Career Center, completing the Student Portfolios, and choosing the type of academic curriculum that will suit their future careers, students were one step closer to getting through the maze and realizing their futures.







Mr. Sweeney: I flunked out of junior English and decided that if his teacher could teach, so could he."


Mrs. Taylor: My teachers in high school were an inspiration to me. I wanted to emulate them."

Mrs. Cumberworth: I always wanted to be a teacher. I enjoy school and sharing new ideas. I like to work with people and it's never an old routine.




As the year came to a close and the seniors began saying their goodbyes we looked back at what the year had done for us, what had happened, how we had changed.
